

THE TREASURER'S TALES JANUARY 2023

Winter is cold and snowy, the days are short and the night is long. In January 1928, winter in New Jersey followed this ancient pattern. The snow and cold sometimes overtake the people (and raccoons) and make life more difficult. This was true in 1928. New Years Day was on a Sunday. As we all know, months that begin on a Sunday contain a Friday the 13th.

On January 2, 1928, Stanford defeated Pittsburgh by a score of 7-6 tie in the Rose Bowl. On January 10, the Soviet Union exiled Leon Trotsky (and later murdered him in Mexico). On January 17th the first fully automatic film developing machine was patented. On January 31st Scotch Tape was introduced by the 3M Company. On January 5th Walter Mondale was born. On January 7th William Peter Blatty, author of The Exorcist was born. On January 12th Ruth Snyder became the first woman to die in the electric chair.

Because of the bad weather, the lodge called off its annual New Year's Day party and scheduled a Friday the 13th party instead. Vic was put in charge of the party and he and Alice were forced to call in their son-in-law, Barney, to help with the planning. Barney had assigned an essay on Friday the 13th to his 10th grade English classes, so he was getting background. The party had to have a theme about bad luck or superstition. Vic was a veterinarian and always had a number cats that people dropped off. He kept some in his barn and had some in a pen in his office, to offer to his clients. There would be four black cats roaming the lodge hall during the party. This would set the mood.

Barney had his students turn in their essays on the 11th, so he would have time to review the responses and incorporate some of the ideas into the party. The essays ran wild with imagination. There was a student who discussed numerology. Numerology is the belief in an occult, divine or mystical relationship among numbers and other events. The belief is that Friday the 13th is a day for bad luck. Examples of bad luck ran from stories about public events were available to read. One student noted that he was born exactly nine months after Friday the 13th and his parents were married seven months before he was born. The conclusions that student drew were unmistakable and his explanation a bit too plain. Generally the ideas from the student essays were not helpful.

Barney searched some old furniture in his barn and found a broken mirror. His research also found that putting one's clothes on inside-out was bad luck. Spilled salt is considered bad luck. Walking under a ladder is considered bad luck, but that is understandable. Some consider certified mail to bring bad luck.

Barney thought that arranging ladders, mirrors and black cats would set the mood. It was hard to keep the black cats in one place, especially when they could smell the food. Poorly sealed windows allowed the odors of food to escape to the outdoors, where marauding raccoons could be attracted.

The Rebekahs decided they would wear witches costumes to the party. Vic suggested to Alice that it would seem more like Halloween dressed as a witch. He was told the decision had already been made. The chain of command is clearly seen here.

The party would replace dinner so the menu was the same as the cancelled New Year's Eve party; pork, sauerkraut, mashed potatoes and apple pie. The cooking crew took off work for the afternoon. Barney was in school till 3:00 pm, so Vic and Clancey started the meal without him. Elizabeth and Alice were there helping and supervising. Elizabeth left her children with her sister Mary. He was familiar with this task from his experience monitoring school dances. He was also familiar with the practice of many to "spike" the punch. Prohibition kept this practice to a minimum. One of the members was a traveling salesman named lack Daniels. He had been to a sales meeting in Canada and brought back two fifths of Canadian Club. Somehow the whiskey managed to make it into the punch.

About half the members walk to lodge and the other half take cars or use horses. Grovers Mill had no streetcars that ran near the lodge hall. The garbage can sat at the back of the parking lot, where moon light would illuminate it. Because it was winter, the party took place after dark. As the members left their

vehicles to go into the lodge hall, some noted the shadow of a small creature on the garbage can. Melchizedek had learned that he needed to jump up and position his hind legs on the handle and push the lid with his front legs to pop the can open. This procedure worked over eighty percent of the time. Having been roused by the traffic, Melchizedek was forced to resort to trash cans. He noted the lodge can was nearly empty, so he waited to see what would be put in the can after the meeting. Several of the Rebekahs saw him clearly when they left their cars and were enamored. The exclamation was "how cute." A couple of the members and/or their wives, saved part of their dinner for Melchizedek. As they should have known by now, feeding a beggar does not stop him.

Most Odd Fellow festivities are organized around a meal. While eating the dinner, a band played. Vic deliberately engaged the cheapest and worst band in New Jersey. They were celebrating Friday the 13th and bad luck was the theme. A few members tried to dance to the music, but soon gave up. The music was so bad that Melchizedek did not leave his perch on the garbage can, the noise coming from the lodge hall hurt his ears. The party ended with a parade by all the members under the ladder. One of the ladies' dresses caught a corner of the ladder and brought it crashing down on the punch bowl. Half a dozen members were soaked with the remnants of the punch bowl. One of the younger Rebekahs was particularly soaked. When she arrived at home, her father, a strict minister, was highly agitated by the smell of liquor coming from her dress. She did not return to another Odd Fellow or Rebekah function for almost a year.

In addition to three or four handouts, Melchizedek waited for Barney to bring out the trash. The bones and fat from the pork roast were so attractive to Melchizedek that he trid to get in the garbage before Barney was done putting it in the can. Barney was amused, he put the bones on the ground, so they were easier to get.
