#### FROM THE DESK OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

Fraternal Greetings! I hope everyone had a great Holiday season and a wonderful New Year! I thought I'd share with you how me and my family rung in 2023; quite different than we expected to. Normally I write about Lodge events, but I thought this story may even compete with Barney.

On December 30th, my wife, Kate, came home from work with severe abdominal pain. She had no other issues prior to this, but was losing weight and taking supplements in order to get in better shape. I asked if she would go to urgent care, but she refused, hoping it would pass. On the morning of the 31st, she finally gave in, as the pain was too much for her. We went to urgent care and they ran some tests, only to find out she was pregnant. They told her to go to the Emergency Room to find more out. Certainly shocked at this news, we went to the ER, now finding out, with having a 13 year old at home, we're going to go through the gambit of raising a baby again. Upon arriving at the ER, they did an ultrasound and the doctor said she looked pretty far along and order a better ultrasound. I remember going with Kate to her ultrasound with Kenny, and them showing us that the "grain of rice" on the monitor was a baby. This time, the ulrasound immediately showed a beating heart, ribcage and spine. I thought to myself, that is one large grain of rice! The doctor told us she was a lot further on

than we thought and he'd see what else can be done. Kate started looking up on her phone what perhaps a fetus at 6 months would look like. The doctor came in and told us she is 36 weeks pregnant. Much to our shock and fear, he told us the baby was about 2 weeks away!

Trying to get a nursery together for a few months is a feat, let alone only 2 weeks! I said to the doctor, that's great an all, but what about the pain? He said that will come and go, and ordered her to be relieved from work until cleared by the obstatrician. They will call us on Tuesday, January 3rd, and set further tests up. So we went home, told Kenny, my parents and her parents. They were baffled as we were! As I said earlier, she was losing weight, and certainly did not look preganant. Also, with some health issues, the number one detector of preganancy, loss of a period, wasn't something that Kate missed.

I took her home, but the pain was worsening and at 8PM on New Years eve, I took her down to Allentown to the maternity ward. After being quickly looked at in the maternity ward, we were told she was in active labor and the baby was coming tonight. She had a c-section before, and we planned then to have that done again, but there was an emergent case that came in, so as soon as that was cleared up, Kate would be taken in for a c-section. Well, as smooth as our day continued,



around 11:05PM, baby Bailey decided he was sick of waiting. We were told by the doctor c-seciton was no longer an option, and the baby was coming whether we like it or not. At 11:43PM, baby Jackson Lloyd Bailey was born, measuring 19 inches and 5.1 pounds.

January 4th, I brought them home. Everyone is happy and healthy. We had about 14 hours between finding out she was pregnant and Jackson being born. To tie it in to Odd Fellowship, the calls, texts, visitors and gifts from our Brothers and Sisters was just so overwhelming. It is comforting to know you have so many extended family members at your side. Thank you to everyone who reached out! So that closes out our 2022, and I'm very anxious (and hestitant) to see what other surprises lurk around the corner for 2023! See you on the Road to Odd Fellowship.

# THE TREASURER'S TALES FEBRUARY 2023

We have been following Barney's exploits on a month by month basis and we are now at February 1928. The big thing in February is St. Valentine's Day on the 14th, followed closely by Groundhog Day on the second. February is a cold month, with snow. As much as people stay in groups to keep warm and repel the ill effects of snow and cold, so do animals.

February 1928 marked a few interesting events, On February 8, the first transatlantic TV image was received. On February 18, Sonja Henie of Norway wins the women's figure skating gold medal at the St. Moritz Winter Olympic Games. On February 20, Elroy Face, baseball pitcher (Pittsburgh Pirates) was born. On February 26, both Fats Domino and Ariel Sharon were born.

