FROM THE DESK OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

As we are now into a new Term or new year of the Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges there are a few things that have come to our attention due to the fact that we are now receiving the Annual Reports of the Lodges.

Again I will remind all Lodges that when you have a member in one of our two Aged Homes under the Odd Fellow and Rebekah Program, you cannot put that person on the Non Contributing List in your Annual Report, in order to be relieved of paying the Taxes to the Grand Lodge or Rebekah Assembly. The Law requires a Lodge to keep that member in good standing, even though they are relieved of paying dues or taxes to the Lodge. For those Lodges who pay Sick Benenis, you are relieved of paying Sick Benefits to a Resident of the Homes. You are liable for the Funeral Benefits. If the Home assumes the cost of the burial, then the Funeral Benefit should be paid to the Home. If someone signs the application to assume the cost of the burial at someplace other than the Home Cemetery, then the benefit should be paid to that person or to the Funeral Director. I would also remind you that you cannot place any member of your Lodge on the Non Contributing List who has not been a member of the Order for forty (40) years or more.

Also, any Lodge desiring to have a Joint Installation, a change in meeting nights or meeting places, or an installation in the month of November or May, the Secretary of the Lodge should write the letter of request for that particular item of business, and the same should be signed by the Noble Grand and the Secretary of the Lodge with the Seal of the Lodge affixed thereto. This is not the duty of the District Deputy Grand Master or District Deputy President to write these letters.

Any and all Lodges that are planning to have Christmas Parties or some other function on the night of the regular stated meleting should write for permission to forego that particular meeting, but be sure to state the reason for the request. ALL REQUESTS FOR ANY OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED ITEMS SHOULD BE SENT TO THE GRAND LODGE OF PENNSYLVANIA FOR THE REQUESTED APPROVAL.

tivities.





The group stated that the Oddfellows organization is international and the United States contingent was started in 1819. It is based on the principles of "Friendship, Love and Truth."

The local Oneida Lodge #371 was chartered in 1848 and was originally based in Huntsville, while the Osage Lodge #712 is somewhat "younger" having been chartered in 1870. The former group has 31 members, while the latter has 80. Both lodges are involved in service projects to

provide the needy and ill with hospital beds, walkers, and wheelchairs.

The Meadows Nursing Center is a new 120 bed facility for short-term and long-term skilled and intermediate nursing care. Opened on August 31, the Center is owned and operated by Ecumenical Enterprises, Inc.—a local non-profit corporation sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church of Wilkes-Barre, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Scranton, the Jewish Federation of Greater Wilkes-Barre, and the Metropolitan Lutheran Council of Wyoming Valley.

ELYSBURG LODGE #548, I.O.O.F.

Elysburg #548, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, was chartered on November 16, 1858, and according to a copy of a lease agreement at hand the first meetings were held in the second floor room of a property owned by Ann Gulick (last occupied by Hazel Hoff, recently deceased). Access to be made through the front door and proceeding up the stairs to the second floor to the "large" room in the southwestern part of the house. The peephole, commonly used by fraternal secret societies still remains in the door to this room.

Annual rent for the use of this room to be \$15.00 to be paid on a semi-annual basis. Samuel Ent, John Hoff and S. A. Bergstresser were the trustees with 20 members' names on the charter.

In 1867 the Lodge moved into its present

This building had been used for building. some years as a private school and was known as "the Academy." The local school district used the building for many years as a high school and then later also as the vocational shop(s) due to expanding enroll-

In 1958 a 100th anniversary banquet was held with about 100 members and guests present. A number of members with over 50 years of membership were present. Two of these, Mr. Charles Woodruff and William A. Roadarmel, had been initiated on the same date and Bro. Roadarmel, in 1969, died on the 60th anniversary of the initia-

When, in 1919, a Homecoming for the veterans of World War I was planned, the grounds of #548 along with the picnic pavilion were used for the celebration until 1925 when the present Community Park became available.

For several years Elysburg #548 participated in the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth, in which selected young people were able to spend a week at the United Nations to see and participate a little in just how this organization operates. Much good has come from these visits, both to us as sponsors and to the youths also.

In recent years, Black Diamond #1092, Goodwill #310 and Shamokin Valley #527 have become a part of Elysburg #548.

As a community project, benches have been placed at Shamokin State General Hospital, Ralpho Township Community Park, Mountain View Manor (our County Aged Home) and at the Numidia Area Park.

Alt a banquet in January 1976 one veteran with 65 years, seven who had more than 55 years (another with 56 had died in December 1975), nine members had from 50 to 55 years and thirty-two with 25 to 50 years.

Develop Your Contacts

One way to develop your contacts is by knowing who they are. Make a list of your local newspapers; the daily or the weekly; TV and radio stations; and of course, remember your in-house or lodge publication or letter. Why would you expect someone else to publicize your lodge if you don't do

some yourself.

If the newspaper is in your town, be sure to call, in person or by phone, to get their requirements for publication; deadlines and any other requirements such as typing or Some of your newspaper people tend to give an independent air about what they publish. If they talk to you and give you good answers, the chance is good for publication—if the article is correctly written. We will discuss that next month. In our area local TV Cable carries ads for \$2.00 a spot. I think I may try that for an open Breakfast. This may be a novel way to push a special function, then listen for feedback from those who saw the If one or two mention it, you can bet that many have seen it. Whether they attend because of an ad is not important; the exposure to them is.

If you are pre-publishing an event open to the public, use the coming events column, and enclose a complimentary ticket. If it is to the paper, someone may stop by, and you may gain a valuable friend. Treat them kindly. If your radio station has coming events spots use it, and send them a freebee. Remember though, generally these types of advertising should be used when the event is open to the public.

Discipline is necessary to do these things, for you can't really be sure of how the media source will respond to your attempts;

but keep trying!



MILK YOUR MEMBERSHIP Morris J. Martin, Pittsburgh, Pa.

A farmer friend of mine once told me the story about a city dweller who bought the farm next to his-"good for raising children, fresh air, good food," and all the bit. This new farmer bought a cow and shortly after he bought her, the cow went dry. He thought that my friend could help him and told him the story. My friend, who ran a dairy farm, was somewhat surprised. The new farmer told him that he, too, was surprised. "I just can't understand it. If ever a person was considerate of his cow, it was me. If I didn't need any milk, I just didn't milk her. If I only needed a quart, I only took a quart." My friend then laboriously tried to explain the facts of life of milk cows. To keep milk flowing, one has to take as much as possible!

Isn't this also true of Odd Fellowship? Many members think that they are good Odd Fellows when they pay their dues on time, try to visit the lodge maybe once a month, attend all the free lodge functions and donate to most of the lodge projects. They take just as little of Odd Fellowship as they can.

However, to get the most out of our membership, we have to "milk" it. First we should attend as many meetings of our own lodge as possible. We should also visit neighboring lodges and always try to visit a lodge when we are in another area, whether it is a business or pleasure trip. It is really amazing how lodge meetings and degree work vary from area to area with all the lodges using the same ritual. We can often find good ideas to bring back to our home lodge.

We can also get more "milk" by becoming involved. If your lodge or district doesn't have a degree team, try to organize one. First there is a camaraderie in the practice sessions. Then there is the satisfaction of giving a good performance. A side benefit is that Lodges or Districts with good degree teams then to want to put them to more work by bringing in more members. It is also very rewarding to exchange degree work (and installations) with other areas or districts.

Another way to get more "milk" is to assist the Officers in visiting the sick and disabled Members. Those who cannot get around welcome a chance to talk to someone other than the members of their own family. It brings sunshine into their lives and we are the better for furnishing it.
