## 200th Anniversary

On the 15th of June, 1823, a special meeting of the Grand Committee of the Grand Lodge of Maryland and the United States, was held in the city of Baltimore, who, having taken this letter into consideration, passed the following resolutions, viz:

Resolved, That the charter be granted as prayed for, and the lodge rated as No. 1 of Pennsylvania.

Resolved, That a charter be granted to the Past Grands of Pennsylvania Lodge No. 1, when duly installed, as a Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, to be located in Philadelphia.

The Grand Lodge, thus authorized, was duly constituted and opened by Grand Sire Wildey, on the 27th of June, 1823 - when the following Past Grands were elected and duly installed the first Grand Officers, viz:

Most Worthy Grand Master Right Worthy Deputy Grand Master Thomas Small. Right Worthy Grand Warden Right Worthy Grand Secretary Right worthy Grand Treasurer

Aaron Nichols. Benjamin Richardson. Benjamin Daffin. Joseph Richardson.

To whom, and their fellow Past Grands, the charter so granted was delivered - and thenceforward they acted as the Grand Lodge of the I.O. of O.F. of Pennsylvania.

### Nevin W. Adams PGM/PGP/PDC

Nevin W. Adams, 87, formerly of Shoemakersville., passed away on Monday, May 8, 2023 in the Middletown Home, where he resided. He was the husband of Myra Faye (Taldo) Adams, who died September 23, 2015.

Nevin was a U.S. Air Force veteran. He was a member of St. John's (Gernant's) Church, Ontelaunee Twp. Nevin was initiated into Leesport Lodge #141 I.O.O.F. on May 12, 1970. He served on the planning board for ten years, six years as chairperson; youth committee for three years, Grand Lodge Building committee for three years, Grand Chaplain for GM Bailey, and GM Brenneman; Chairman of the Lodge Study Committee; Education and Instruction Committee for three years. He served as Grand Master for two terms: 1999-2000 & 2000-2001. He was department commander of the Department Council of PA, PM 2002-2004; Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment of PA 2004-2005, General Chairman of the 34th & 37th Unified Session, served on the Arthritis Committee since 1996, where he was treasurer from 9/96 to 4/17, Representative to Home for Orphans of Odd Fellows of PA since 2001, 9 years as treasurer, and as secretary/ treasurer since 2013. Nevin served as a representative to the Odd Fellows Home in Middletown since 1999, and as a member of the Board of Directors since 2000; 8 years as 1st Vice President; and as Secretary/Treasurer since 2013; he also served on the membership committee for nine years. Nevin also served as Grand Representative to the SGL for 3 years; as secretary of Leesport Lodge #141 for seven years; Clerk of Canton Leesport #2 for 19 years, Treasurer of the Grand Encampment of PA for 8 years, and Treasurer of the Department Council of PA for 8 years. He served as president of the International Association of Odd Fellow and Rebekah Homes Region 3. He instituted Genesis #15 Encampment when he was Grand Patriarch. He served as secretary/treasurer of the Middletown Home and also as secretary/treasurer of the Home for Orphans of PA, until June 30, 2021 when he resigned due to his health. Nevin and his wife hosted multiple exchange students from all over the world over the years with Rotary International, many of which they always considered to be their children.

Services were conducted by the members of his Lodge and burial at the convenience of the family will be in Berks County Memorial Gardens.

## THE TREASURER'S TALES JULY 2023

We are following the tales of Barney Wells, an Odd Fellow, farmer. high school English teacher and unsung hero. The time July 1928. July is a hot month, filled with picnics, road trips and lots of work on the farm. School is out for the summer and business is booming.

July 1928 marked many important events. On July 2, Jenkins Television Corporation makes the first TV broadcast over W3XK, the first TV broadcast in he US. July 3, John Baird makes the first color TV broadcast in London. July 7, first sale of machine sliced bread. July 8, Phillies set record of 25 errorless innings in a double header. July 26, Gene Tunney scores an 11-round TKO over Tom Heeney. July 29, test footage for Walt Disney's Steamboat Willie first created. July 30, George Eastman of Kodak, shows his first amateur color movie to an audience that includes Thomas Edison.

