#### FROM THE GRAND MASTER

At the half way point of my term as Grand Master I am experiencing the bitter and the sweet. From that introduction it would appear that there are some things that are pleasing; others not. That is exactly the situation.

When you start any term you should take any job seriously, especially as the Head of a Branch of Odd Fellowship. A lot of thought is taken in appointing people to responsibilities.

When you appoint people to a task, you expect some effort in the direction of a goal. As Grand Master, you don't have the time, at least I don't, to personally set all the sub committee goals and every course of action. But, I have been available for consultation and help to get things rolling—if I am asked.

You must strive for goals, reasonable goals. Then you must work toward them. There are several reasons a goal can be beyond reach. One reason, no movement toward that end. Another reason, a responsible job on a committee can be short of expectations and hamper or destroy the whole program. Another is just an impracticable goal. For a long time I have been leary of large burdensome Committees. They usually don't function well. I still think the theory of small Committees and soliciting individuals to assist is a very practical way of functioning.

I think the most efficient number for a Committee is one; probably the most practical is three. Beyond that number things begin to happen, and should we say, not happen. I do have some definite conclusions and recommendations that I will share at a later date.

I do believe in evolution of our creations. The problem is, sometimes we shut off the process and stifle the growth and better things.

#### LINKS OF LOVE RELEASE NO. 1 PUBLIC AWARENESS

In our contacts with the public on aircraft, in air terminals and in hotels we have determined that very few people know who are the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs.

This is rather surprising as we have been performing many acts of "Service to Others" since the origin of our Order in Amer-

ica in 1819.

But we have not been ones to publicize our good works. We have been mindful of that one part of one of our degrees which advises, "Let not your right hand knoweth what the left hand doeth." But what has been the result of this attitude? The result has been that much of our good works has passed over the heads of the Public! And despite the hard work of so many of our members, we are not known! So, what do we do?

Obviously, we must keep our name before e public. We must continue to perform community services and other good works and do our best to let John Q. Public know what we are doing. We have a few sugges-

tions to bring to your attention:

(1) Wear symbols of our Order. We see many members wearing Lodge lapel buttons and jewelry at Lodge meetings but many of these same members do not wear this jewelry when attending other public meetings. We suggest this routine be reversed. Wear the Lodge jewelry when in public and if you find people expressing curiosity about the symbols, be prepared to explain them.

(2) Avoid using the abbreviations, I.O. O.F. The public does not know the meaning of these abbreviations and you hear many incorrect interpretations, such as, "100 feet" and "The Foresters," etc. Either use the full name of our organization, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows or shorten this to, The Odd Fellows Lodge.

(3) Use our 3-Link symbols in newspaper notices. A good example is a practice used years ago to a much larger extent but seldom seen any more. That is the use of the 3-link symbol in connection with obituary notices in the newspapers.

In addition to giving our Order public exposure, it also serves to provide quick identification for our own members when

scanning the newspaper.

We urge you to contact your newspapers, and funeral homes, and request them to use our symbols in connection with obituary notices relating to members of our Order. We also suggest those of our members having direct dealings with funeral homes request this service when applicable in their lives.

(4) Submit new releases to your local newspapers. It is very difficult to obtain space in the large dailies but many of the weeklies will publish your articles if they

are newsworthy to the community. Routine happenings probably will not be published but such things as the sending of delegates on the U.N. Pilgrimage for Youth and the visit of the Grand Master to your local lodge probably will be. As the Independent Order of Odd Fellows is the world leader amongst organizations providing care for the elderly; in providing educational bus tours for high school students; and in providing society with eye-care and visual research, these projects, and in particular your local lodge's contribution to these major projects cannot be emphasized too much. "By your works, you shall be known."

(5) Personal Contact. All members

should take every opportunity to talk to the public about their Lodge, its activities, its contributions to community service and in particular its efforts toward "Making this world a better place in which to live."

(6) Review our Links of Love Public Awareness Program as outlined in our joint Program and encourage your Lodge to

adopt this Program.

