41 members, family & friends toured the Gettysburg battlefield on October 13. The tour was led by our very own Scott Robinson, a member of the 2nd Maryland Infantry, Company A, C.S.A. We were given a very different perspective, that of a Confederate soldier during the war. Scott led us to significant spots on the field, such as the site of General Reynold's death on the first day, Iverson's Pits, where a North Carolina regiment met their untimely deaths, but we also learned about Sallie, the 11th Pennsylvania's mascot, and her personal story (members left special treats for her!). We learned of the valiant 20th Maine and their desperate struggle on Little Round Top, about General Sickle's wounding, and then the Confederate's desperate struggle on Culp's Hill where the 1st Maryland from Baltimore, and the 2nd Maryland from the Eastern Shore fought against each other...and the 2nd Maryland's dog, Grace and his death on the field. We also viewed locations on the battlefield that the general public is unaware of. Finally, we visited the Pennsylvania Monument and the High Water Mark of Pickett's Charge.

We also read stories of Lodges during the war, and how they were used as field hospitals...and how our Brothers helped each other even though they were on different sides.

We were treated to a wonderful buffet lunch and constant snacks and beverages during the bus ride! The weather was beautiful. It was a great day to share with family and friends, and to honor our heroes of the Civil War on both sides.

Attendees were treated to dinner by Victory Lodge #658 before the ceremony, and had specially decorated cake afterward.







The week of October 29th was warm and mild, temperatures rising up into the 60's. Sunday, November 4th even, was nice and warm. However, as things often happen, November 3rd in Shanksville was 36 degrees and rainy/sleeting. That did not stop the almost 100 Brothers, Sisters, friends, family and dignitaries from attending the joint memorial service hosted by the Department Council of PA, Patriarchs Militant, and the Department Association LAPM. We were fortunate to have so many visitors from all over the continent, from PPIALAPM Debra Lavergne in California, to President of the IARA Patty Heighton from Nova Scotia. We had other visitors and dignatires from Virginia, Washington DC, and all five branch heads were present to lay the wreath at the flag pole. Captain Scott Robinson of Lewisburg Lodge #96 and Canton Ridgely #8 gave an incredibly moving speech as he remembered volunteering in the clean-up efforts at the Pentagon and the Twin Towers. He then went on to lead the Jurisdiction as our Grand Master from 2001-2002 having been installed in Grantville.

He was a Patriarch of Perseverance Encampment #135 of Philadelphia, joining June 1, 1996 and was a former Chevalier of Canton Philadelphia #1, Patriarchs Militant. In the past, he also held membership in the Rebekahs, joining New Century Rebekah Lodge #244, Cochranville, on May 10, 1998, and transferring to Letitia Penn Rebekah Lodge #173, Philadelphia, on December 16, 2003. He held membership up until September 27, 2011.

Born in Dover, DE, he was one of six siblings. He was preceded in death by his two brothers, one being PGM Paul C. Cooke, Jr., and two sisters. Surviving is his daughter, Heather, also of Walker Lodge #306, four grandchildren and one sister.







THE TREASURER'S TALES - DECEMBER 2018

December is most notably identified with Christmas. In 1923 Christmas was chilly in Grover's Mill, but it was chilly in Pennsylvania as well. Winter is cold and winter starts in December. For those of us who travel in winter, Florida is much warmer. Barney had to keep the farm going and teach school, winter in the South was out of the question. You know it is cold when you and the cow are both happy to be close during milking.

On December 6, 1923, President Calvin Coolidge became the first President to make a radio broadcast. The Yankees sold Pitcher Carl Mays to the Cincinnati Reds for \$85,000. Today that would be \$1,255,000. On December 28, George Bernard Shaw's St. Joan premieres. You can watch a trailer for St. Joan here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=t8BScvUNaec. If you like to listen to Christmas songs, you can find about an hour and a half here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=0iQ3NXKDacE. The last day of school for the year was Friday, December 14. On Saturday, December 15, the high school held the Snow Ball

December was a short month at school. Barney had to look after the Christmas dance (Snow Ball) this year, a subject we will touch on now. When he was older and being interviewed at retirement in 1960, he was asked what the most challenging part of teaching high school English for 41 years was. He thought a minute and said, "The only time I longed for the trenches in France was when it was my turn to chaperone one of the high school dances."

In 1923 high school was a four year institution. The various shuffling and dividing of school children had not yet become popular. Likewise, high school had become a four-year adventure in 1910, with one-third the of 14 year-olds in the United States attending high school by 1920. Typically, depending on the month of the year one was born and the age regulation in place at the time, a high school student might be somewhere between 13 and 19, spending four years in high school. The school year had been 180 days since the early 1900's.