Because of snow, travel was difficult for people as well as animals. It was rare for school to be cancelled, but on February 16 and 17, school was cancelled. This didn't mean Barney could sit idly by and watch the snow. He had a number of cows, steers, pigs and chickens (as well as two outside dogs, a barn full of cats and a peculiar raccoon) to look after. In late 1927 he had gone to an auction at the stock vards and accidentally bid on a small flock of sheep, (7 ewes and a ram). He won the bid (thinking he was bidding on a pair of heifers) and was stuck with the sheep. It should be noted that a number of cats formed a bond with the sheep and it was common to see a pen with all the ewes and a half-dozen cats sleeping together on a cold night. He kept the ram in a separate pen and considered expanding his flock. He spent several hours tending to the animals before dinner (primarily milking) and made it in for dinner. After dinner he had to check on the chickens, and feed Conductor and Warden. There was a warm fire and a comfortable rocking chair waiting when he came in from the cold. He had a fair amount of wool processed and Elizabeth had knitting hats for all the children in the neighborhood.

Despite the bad weather, the local newspaper was delivered. Barney hadn't

completely read the newspaper before dinner and was anxious to complete it. He sat in the rocking chair, pulled a small wool blanket over him and began to read the newspaper. As Barney sat reading the newspaper, the burdens of the day overcame him and he drifted off into a deep sleep. Before Elizabeth noticed, he was dreaming. He had served as chaperone for the Valentine's Day Dance on February 11, and the trials of that event resonated in his head.

He was sitting on a cloud and cupids were flying by him. Elizabeth floated by on a billowing cloud. He had a vision of a punch bowl with cherubs pouring an unknown liquid into the punch. The cherubs and cupids were playing tag in air. It seemed so idyllic. A golden haired goddess brought out a large tray of cut fruit and pastries, with cherubs and cupids coming to enjoy the bounty. No sooner had the tray settled on the table than a winged raccoon came down and started to stuff oranges and cookies in his mouth as fast as he could. Barney swept down off his cloud and started to chase the raccoon with a broom. Barney stirred and briefly awakened.

Pulling the wool blanket around his neck, Barney drifted off again. He was Little Boy Blue and the sheep were in the meadow and cows were in the corn. It was spring and blew on his horn. The sheep and cattle both came to him, nudging him affectionately and acting more like pets than farm animals. Barney assumed an air of satisfaction when he was awakened by a Pomeranian jumping on his lap. The furry little dog was begging for attention and Barney gave her some attention, but drifted off again.

As he fell asleep, the wind howled outside and he was in the trenches in France. Artillery shells were bursting overhead and he was running for cover. He heard the whistle of a German officer and he knew an attack was coming. He buttressed himself against the wall of the trenches when he felt the earth shake. It was only the dog jumping off his lap.

Awakened, he thought he should check on Elizabeth and the children and finish the newspaper, but sleep overcame him before he could stir. He was the marshal of the Labor Day Parade, leading a band of over 100 Odd Fellows in Patriarch's Militant garb, about 20 on horse back. Everyone was cheering and banners stretched across the street. He passed the reviewing stand and was given a blue ribbon. As the parade wound down, he had to muster enough Odd Fellows to clean up the parade route. Mounted units required attention. The cleanup seemed to take forever, then Elizabeth shook him and he awakened.

She said, "Goodness how you have slept. You won't be able to sleep tonight."

Barney replied, "I worked so hard, I think I should go to bed now, while I can still walk."

Elizabeth commented, "You better take Rebekah (their Pomeranian) outside, she doesn't like going out in the snow and I don't want her to have an accident during the night."

Barney trudged outside and saw a glimpse of an animal behind the corn crib. Rebekah was quick because she hated the cold and wanted back inside.

Barney was escorted to bed by Elizabeth. He felt as though his time in the rocking chair was work. He drifted off to sleep in just a few minutes despite having been napping for two hours earlier. He was dreaming again. As he walked down the street on his way to Grand Lodge in Trenton, there was a beggar holding out a hat. When Barney approached, the beggar was a raccoon. His furry tail sweeping the ground. Barney reached in his pocket for a dime and then the beggar disappeared and Barney spent the remainder of the night in dreamless sleep.