#### AWARDS PRESENTED AT SGL AND IARA SESSIONS IN APPRECIATION OF CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION 100F

An all time record for contributions to the Educational Foundation was set for the fiscal year 1981-1982. Total contributions were \$71,075.41. The Odd Fellows almost doubled their contributions from \$15,440.80 to \$30,539.27; the Rebekah increase is \$8,627.70 and the overall increase is \$23,-686.27. We feel the Award Program has stimulated interest and encouraged contributions to this worthy and oldest project of Sovereign Grand Lodge. The cost of the Plaques and Certificates are taken from the Expense Fund which receives its money from the Interest on Student Loans and Investments. ALL CONTRIBUTIONS ARE PLACED IN THE TRUST FUND AND USED ONLY FOR STUDENT LOANS.

Plaques were awarded to all organizations who gave \$500.00 or more, among which was our Home for Orphans of Odd Fellows of Penna., Philadelphia, who gave \$1,000.00.

In addition 71 lodges qualified for Certificates of Appreciation by giving \$100 or more and 65 lodges qualified for \$1.00 or more per member certificates.

This was the first year to present Certificates of Appreciation to Ladies Auxiliaries Patriarchs Militant and 22 qualified by giving \$1.00 or more per member. Contributions by the Ladies Auxiliaries to Cantons doubled this year with a total of \$1,459.10.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees and the students receiving financial assistance, I would like to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to the lodges and members who answered our plea for help and generously refilled our "Cookie Jar."



#### WILLIAM J. STEPHAN SOVEREIGN GRAND CONDUCTOR

William (Bill) J. Stephan was born December 3, 1927 at Jackson, Nebraska, eleventh of fourteen children. He attended school in South Sioux City, Nebraska.

After serving in the U.S. Army in the Philippines he went to Idaho to spend some time with a brother and sister and started a trucking business. During this time he met and married his wife, Jean.

They resided in Sioux City, Iowa, nine years where Bill worked as a carpenter foreman. He went into direct sales with the Grolier Society, Inc. of New York and moved his family to Denver, Colorado, in 1957. His dedication to his work, personal integrity and imitiative earned him the Achievement Award for 1958, the highest award presented by the company. He was one of twenty-three in the United States and Canada to receive this honor. leadership qualities also placed his name on the Grolier President's Club Roster. He was transferred to Seattle, Washington, in 1964 where he worked for one year before giving up his traveling job to spend more time with his family. He owned and operated a tool sales business in the Payette, Idaho, area for fifteen years before moving to Boise, Idaho.

He served as Noble Grand in 1975 and attended his first Grand Lodge session as a Representative in 1976. He was appointed Grand Color Bearer in 1977. He served as Jurisdictional Chairman of the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth for two years and greatly enjoved his duties as Tour Leader for the three week educational bus tour in July

Brother Stephan served as District Deputy Grand Master and was elected Grand Warden at the Grand Lodge Session October 1979. He began serving as Grand Master of the Jurisdiction of Idaho in October 1981 and has worked very diligently to reactivate the inactive lodges. He has devoted much of his time working on the Odd Fellows Plaza Shelter Home project in northern Idaho.

## IS YOUR LODGE KNOWN IN YOUR COMMUNITY?

We have been appointed Publicity Chairmen for the Grand Lodge in our respective areas. It is our aim to make Odd Fellowship better known in Pennsylvania, and we are asking your full cooperation in getting more news of our Odd Fellow activities before the public. To do this, we ask each Noble Grand to appoint an active member to write articles on meetings and coming activities for your local newspaper, radio and TV station.

We are now getting into the season of the greatest lodge activity. This activity in your lodge is of interest to your community and should be made known to it. Although we usually have to ask our friends and neighbors to become members, occasionally someone is impressed by the publicity of our activities and THEY ask us whether they can join in our work. You can also let other lodges know of your activities by sending articles to the PENN-SYLVANIA ODD FELLOW MAGAZINE. We can learn from each other and often can adapt what some other lodge is doing to our own needs.

Odd Fellowship should be advertised to the fullest. Where possible, each lodge should have a neat sign on the highways leading into the town, with the location of their lodge temple, day and time of meeting, and inviting members to attend. There should also be a sign at the temple to identify what it is.

