#### JOSEPH NELSON. EX-INSURANCE EXEC

Joseph Nelson, formerly of 138 Shenango St., Sharpsville, retired national president of the former Protected Home Circle Fraternal Life Insurance Society, died on Sunday, May 8, 1983 in John XXIII Home for Senior Citizens, 2250 Shenango Valley Freeway, Hermitage, after a short illness. He was 89.

Mr. Nelson was born in Stoneboro, Oct. 1, 1893, to Archibald and Mary Jane Wat-

son Nelson.

He received his education in Sharpsville

schools and Westminster College.

For a time he was employed at Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co., Struthers, Ohio. In 1927 he joined the P.H.C. Home office in Sharon in charge of the statistical department, then in 1938 was named an assistant secretary and later became secre-

He was appointed to the board of directors in 1951 and assumed the presidency Dec. 1, 1959.

During his administration with the PHC. now Protected Home Mutual Life Insurance Co., Sharon, the society observed its Diamond Jubilee. It completed installation of the direct billing system, adopted a new and more modern standard table of mortality, acquired by merger the Ancient Order of United Workmen of West Virginia and made a decision to propose conversion from a fraternal life insurance to a mutual life insurance company.

He retired in October 1963.

Mr. Nelson was a member of First Baptist Church, Sharpsville; Free and Accepted Masons, Lodge 668, Sharon; New Castle Consistory; American Legion Post 162 and Adoniram Lodge of Odd Fellows, both of Sharpsville, and a former member of Sharpsville Service Club.

He was named a director of McDowell

National Bank in 1954.

During World War I, he served as a medical detachment sergeant in the Army.

His wife, the former Frances Mehl, whom he married Aug. 29, 1923, died July 1, 1981. Surviving are a son, John A., Greenville, and four grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a grandson

and a brother.

#### CUSSEWAGO LODGE NO. 108

In the early spring of 1845, James A. Mackey, Wilmot Bartle, C. A. Hosmer, Monroe Atkinson and Asa Forsythe, members of Mahoning Lodge of Warren, Ohio, met in a room in the rear part of the Central Hotel at the NE corner of Water and Center streets for the purpose of founding an Odd Fellows Lodge in Meadville. An application having been made to the G.L. of Pa., a charter was granted for the establishment of Cussewago Lodge on April

21, 1845.

the Lodge.

The Lodge was instituted in the Lyon block where now stands the Merchants National Bank building at the SW corner of Water and Chestnut Streets by G.M. John Perry, who installed the following officers: N.G., James A. Mackey; V.G., Wilmot Bartle; Sec'y, C. A. Hosmer; Asst. Sec'y, Monroe Atkinson; and Treasurer, Asa Forsythe. After the installation Dr. A. P. Coyell, Simeon D. Reynolds, James M. Sample, F. W. Kirby and James D. Gill were initiated into and became members of

During the week of Jan. 4 to 11, 1847, fire destroyed the Cussewago Lodge Hall, all furniture and regalia, and most of the paraphernalia. The charter however, was rescued and is still in possession of the Lodge. The "scene" was also rescued from the fire. It was this heroic act that inspired Robert Adrian to compose the song, "The Rescuing Of The Scene," a song very popular at that time. Meetings of the Lodge after the fire were held in temporary quarters fitted up by Mr. Sherwood in what was then known as the Sherman House, now the New Gable House on South Water Street.

On April 1, 1848, the new hall, on the 3rd floor of the Otterstatter block at NW corner of Water and Chestnut Streets where the Savoy Hotel now stands, was dedicated. H. L. Richmond delivered the address of the day, which was followed by a banquet in the evening at the American Hotel located on present site of Lafayette Hotel. It was in this hall Feb. 16, 1857, the Lodge first used gas for lighting.

On April 1, 1860, the Lodge moved to the 3rd floor of the new Carr block at 943 Water Street where it remained until April 1, 1878, when it moved to the Derrickson block on Chestnut Street opposite the post office for a stay of 9 years, until April 1, 1887, when it moved to the 3rd floor of Phoenix block at SE corner of Water and Chestnut Streets.

The Lodge, through the efforts of P.G. James M. Dunbar, succeeded in purchasing First Baptist Church building at 253 Center Street Feb. 2, 1903. The remodeled and redecorated building named Cussewago Temple, the present site of meetings, was dedicated to the principles of F L T by

acting G.M., James M. Dunbar, assisted by W. C. Hendry, N.G., Rev. F. L. Kerr, Chaplain, G. W. Houser, Marshal, Frank Breokiron, Warden, and the following heralds: East, A. W. Morrison; West, William Green; North, L. H. Lauderbaugh; and South, Charles Schmidt.

