

## THE TREASURER'S TALES DECEMBER 2023

We are following the tales of Barney Wells, an Odd Fellow, farmer. high school English teacher and unsung hero. The time December 1928. December is a cold month, filled with holidays and snow. School closes for the last two weeks of the month.

December 1928 marked many important events. On December 1, National League President John Heydler proposed a baseball rule change calling for a 10th man, or 'designated hitter', to bat in place of the pitcher; the NL voted in favor of proposal, but the American League turn it down. On December 11, Buenos Aires police thwart an attempt to assassinate President-elect Herbert Hoover. On December 13, the clip-on tie was invented. On December 20, Ethel Barrymore Theater opened at 243 W 47th Street, New York City. On December 26, Johnny Weissmuller (Tarzan) announced his retirement from amateur swimming.

Many famous people were born in December 1928, including December 9, Richard "Dick" Van Patten, American actor, businessman, and animal welfare advocate (Tom Bradford in 8 is Enough), was born in Queens, New York. On December 10, Dan Blocker, (American actor Cimarron City - "Tiny"; Bonanza - "Hoss"), born in DeKalb, Bowie County, Texas. On December 21, Edwin "Ed" Nelson, American actor (Peyton Place, Along Came a Spider), was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. On December 30, American rock `n' roll pioneer guitarist (Bo Diddley), born in McComb, Mississippi.

Barney had been overwhelmed by Christmas. After the tenth, his class was almost completely preoccupied. He had a terrible time discussing anything with his students. Elizabeth was busy watching three children and preparing for the holiday. She was making decorations, packaging gifts and fixing an unending list of food items. She managed to get Schuyler and Rebekah to sit down and write letters to Santa Claus, so she had some idea what to get them. As the children sat around the table by the front window, the smartest raccoon in the world was watching them. He observed that the children would write letters to Santa and then gifts appeared on Christmas morning.

After visiting his personal department store, known as a the garbage dump, Melchizedek retreated to his hollow tree and began to write a letter to Santa Claus. His requests were simple, and food oriented. He asked for nut rolls, mince meat pie and lots of cookies.

Melchizedek didn't have stamps, so he waited till Elizabeth put the children's letter n the mailbox, opened the envelope and stuck his letter in with the children's letters. Raccoons write in a distinctive scrawl that requires a great deal of practice to understand. Melchizedek figured that millions of raccoons before him had written to Santa and he had figured out the odd cursive.

As the day approached, there was a lot of activity all around town. Barney was delivering several large boxes of popcorn balls to the lodge for distribution at the last meeting before Christmas. When he brought in the last box, it didn't seem as heavy. Barney thought

the last box must have just been what was left.

Elizabeth took the letter from the mail box just before the mailman would pick it up. She was surprised there were three pieces of mail in the envelope and not two. One was written on a piece of tissue paper from a shoe box. It was a difficult cursive that Elizabeth did not understand. She showed it to Barney, but he couldn't decipher it.

December 24 was the busiest baking day of the year. Elizabeth's mother Alice and sister Mary came over to help. The two families did many things together. The porch was enclosed and the ideal place for cool storage. Elizabeth put out many nut rolls and three mince meat pies. There were hundreds of cookies left on the porch table to cool. The family went to church and returned late. The children had fallen asleep and were taken up to bed. Barney and Elizabeth shared a glass of cider and went to bed too.

In their haste to come inside, either Barney or Elizabeth had failed to lock the porch door. The small town was peaceful and no burglaries had occurred for years. Neither thought about the unlocked door. At 1:00 am, Melchizedek began to wonder if Santa had come. He scampered toward he porch and tried the door. He was quite familiar with door knobs. The door opened effortlessly. He looked around and saw the green icing on a Christmas tree, peeking out from a tea towel that covered a tray of cookies. He jumped on it in an instant.

For two hours Melchizedek feasted on pie, cookies and nut rolls. He was now a true believer. When it became hard to waddle, he curled up under a chair and fell asleep. Around 7:00 am, he heard noises in the hall upstairs. He ran out the door, leaving it open just a crack. He barely missed Barney, coming down the stairs to milk the cows.

Barney was half asleep and didn't notice the missing pastries. He yelled to Elizabeth, "We forgot to shut the outside porch door" and went off to the barn. Barney was raising more beef cattle and hogs, so he only had four cows that were fresh. After about thirty minutes, he returned to the porch, only to find Elizabeth caught between crying and laughing. The malicious marauder had eaten 18 nut rolls (they were bite size) an entire mince meat pie and an undetermined amount of cookies. Barney held her and all was laugher. They thought they had been raccooned but they weren't sure. They cleaned up the mess and gave any suspicious pastries to Warden and Conductor. A bell was put on the back door knob. Christmas was wonderful and the legend of Santa Claus gained new meaning in the raccoon community.

Next month is January 2024 and we will see our lodge heros start a program for new members.