So now we need to find the appropriate form for a Christmas Dance. Since the local taxpayers did not want to foot the entire bill, admission tickets were sold. The fee in 1923 was \$0.70. This is about the same as \$10.00 and paid for the janitor, decorations and refreshments.

The school, teachers and gym were on the taxpayer. The wealthy few bought clothes for the dance; most borrowed things their parents had worn or made due with suits and dresses worn on Sunday. The students had attempted to locate members of the opposite sex during the fall term, to enable them to find a date. Barney was going to use Thursday and Friday the 13th and 14th to take his classes to decorate. The first eight school days of December were to be class work. Barney chose the 1922 novel, Babbitt by Sinclair Lewis to be the point of discussion. Although the work won Lewis the Nobel Prize in literature in 1930, Barney soon realized the amorous adventures of Babbitt's son might give the students some ideas that would be bad for tenth graders and something he did not want to have fresh in the minds of the Christmas dance goers.

Ulysses was the best seller, but it went further into taboo subject matter than Babbitt. He finally decided on Captain Blood, a pirate story which inspired many films, including a popular 1935 version starring Errol Flynn. The movies had not been out yet, so discussion of the novel was still an interesting topic. Barney was able to keep the minds of the students on the novel throughout deer season and almost up to the time to decorate the gym. This was one of Barney's more successful December reading assignments. The novel had a spirit of adventure that kept the interest of the tenth graders.

Barney arrived at the high school at 5:15 p.m. for the dance, which was to start at 7:30 p.m. Barney and the woman who teaches French (Miss Bertha Pflam) were in charge, with two of the younger teachers "learning" the ropes. Mis Pflam was

doing her last dance, she would retire in May at 70, with many dances under her belt. Barney assigned one of the younger teachers, Bill Tennant to guard the punch bowl. This meant Bill had to assemble the punch, keep the bowl replenished and make sure that no students "augmented" the mixture. The new history teacher, Joseph Roderick, was the other trainee in the chaperone detail. Joe had fought in the trenches with Barney's Rainbow Division, although they did not know each other during the war. Joe went back to school and became a teacher after World War I. He lost a finger off his left hand in combat at the Ardennes Forest, he would lose a toe while teaching school, but that is a story to be told another day.

Barney and Joe would take turns on parking lot detail. The old cars were not well enclosed and made the inhabitants visible to the world. Most of the students walked. A few took buggies, but horses were discouraged because they polluted the parking lot. Buggies were also more amenable to mischief, so they had to be inspected regularly. The empty rooms had to be inspected, especially the third floor girls' room. Only Miss Pflam could go in the girls' rooms, and she did not want to walk up to the third floor. A known hot spot, with little control is a weakness in the perimeter. Joe and Barney set up several command posts where they could discuss things out of the hearing and sight of others. Bill had the punch ready at 7:30 p.m. The band (all high school students) began to play at 7: 35 p.m. Popular dance tunes of the era can be heard here: https://www.allmusic.com/album/seldom-heard-hot-dance-tunes-1923-1929-mw0002433271.

Bill was a science teacher and loved to explain phenomena to students. It did not occur to him that this could be a problem. One of the students engaged him with questions about the Wright Brothers and flight. Bill told him about going for a flight at a county fair. Prohibition was in full swing in 1923. This meant nothing, one of the student's had an uncle who lived in Western Pennsylvania and worked at the Old Overholt distillery until prohibition. He moved to New Jersey to get a job with his brother in a mill. He brought 50 bottles of Old Overholt rye whiskey with him. Bill was an abstainer and thought he smelled something like a drug store while he was discussing the Wright Brothers. He tasted the punch and thought the fruit juice was particularly good.

Barney and Joe found three buggies, one 1921 Maxwell and two vacant classrooms that had couples doing prohibited things, for which they were written up. Four people brought their own mistletoe, which Barney confiscated. Miss Pflam never made it to the third floor girls' room. This was a mistake, and there was one pregnant girl in the 1924 graduating class. A young female chaperone replaced Miss Pflam the next year.

The real problem was Bill. He was 20 years old and quite naive. He knew science but he did not have a discriminating taste. The students could easily lure him away from the punch bowl. He also enjoyed the punch. He had never tasted alcohol before this night. After the last dance, Joe took Bill to the boys room and held his head while he worshiped the God of the toilet.

Barney had to drive him home. When he sobered up the next morning, Bill came over to apologize to Barney. Bill's mother had been rather hard on him and told him that he had to apologize to Mr. Wells for acting so foolish. Barney gave him a cup of coffee, a lot of teacherly advice and a petition to join the Odd Fellows. This was a dance to remember for Barney, a few students (one girl in particular) and for Bill Tennant.

Next month will be January and I will surprise you.