Some newspapers will allow lodges to carry meeting notices, but all will use articles about special events, such as degree work, presentation of jewels, installation of officers, anniversaries, and visitations from our jurisdictional leaders. In some communities the hotels and motels will be glad to mention your lodge on their directory board with the list of local churches. Also, many of the hotels and motels have weekly or monthly magazines on their registration desk which lists the events of the week or month for the convenience of visitors to the community. Most of these also carry lists of the local churches and lodges.

These are just a few suggestions on ways to publicize Odd Fellowship. No doubt you have other ways you may be using to let the public know about your lodge activities. By working together we can make Odd Fellowship better known in Pennsylvania.

1 3-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened 1 3%-oz. pkg. instant vanilla pudding

mix

2 or 3 cups angel cake cubes (1° square) 1 13-oz. can crushed pineapple, drained

1 2-oz. pkg. dessert topping mix

In a small mixer bowl, gradually blend milk into cream cheese, beating till smooth. Add pudding, mix and beat at low speed until smooth and slightly thickened, about 2 minutes. Place angel cake cubes on bottom of 8x8x2 inch cake pan or baking dish. Put pudding over angel cubes. Spread drained pineapple over pudding. Prepare dessert topping mix according to package directions and spread over pineapple. Chill several hours. Before serving, garnish with fresh fruits, strawberries, bananas, peaches, etc. Makes 6 servings. This recipe may be doubled and put into a glass serving bowl.



#### BY-LAWS

By-laws of a lodge are the laws by which your particular lodge operates and should contain laws which are not part of our higher laws of our Order. They should be studied well so they contain all laws you would require to take care of the various situations which may cause disagreement within the lodge.

As the Ritual, Code of Laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge and the Code of Laws of the Grand Lodge of Penna. in that order are the laws by which all Odd Fellow Lodges must abide, they should be consulted first to see if we already have a law which takes care of your situation.

To make this article as brief as possible I will use the words (Green Book) when designating the Sovereign Grand Lodge Code of Laws and (Blue Book) when talking about our Code of Laws of the Grand Lodge of Penna.

What I am suggesting here are general thoughts and may be more or less as desired by your lodge.

Several years ago the Board of Grand Lodge Officers found that very few lodges within our jurisdiction had an up-to-date set of by-laws on file in our Grand Lodge Office. A suggested form was sent out to all Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges. This form I am sure was not intended as a form to be filled out and returned to the Grand Lodge By-Law Committee as the by-laws of your lodge. This was done by some lodges and was returned by the By-Law Committee for additions and corrections.

Your by-laws should contain numbered articles, for example. Article I and under that heading the general topic you wish to have included, and sub-sections as needed.

The by-laws must not contain any of the provisions of the higher laws of our Order (See Blue Book page 7) and the instructions given to the Grand Lodge By-Law Committee on page 34 of our Blue Book.

The by-laws should contain in the first article on meetings, the place, night of meetings, as well as the time of your meeting. Give the exact place, not just the name of your town. Give the exact address as well as the date of your meetings.

As the number of members who must be present to conduct business is spelled out in our Blue Book, this should not be a part of your by-laws (See Blue Book page 53 Sec. 2). Five of your own members constitute a quorum.

Many of our lodges include a section or article where they spell out what is to be done if the Noble Grand and Vice Grand are absent. Some say the Junior Past Grand shall preside.

One of the most important articles is the articles on Fees and Dues. As the solvency of your lodge depends upon this section much thought should go into this. The

minimum amount which you may charge for admission into an Odd Fellow Lodge is \$25.00. This amount is spelled out in the Sovereign Grand Lodge Code (Green Book) Chapter XXII Section 1 (C)-1. In addition to the above there must be added \$1.00 for the Aged Home and Improvement Fund. This amount was changed at the 1981 Grand Lodge Session and will be \$2.50 when approved by Sovereign Grand Lodge. The original amount of \$25.00 is the minimum amount and may be more and may be on a graduated scale according to age as you so desire. (See page 56 of our Blue Book.)

