THE TREASURER'S TALES • AUGUST 2024

August is a hot month in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. In August 1929 it was a hot month. Barney continues as a tenth grade (sometimes 11 or 12 too) English teacher and a farmer. School was scheduled to start in September, so Barney did some planning for the fall semester, but his greatest efforts in August were toward farming.

In the 1929 June session, he had been appointed District Deputy Grand Patriarch. In this capacity, he was required to plan the district picnic. He booked several pavilions at Grand View Park. You can read and see pictures of Grand View Park here: http://lostamusementparks.napha.org/
Articles/NewJersey/GrandviewPark.html. I will set the perspective for 1929 in the next paragraph, then we will more fully explore the picnic.

On August 2, Philadelphia 1st baseman Don Hurst sets the National League record of 6 consecutive games with a HR in the Phillies' 2-0 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates. On August 7, New York Yankees slugger Babe Ruth ties Major League Baseball record by hitting grand slams in consecutive games for the second time in a 13-1 win v Philadelphia A's. On August 10, Grover Cleveland Alexander beats Phillies 7-1 for his 373rd and last NL win. On August 11,Babe Ruth becomes first Major League Baseball player to hit 500 home runs (this one off Willis Hudlin) in a 6-5 loss to the Indians in Cleveland. On August 29, Aviator and Author, Anne Morrow Lindbergh makes her first solo flight.

On August 7, 1929, Don Larsen, American MLB pitcher (only perfect game in World Series history, Game 5 1956; World Series MVP 1956; NY Yankees), was born in Michigan City, Indiana. On August 13, Pat Harrington Jr, American actor (Danny Thomas Show, 1 Day at a Time), born in New York City. On August 17, Francis Gary Powers, American spy captured by the USSR after his U-2 spy plane was shot down in 1959, born in Jenkins, Kentucky. On August 23, American Actress Vera Miles was born in Boise City, Oklahoma. On August 24, Yasser Arafat, Chairman of the Palestinian Liberation Organization, 1st President of the Palestinian National Authority (1994-2004) and 1994 Nobel peace prize winner, born in Cairo, Egypt.

There were a number of prominent books published in 1929, including A Farewell to Arms, by Ernest Hemingway; The Sound and the Fury by William Faulkner; and A High Wind in Jamaica by Richard Hughes. You may recall the New American Library rated the 100 best pieces of fiction in the twentieth century some time ago (see: https://thegreatestbooks.org/lists/2). There were at least three written in 1929

People always wonder about old movies. In August 1929 The Cocoanuts was released. It starred the Marx brothers and was a comedy. You can watch it on Youtube here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4wkVWiYJ2qg. This version is colorized.

Barney was well-known in local lodge circles and much was expected of the picnic at Grand View Park. This park is too far for Melchizedek to stray, so we will have to have a stand-in. I thought about a local raccoon, but I am sure this would offend Melchizedek. Stay alert, we may have a non-Odd Fellow picnic crasher. Most of the rides were ten cents. This seems quite cheap today, but ten cents in 1929 was the same as \$1.78. Still not too much for a five minute ride.

The Grand Encampment rented the picnic area, but did not supply food. The park had a decent restaurant, but most people brought baskets of things they fixed. Barney thought about a sharing arrangement with some families bringing vegetables and others bringing a protein dish. This did not prove attractive, so each family brought its own food.

Elizabeth wanted to co-ordinate her basket with her mother, Alice. Alice had four children at

home, who went to the picnic (Elizabeth and her older sister Alberta were married and out of the house). Elizabeth had three children. Barney had butchered a hog a couple weeks before the picnic, so Elizabeth baked a ham. Vic had provided services to a local dairy and he was given half a steer in return. Alice baked a large beef roast. The mother/daughter team baked for almost a week before the picnic. It was a chore to carry all the food to the picnic area. Barney would have liked to have help, since Vic was getting older and he had to carry the heavier items. As luck would have it, he didn't have to take much back to the Model A.

