THE TREASURER'S TALES • JULY 2024

Session at Middletown will be over by the time you read this. If you were there, I probably ran into you. Hopefully you enjoyed your session and are planning on going to Sovereign Grand Lodge in Pittsburgh in August. You won't get it any closer.

We find our hero, Barney Wells at home in Grover's Mill, New Jersey for the summer of 1929. His last trip of any distance was in 1917 when he was sent to France to protect democracy around the world.

Many things happened in July 1929. On July 3, foam rubber was invented. On July 6, St. Louis Cardinals set baseball run record with 28 runs on 28 hits (28-6 v Phillies). On July 10, the Pittsburgh Pirates outhit Philadelphia Phillies, 15-9 at the Baker Bowl; 9 home runs hit, 1 in each inning - unique in Major League Baseball history. On July 24, US President Herbert Hoover proclaims the Kellogg-Briand Pact which renounces war.

There were births too. On July 2, Filipino politician and First Lady of the Philippines (1965-86) who famously collected over 1,000 pairs of shoes, born in Manila, Philippines. On July 4, Chuck Tanner, American baseball manager (World Series 1979 Pittsburgh Pirates; Chicago WS, Oakland A's, Atlanta Braves), born in New Castle, Pennsylvania (d. 2011). On July 11, Pat Cooper [Pasquale Caputo], American stand-up comedian and actor, born in Brooklyn, New York (d. 2023). On July 20, American businessman Mike Ilitch (founded Little Caesars Pizza, owner Detroit Red Wings, Tigers), born in Detroit, Michigan. On July 28, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, American First Lady (1961-63), born in Southampton, New York.

The biggest July event in Grover's Mill was the Fourth of July picnic. I have written several times about this picnic in years gone by. I generally come up with some cute story about Melchizedek disrupting the picnic. I promised myself I would do something different this July. So I will.

The Fourth of July picnic was not the only July event in Grover's Mill. Little things happened in 1929 that aren't as familiar in 2024. We were still a rural country and much had to do with farming. The last week of July 1929 was the county fair. Although there was still a good month to go in the growing season, many things were readily available for exhibit, including livestock. The fair began on Tuesday, July 30, 1929. Exhibits were marked and judging took place on July 31. The fair ran through Sunday, August 4, when everything went home.

Barney had several animals he wanted to show. He had a young steer, a heifer, a couple hogs, a beautiful rooster and cabbage, corn and a variety of other fruits and vegetables. Elizabeth made several quilts and always submitted a peach pie. She didn't submit other baked goods, since her mother Alice was the master at pies, cakes and other goodies. For those of you who have been keeping track, Elizabeth had two Pomeranian house dogs. She named one Alice

after her mother and the other Rebekah, for reasons I should not need to explain. Elizabeth thought that she would like to enter the Pomeranians in the dog show on Friday, August 2, 1929. Her father, Vic, was the judge and he thought that would be a problem for judging. Her brother John, had set a trap for Melchizedek and was going to enter him as a dog. Vic put an end to that idea very quickly.

The heart of the fair was the midway. It contained a number of concession stands, carnival rides and games of chance. As you may expect, the Odd Fellows ran one of the concession stands. Hot dogs, corn on the cob, French fries, hamburgers, homemade root beer, and pies and cakes were on the menu. It was Barney's job to pick the corn and bring it to the fair where he would husk it just before putting it in the kettle to boil. He had planted 27 acres of field corn and 6 acres of sweet corn. His mother and wife both canned corn and he sold some. The field corn was fed to the animals. Husking the corn was a big job and took a lot of time. Barney enlisted the aid of two of the younger members to husk corn while he went back to the farm to pick more corn.

Upon return to the fair, Barney was amazed at how well the new members did husking the corn. Elizabeth and her sister Mary were cooking the corn and putting it out for sale. They said they were running out of corn. Barney did not think this was possible because of the amount of corn that was husked. Barney was confused until he heard a noise from under the pile of corn husks. I told you I wouldn't have a cute raccoon story, I lied. Melchizedek and his whole family had been pilfering the husked corn as it was put in a large tub and hid in the husk pile to avoid being caught. Barney yelled almost loud enough to scare the horses on the other side of the fairgrounds. There was a race across the parking lot and into the woods. The line of raccoons was 11 long, with all Melchizedek's cousins there to help.


Despite the loss to raccoons, the fair booth made money. The Odd Fellows were able to fund a few activities in the fall. The evening of Monday, August 5, 1929, was a meal with leftovers at the lodge hall. The members who had worked the fair, 11 in total, were there to clean up the unsold food. As the chaplain was about to return thanks, he saw a face at the window in the dimming light. After blessing the food, Barney went out to see who was looking in the window. It was Melchizedek, with two of his relatives. Although a bit angry, there was too much food left from the fair. Each raccoon got an ear of corn and a hot dog (no bun).

The lodge hall was filled with joy and laughter. Everyone agreed that the fair should be an annual project of the lodge.

YORK SPRINGS LODGE #211 HONOR VETERANS



The annual Memorial Day observance sponsored by the York Springs Lions Club was supported by fourteen members of York Springs I.O.O.F Lodge #211.