This article should have a section on admissions by the various cards. (See page 56 Article VII of Blue Book.)

As dues are an important part of our existence much thought must go into the section on dues. The dues which we are compelled to charge is spelled out in our Blue Book, this should be consulted first. See pages 59 and 60 Article XI. For your information, at the present time the taxes and assessments are, Per Capita Tax of \$3.80 per term or \$7.60 per year, the Aged Home Tax is \$2.50 per term or \$5.00 per year. There is also a Sovereign Grand Lodge Tax of \$.50 per iterm or \$1.00 per year.

Remember to include in the section on dues the amount you may add or charge Beneficial Members for Weekly and/or Death Benefits. You may also want to include a sentence on the payment of a death benefit to a member on the death of a wife and if it will be paid more than once.

As the full amount of Initiation Fee must accompany the application, this should not be a part of your by-laws. See Green Book Article XXII Section 1 C-1(b).

On your article on benefits, the various benefits should be spelled out in the finest detail so there will be no disagreement later. See page 61 of Blue Book as guide.

The entire subject of Elections, Nominations, Terms of Officers and their duties is explained in our Ritual and on page 53 of our Blue Book. This should not be included in your by-laws. Be sure to include a section on the election of Trustees, and their terms. You should also include a section on the election of the Secretary, and if both the Recording Secretary and the Financial Secretary is to be performed by one person.

An article on committees should be included. There are several committees mentioned in our Blue Book (Article V page 55). This section should be looked over as you prepare your laws on committees. You may also, if you so care to, mention how the committees are appointed. Some lodges say the Noble Grand will appoint the majority and the Vice Grand the minority of the members of committees.

There should also be an article on how

your by-laws shall be amended, so that a simple majority can railroad something through without the membership being notified. I would suggest that any proposed changes be read in lodge two meetings before the night of final vote and the membership be notified at least two weeks before the final vote.

In your article on compensation, the amount you will be providing your various officers and how it will be paid is needed. You also should include in this section the amount you provide your Representative to Grand Lodge and the Representative to the

Aged Home.

The last and final thing that must be included in all by-laws submitted is the vote of the lodge, date voted upon, signature of the Noble Grand, and Secretary; also two copies must be submitted with the seal of the lodge on both copies (No Zerox copies

of seals).

I realize that in an article such as this there are many things I may have missed, but if your lodge would obtain (if you do not already have one) a copy of the Sovereign Grand Lodge Code of Laws, and a copy of our Penna. Grand Lodge Code of Laws and as you make up your by-laws refer to these books, section by section. I am sure all lodges would have a fine set of by-laws which the Grand Lodge By-Law Committee would approve without delay.

#### PUMPKIN PIE

#### PEPPER BEEF

2 Tbs. fat or oil; one pound of round or flank steak cut into one eighth-inch thick slices (I use slices from a 2½ or 3½ lb. arm roast saving the bone for soup stock.) I tsp. salt; pepper to taste; 2-3 tbs. minced onion; one cup beef stock (If you don't have beef stock, one cup beef bouillon); 2 large green peppers (cut on diagonal, making ¾ to one inch long); 2 tbs. corn starch; 2 tbs. soy sauce (Use a GOOD soy sauce); ½ cup water and boiled rice.

Brown the meat in the fat in a heavy skillet with salt, pepper and garlic. Cook over moderately hot heat, stirring constantly, until meat is browned. Add the beef stock or bouillon and green peppers. Cook over low heat 10 minutes. This should be covered closely. Blend together corn starch, soy sauce and water and add to skillet and cook 3-4 minutes longer, stirring mixture until it is hot and sauce is thickened. Serve at once over hot boiled rice. Use 1 lb. of meat and this mixture will serve four. Use nothing but fresh firm peppers.

Boiling Rice: Ancient Chinese secret, for nice, fluffy rice. To the salted, boiling water add about 1½ tbs. of vinegar and when rice is cooked, just drain. All the heavy starch will drain right away. (I honestly don't believe this trick is limited to Chinese cooks only, as I have been using it for 35 years and have never had gooev. gummy rice.)