Before lunch, the family went to the Caterpillar ride. Virginia was too young for the Caterpillar and all three of Elizabeth's children were too young, so Elizabeth stayed back while the others all went to the ride. Some of you may think Barney should have stayed with the children. As time passed, Elizabeth thought that too. About twenty minutes after the bulk of the crowd went to the caterpillar ride, Elizabeth heard young Virginia calling "here kitty, kitty, kitty," Investigation confirmed Elizabeth's worst fears. The black "kitty" with a white stripe on its back was approaching. Elizabeth told Virginia to stop calling the cat and take the three smaller children over to the bath house area. Elizabeth then cut off a small piece of ham and began laying a trail to lure the skunk into the woods that surrounded the park. As she crossed the parking area, Elizabeth thought she had succeeded. Then brother Clancey's grandson ran out from behind a parked car and wanted to pet the kitty. The kitty did not want to be petted. Clancey's grandson and Elizabeth spent some time in the bath house, showering.

Vic and Clancey both thought the matter was amusing. Alice wasn't amused. Elizabeth wasn't amused. Barney started to laugh, but was threatened with unspeakable torture if he laughed at Elizabeth

Elizabeth sat alone at another picnic table. Barney brought food to her. The shower did a lot, but not quite enough. Young Schuyler wanted to know why his mommy smelled bad. Barney thought of several things he could say, but decided to tell him to ask his grandmother. Barney had been married long enough to know when humor would not be appreciated. Elizabeth was compelled to wear her bathing suit until she got home. Her clothes had to be burned. Look https://www.thevintagenews.com/2016/09/26/priority-spruce-girls-ladies-wearing-spruce-veneer-bathing-suits-1929-2/ for pictures of 1929 bathing suits. Nothing like today, and comfortable on a hot August afternoon. Many people in the park were similarly dressed so it wasn't too big a problem till she left for home. People looked at her after she left the park. The park maintenance people removed the skunk. Clancey made his grandson ride on the spare tire mount.

Everyone except Elizabeth had a big picnic meal. She was a little dispeptic and nibbled on celery and deviled eggs. When they got home, Young Rebekah asked her mother if she could bring a kitty in from the barn. Barney had to restrain Elizabeth from hitting her daughter. Barney told her that it would be a good idea if she went up to bed and read a book till it was time to go to sleep.

Barney knew that next year another lucky, distinguished Odd Fellow would have the duty of organizing the picnic. He knew that the rotation of District Deputy Grand Patriarch would save him for at least six years. Grand View Park closed a few years later and Barney never had the picnic planning duties again.

SULLIVAN COUNTY ODD FELLOWSHIP

Though Sullivan County no longer has any Odd Fellow Lodges, the heart of Odd Fellowship is still beating here. I was contacted earlier this year by the Sullivan County Historical Society concerning a few boxes of books that came from the Forksville Post office (former Lodge hall – pictured), and have moved from place to place until they ended up in the Sullivan County Historical Society. They called the Sovereign Grand Lodge, who eventually got them to me. The Sullivan County Historical society is about the same travel time as it is for me to get to the office, and it's a very beautiful commute, my first time getting to see Sullivan County at it's best. Sullivan county is a very small county by population, with no cities or towns, and only four boroughs, 9 townships, and many cdp's. After talking to Melanie Norton of the Historical Society, she asked if there were any Lodges left in the county. I knew there weren't but PG Fred Fiester of Brady Lodge #116 used to be a member of Sonestown. Sonestown Lodge #221 consolidated in 1960 with Hughesville Lodge #331, and Hughesville Lodge consolidated in 1985 with Brady Lodge. Not only is he the last surviving member of 221 and 331, he's the last living Odd Fellow from Sullivan County and the historical society knew him very well!

The Sullivan County Historical Society is one of the few County Historical Societies that is free admission, and run by volunteers. They had a deep knowledge of not only Sullivan County, but the Lodges that once ran the villages. I spent a couple hours getting to learn of the county, and talking to Brother Fred about his tenure in the Odd Fellows. He received his Grand Lodge Degree in Mansfield in 1959. I knew at one time Mansfield and Tioga County were hotbeds for Odd Fellowship, but now nothing remains. He actually told me where the old Sonestown Lodge was, and the picture is attached. One of the volunteers actually purchased the gavel block for Sonestown Lodge in Pottsville, and it, along with many of the Lodge ribbons, are proudly displayed in the historical society.

If anyone is looking for a fall trip, the historical society is behind the courthouse. I got there in the middle of the day, and could not find any signs of life! It is such a quiet area; I saw no businesses in the community. The county seat of Laporte, in the 2020 census, was just over 300 people. The "big city" in Sullivan County is Dushore, with 450 people. The Historical Society has published two articles about my trip, and there has been some interest. It would be so neat to get Odd Fellowship back. For more information on the county, check out the new Pennsylvania 200 year book!