Many famous actors were born in July 1928, including Warren Oates on July5, Vince Edwards on July 6, singer and group mother Barbara Cowsill on July 12, Bob Crane on July 13, Orson Bean on July 22, and Stanley Kubrick on July 26. Famous baseball pitcher Joe Nuxhall was born on July 30; he was the youngest person to play major league baseball.

Barney had been using a Model T Ford since he started driving, even before he fought in World War I. He had six Model T's sitting around his farm, including a tractor and two pickup trucks. The trade-in value was almost nothing, the license fee was low and no one had insurance, so the cost of keeping the cars was very low. In July 1928 he decided to go modern and bought a new Model A. This put him among the most progressive citizens of Grovers Mill. There was a district meeting and picnic in Newark on Saturday, July 14.

Barney and Vic climbed in the new Model A and headed for Newark, picking up a couple other members along the way. Upon arrival at the lodge hall in Newark, they were met with a ticket taker, of sorts. The cost for the district picnic was \$0.75, the equivalent of \$13.31 today. The picnic had one pound grilled steaks, with all the expected trimmings. There was still prohibition, but apparently the lodge had a barrel of cider from the prior fall. This was interesting.

Before the picnic dinner, an informative meeting was held and the first degree was exemplified (this means that the degree was performed in all the costumed splendor, but with no candidate). Vic volunteered Barney to be the guide, a position he knew fairly well. The parts were filled with experienced past grands and not one person read his part from a ritual. It took forty minutes to present a flawless first degree. After the degree, the participants were critiqued for expression in their voices, floor movement and body language. Expectations were similar to those of a Broadway play. We have left our degree work deteriorate beyond recognition. We need to return to the ritual and practice the degrees. If the best you can show a new member is a group of men in poorly fitting, falling apart uniforms do a poor job reading from a ritual, you shouldn't wonder why they don't come back to a meeting after initiation. A break was taken before the dinner began.

Several members went outside to check the weather, smoking was popular in 1928. The members noticed that there was a strange noise coming from Barney's new car. He was told that he should check out his car. Barney and Vic ran into the parking lot and thought the spare tire on the back was going to fall off. As Barney jiggled the tire cover, out popped Melchizedek. Barney was both amused and irritated. His new car had a spot where a raccoon could rest and follow his human friends.

Barney and Vic returned to the dining hall and enjoyed a superb meal, saving the steak bones for Melchizedek. They gave the steak bones to Melchizedek and allowed him ride inside the car back to Grovers Mill.

Barney and Vic were convinced that Melchizedek was smarter than a fifth grader and capable of outsmarting the Odd Fellows. Vic wanted to put on a raccoon show. He thought that he could get Melchizedek to perform tricks by Labor Day. This is a question we may answer in a couple months.

Next month is August and we will see our lodge heros engaged in farming enterprises and repair the lodge hall.


The Rebekah Lodges numbered around 1,000. Some of the numbers, you'll also see more than once, as some of these Lodges only lasted a few years.

## YORK SPRINGS VISITS WEST VIRGINIA

On Saturday, May 13, 2023 seven members from York Springs Lodge #211 traveled to Harpers Ferry, West Virginia to help celebrate the 190th anniversary of Virginia Lodge No. 1. This lodge has an interesting history since it was chartered on May 18, 1833 when West Virginia was still a part of Virginia. A second charter was issued December 5, 1865 by the Grand Lodge of West Virginia. They were allowed to keep the name Virginia Lodge No. 1 after the split from Virginia during the Civil War. Both original charters are on display plus a silk parade banner from 1834 which had been removed by a Union Soldier during the war and taken to the state of Connecticut. It was later returned to Lodge No. 1.

Pictured is York Springs Lodge Vice Grand, Brett Otto, receiving a painted slate tile from Noble Grand Philip Folk. The tile was removed from the roof of the Virginia No. 1 Lodge and used to commemorate their anniversary. The program included a wonderful meal, recognition of community and lodge members and ended with a tour of the historical building which was originally part of the Armory complex and was purchased in 1869 from the Federal Government. Attending from York Springs Lodge #211 were brothers Brett Otto, Thomas Gordon, Harry Howe and sisters Carolyn Gordon, Stephanie Roelker, Cayle Swindler and Yolanda Howe.
