

Still fresh in some people's minds, slowly creeping up to us is the 20th anniversary of the tragedies that happened on September 11, 2001. Many ask the question "Where were you?". Now, here we are 20 years later. Some Lodges are now initiating members that do not remember this; that weren't even born yet. This year, the Tunnel to Towers Foundation

(www.t2t.org) has reached out to our Jurisdiction to start planning different events as Frank Siller, brother of fallen Firefighter, Stephen Siller, makes his annual 42 day, 6 state, 500 mile pilgrimage from the Pentagon, to Shanksville, then to the World Trade Center. Many will remember the 2018 Grand Decoration of Chivalry Ceremony held at Shanksville, where the heroes that perished during Flight 93 were honored for their actions. It's time for us as an Order to step up again!

Shanksville, PA – August 21st and Hershey, PA – August 28th, both Saturdays. Frank Siller, will be making his way through these areas. There will be a walk from the Shanksville Fire House to the Flight 93 area, and then a larger parade August 28th in Hershey. Odd Fellowship in Pennsylvania felt we should step up and take a part in this as a sponsor. For that, we are looking to raise \$5,000 to memorialize this walk. If you look up the website, you can see all the wonderful things the Tunnel to Towers Foundation does for Firefighters, Military and gold-star families. INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT LYCOMING COUNTY


The Rebekah Lodges numbered around 1,000. Some of the numbers, you'll also see more than once, as some of these Lodges only lasted a few years.

Did you ever wonder if your town had a Rebekah Lodge?

Do you know where it was or do you even remember some of these Lodges?

If you can take a picture of the Lodge Hall that was once in your town and mail it in, we'd be glad to have it for our archives and it could perhaps end up in the magazine!



The community of Cammal, in McHenry Township, Lycoming County, was settled in 1820. In 1884, a post office was open and by the 1890s, three logging railroads came through here. Cammal Lodge #1001 was instituted around the same time, 1885. During this boom time, the town had stores, four hotels and saloons, four churches, and the Odd Fellows Hall, which sometimes doubled as a church, along with a newspaper. In 1905, timber dwindled and the town took a new focus. In 1946, Cammal Lodge went defunct. In 2002, the post office closed and a few businesses remain. Luckily though, the former Odd Fellows Hall, now the McHenry Township Community Center, still stands. (Some information taken from Wikipedia)

THE TREASURER'S TALES JULY 2021

We have been following Barney's exploits on a month by month basis and we are now at July 1926. For those of you who are new to our serial, Barney Welles is a mythical Odd Fellow who lives in Grover's Mill, New Jersey. Grover's Mill was the site of the Martian invasion of 1938, see https://waroftheworlds.fandom.com/wiki/Grovers_Mill,_New_Jersey. Barney was a veteran of World War I, a tenth through twelfth grade English teacher and a farmer. He was a faithful Odd Fellow and most of his exploits had connections with the Order. All the characters and events in the story are fictional.

July 4, 1926 was Independence Day and it fell on Sunday. July 1926 was a notable month in history. On July 9, Chiang Kai-shek was appointed revolutionary supreme commander in China; on July 10, Lake Denmark, New Jersey arsenal explodes, killing 21, with \$75million in damage; on July 16, National Geographic takes its first color, underwater photographs; on July 22, Cincinnati Reds right fielder Curt Walker ties the National League record of 2 triples in one inning in a 13-1 trouncing of the Boston Braves (before they went to Milwaukee); on July 10, Fred Gwynne, actor (Car 54 Where Are You, Munsters), was born in NYC, New York (d. 1993); on July 21, Paul Burke, actor (Naked City, Thomas Crown Affair, 12 o'clock High), born in New Orleans, Louisiana (d. 2009); and on July 25, Cuban president Fulgencio Batista (25) weds Elisa Godínez y Gómez (25), Batista was overthrown in 1959 by Fidel Castro.

George Pratt had advanced to Noble Grand and, had planned the picnic the previous year, because the Vice Grand was in charge of planning the picnic. The current Vice Grand was Robert Clancey, nephew of the oft-mentioned Clancey. Robert broke his leg on June 14 while repairing the town flag pole. He begged off planning the picnic. George thought that the job should go to someone with experience, but he wanted to be fair. He put the names of the members in a hat and had Vic draw the name of the picnic chairman out. It was Barney, the lodge secretary. Two weeks later, when he was burning the trash, Barney discovered his name was on every slip of paper, but it was too late to object as the picnic was over.

