THE TREASURER'S TALES JULY 2022

We have been following Barney's exploits on a month by month basis and we are now at July 1927. Barney Wells is a mythical Odd Fellow who lives in Grover's Mill, New Jersey. After writing this column and before attending the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, I will be the Official visitor for the Sovereign Grand Lodge to the Grand Lodge of New Jersey. The August column may have a bit of a change in perspective. Barney was a veteran of World War I, a tenth through twelfth grade English teacher and a farmer. He was a faithful Odd Fellow and most of his exploits had connections with the Order. All the characters and events in the story are fictional. A few of the peripheral characters are modeled after my relatives.

July 4, 1927 was Independence Day and it fell on Monday. July 1927 was a notable month in history. Yankee's slugger Babe Ruth is half way to his MLB record of 60 home runs; smacking number 30 off Joe Shaute in the 9th inning in New York's 7-0 win over Cleveland Indians at Dunn Field. On July 18, Ty Cobb achieved his 4,000th hit. On July 4, Luigina "Gina" Lollobrigida, Italian actress, photojournalist and sculptor (Trapeze, Falcon Crest), was born in Subiaco, Italy and Neil Simon, playwright, was born in New York. On July 6, Janet Leigh was born in Merced, California.

Robert Clancey had advanced to Noble Grand. Usually the Vice Grand planned the picnic for the Fourth of July. As you may recall from last year, Robert broke his leg on June 14, 1926 while repairing the town flag pole and begged off planning the 1926 picnic. Since he skipped picnic planning in 1926, the lodge thought he should plan the 1927 picnic. Bob was a teacher, like Barney. He was younger than Barney and had just finished his second year of teaching. His uncle was a major player in the Odd Fellows. He did not have a farm or other activity, so he worked as Grovers Mills town handyman in the summer. This is how he broke his leg in 1926.

George taught in the room next to Barney and was the physics and chemistry teacher. He didn't want to deviate from established custom, so he decided on a hog roast just like last year. He was in love with experimentation. Barbecue sauce was squarely on target. The pig was in the ground by 8:00 am just like last year. Honey, brown sugar, homemade tomato paste, garlic,

onions and other spices were in the mix as was common. Bob had traveled to Mexico a couple of years ago and brought back seeds for ghost peppers, which he had dried in 1926 and added to the sauce. Bob's wife, Verla, cooked the sauce but wouldn't taste it because the steam coming off the sauce burned her nose.

Bob had been a close friend of Woody (Elizabeth's brother) and was familiar with Woody's secret hobby, distilling moonshine. He visited Woody prior to the final picnic planning and had sampled enough moonshine to be a poor critic for the barbecue sauce. Bob had a two-gallon pail of sauce ready for the picnic.

Barney and Vic supervised the arrangement of the picnic tables. There was one large table reserved for the hog. The hog was on a pole for "easy" transport. The carcass weighed in at a hefty 153 pounds. The anticipated crowd was only 115 people, so there was over one pound per person. Clancey wanted to help his nephew, so he had his wife bake 15 dozen rolls (this was before women were liberated.) George Pratt made 20 gallons of homemade root beer. Elizabeth and Alice made 25 gallons of iced tea. Everyone brought a covered dish. The tables were groaning from the weight of the food.

The large table was covered with three layers of newsprint. The hog was pulled at high noon. Bob was slicing it down and giving each person a generous portion as they walked by. The barbecue sauce was positioned at the end of the table where the hog was being served.

Melchizedek had been emboldened since the last picnic and came up and took his place in line at the hog serving table. One of the girls had put a doll's dress on him and he seemed to like the attention. Barney laughed so hard he gave Melchizedek a piece of pork.

Last year we had an episode with a skunk. Vic scouted the area to make sure none of the children were doing anything with a wild animal (except for Melchizedek). The crowd became somewhat active soon after the pork was served. Those who took the barbecue sauce got a real surprise. The ghost peppers had added something to the sauce. Those who were sensitive to spicy food were reacting. Elizabeth drank a pint of root beer after eating a small piece of pork. The review was really mixed. Many people just weren't ready for a hot

barbecue sauce, while a large minority covered the pork to point where it was soupy.

Barney settled down to finish his pork, after the crowd had been served. He thought the sauce was different, he couldn't remember when it was so spicy. He was using more sauce than normal and began to think it was having an effect on him. As the day wore on, he stopped feeling his tongue and his stomach was making noises.

When Bob got around to eating, he was the last one. There was a lot of pork and most other items left. He was still feeling the effect of the moonshine he sampled earlier in the morning, so the heat from the peppers didn't affect him much.

Games followed lunch, with croquet for the ladies. Bob's wife, Verla, was still young (as was Bob) and she was in charge of keeping the children busy. Alice set up the croquet tournament. Barney and Bob each captained baseball teams.

A baseball game finished the afternoon. Ice cream was made during the game by the non-players and it was eaten after the game. Bob decided there would be no speeches or similar ceremony, just the prizes for the children's games. He bought cap guns for prizes.

Fireworks, noise makers, cap guns and other disturbances created a situation that adults tried to avoid. In peacetime, it sounded like a war. This was the middle of the roaring twenties and there was more roar than the older members liked.

As he was packing his 1922 Franklin, Bob reflected with Verla on the events of the day. He was becoming a more active Odd Fellow. His fellow teacher, Barney, was becoming a closer friend as he was the next generation. At 22, he was over ten years younger than Barney. We will be watching Bob Clancey as well as Barney over the following columns.

Tenured Member
Connoquenessing Lodge No. 278
April 30, 2022

Brother John M. Mahler, 103, of

Butler, PA, was initiated into Connoquenessing Lodge #278, Butler, on December 12, 1939, where he became a Past Grand and received his Grand Lodge Degree on October 6, 1945. He was a former Patriarch of Clement Encampment #238, Butler, having became a Past Chief Patriarch on March 23, 1943. At the time of his death, he was the oldest member of Connoquenessing Lodge #278 by age and tenure, and the oldest tenured member in Pennsylvania, having been a member for 82 years. He was also the last surviving member of the Order that was initiated in the 1930s.

He was a U.S. Air Force WWII Veteran.

He was a preceded in death by his wife, the former Edna Sarver. Surviving are three daughters, two sons, 13 grandchildren, 13 great-grandchildren and two great-grandsons.

Burial was held in Calvary Cemetery, Butler.