Barney wanted to have something different, so he decided on a hog roast. He and his father had a bumper crop of hogs and they harvested a large one. The pig was in the ground by 8:00 am and Elizabeth and her mother, Alice, were making a special barbecue sauce. Honey, brown sugar, homemade tomato paste, garlic, onions and other spices were in the mix. Woody and John (Elizabeth's younger brothers) thought it would be interesting to add some moonshine to the mix. While Elizabeth and her mother were in the front room checking on Schuyler and Rebekah (Barney and Elizabeth's children) Woody and John spiked the sauce. After cooking for two hours, most of the liquor had evaporated but the sauce had a different taste. Alice kept adding more brown sugar to get the taste right.

Barney and Vic supervised the arrangement of the picnic tables. There was one large table reserved for the hog. It was on a pole for "easy" transport. The carcass weighed in at a hefty 153 pounds. The anticipated crowd was only 115 people, so there was over one pound per person. Clancey felt bad since his nephew chickened out, so he had his wife bake 15 dozen rolls (this was before women were liberated.) George Pratt made 20 gallons of homemade root beer. Barney made 25 gallons of iced tea. Everyone brought a covered dish. The tables were groaning from the weight of the food.

The large table was covered with three layers of newsprint. The hog was pulled at high noon. Barney was slicing it down and giving each person a generous portion as they walked by. He noticed two of the boys, around 8 years old, were going through the line multiple times. He asked Vic to follow them. One boy was in the parking lot, feeding the usual suspect. Melchizedek

apparently had a love of pork. Vic ended lunch for the friendly raccoon and brought the boy back to the picnic. He asked him about the other boy and was told that he was feeding a stray cat in the woods, because it had kittens.

Vic scouted for ten minutes and found the other boy, George Pratt's grandson. He was on the edge of the woods calling, "here kitty, kitty." By the time Vic arrived at the edge of the woods, his fears were completely realized, the black and white cat was actually a mother skunk with six kittens. If Vic had not been a veterinarian, he might have blown the picnic. He got Jimmy Pratt to throw all the pork he had behind a log and run back to the picnic grove. No skunk followed. George gave his grandson a major scolding.

Vic settled down to finish his pork. He thought Alice had done a fine job on the sauce, he couldn't remember when it had such a fine, sweet tang. He was using more sauce than normal and began to think it was having an effect on him.

When Barney got around to eating, he was the last one. There was a lot of pork and most other items left. The red velvet cake and blackberry pie were gone. So was the barbecue sauce, so he put mustard on his pork sandwich. He enjoyed it all.

Games followed lunch, with the three legged race and egg balancing contest keeping the children busy. Barney was more cautious than most. He supplied the eggs and hard boiled them before taking them to the picnic.

A baseball game finished the afternoon. Ice cream was made during the game by the non-players and it was eaten after the game. Barney decided there would be no speeches or similar ceremony, just the prizes for the children's games. He bought cap guns for prizes. Usually the boys won all the games, but a girl won the egg balancing contest. Barney didn't know if she would want the cap gun, but she accepted it with great enthusiasm.

Fireworks, noise makers, cap guns and other disturbances created a situation that adults tried to avoid. In peacetime, it sounded like a war. This was the middle of the roaring twenties and there was more roar than the older members liked.

As he was packing his Model T, Barney reflected with Elizabeth on the events of the day. Their family had been together and enjoyed the 150th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. He remembered how the founding fathers brought forth a new nation. President Calvin Coolidge addressed the American People and spoke at great length. I believe one paragraph captures the essence of his purpose: "It is not so much, then, for the purpose of undertaking to proclaim new theories and principles that this annual celebration is maintained, but rather to reaffirm and reestablish those old theories and principles which time and the unerring logic of events have demonstrated to be sound. Amid all the clash of conflicting interests, amid all the welter of partisan politics, every American can turn for solace and consolation to the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States with the assurance and confidence that those two great charters of freedom and justice remain firm and unshaken. Whatever perils appear, whatever dangers threaten, the Nation remains secure in the knowledge that the ultimate application of the law of the land will provide an adequate defense and protection."