Cussewago Lodge, familiarly known as the Mother Lodge of Crawford County, was for a number of years the only secret society in Meadville to own its hall and the only Lodge in Crawford so installed prior to 1860 that did not surrender its charter during the Civil War, a conflict to which Cussewago Lodge sent 21 of its members.

During Mar., 1851, a meeting was called for the purpose of instituting an Odd Fellows Home in Meadville. Cussewago agreeing to purchase a site or pay the equivalent in cash. The cash payment of \$2500.00 was made by Cussewago Lodge Nov. 19, 1872, to Home Association.

The Lodge is now (1937) in a flourishing

condition and has a membership of 285. Saegertown 1011 and Guys Mills 1056 surrendered their charters and united with Cussewago 108 Dec. 14, 1935 and Oct. 2, 1937 respectively.

Elected officers for term ending Mar. 31, 1938: N.G., Frank Prather; V.G., Francis Forbes; R. S. Harrison Trask; F.S., Charles Roschi; and Treasurer, Milton Neuroh.

#### SCANDINAVIAN NOTES

By Vilmer Rasmussen, Nr. Aaby, Denmark The Odd Fellow Bladet, official organ of the Grand Lodge of Denmark, is celebrating a full century of publication. The first issue was Dec. 8, 1882, at the subscription price which equaled one cent in American money. The Grand Lodge took over in 1894 and mails it to every Odd Fellow and Rebekah in Denmark twice a month.

The International IOOF Youth Exchange committee met in Lerum, Sweden, March 25-27 to deal with the placing of 106 applicants, according to Jens Rasmussen, P.G.P., Denmark. Committee members were there from California, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Denmark, Germany and Holland. Switzerland is joining the program this year and negotiations are going on with Australia. Esther Ladies Encampment Auxiliary

No. 3 will be instituted Sept. 8, 1983, at Odense, Denmark.

Preben O. Rasmussen, Grand Sire of Denmark, presented the annual Odd Fellow Research Grant of \$25,000 to Dr. Jens Rehfeld, at the Odd Fellow Temple, in Odense, on April 23. Dr. Rehfeld is renowned for his studies of the influence of the hormones Gastrin and Cholecystokinin in the treatment of diabetes. Dr. Rehfeld, in his acceptance speech, anticipated that his work will lead to a better understanding of the functions of the nervous system in the human body. In attendance at the ceremony were more than 120 Odd Fellows and their guests. Special guests were James W. Dunn, General Commanding of the Patriarchs Militant and his wife, Mildred. General Dunn also paid an official visiltation on the previous evening with the two Danish Cantons, at a joint

meeting of Excelsior and Defence Cantons.

The Odd Fellows of Finland have donated a \$25,000 specular microscope to the Ophthalmology Department of the University of Helsingfors, headed by Professor Salme Vannas. The presentation was made by P.G. Per-Eric Hormstrom in the presence of the designer of the microscope, Professor Charles J. Koestler. Prof. Koestler demonstrated the equipment and Prof. Vannas was very enthusiastic about the future use of the microscope and thanked the Odd Fellows for fulfilling her yearlong dream of obtaining the instrument. She described the instrument as a strong concentrated light beam and a split-second camera. It will be used for detecting corneal and other eye diseases before and after treatments and surgery. M. J. 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#### HISTORY

The I.O.O.F. was established in the U.S. April 26, 1819 and the first prominent Lodge in Reading was instituted in 1839; from that time forth the growth of the Order has been steady, both in the city and the country. In 1849 there were 1613 members, and increased to 1707 in 1855.

The condition of the Order in the country the first of October, 1884, is shown in the following list.

The nine Lodges in the city had 1725 members and the outside Lodges had 648 members.

The above Lodges have assets amounting to \$70,700 for the care of the sick and the burial of the dead. The assets of the Lodges in the city are nearly \$41,000, and its Lodges are carried on at an expense of a little more than \$15,000 per year.

The Odd Fellows Mutual Life Insurance Association of Berks County was organized on December 1st, 1869, and has been fairly prosperous; offices are in Reading.

History of Berks County in Pennsylvania by Morton Montgomery, member of the Berks County Bar, published by Everts, Peck & Richards in 1886.

The Historical Society of Berks County takes pleasure and pride in making available, as of Dec., 1975, to all persons interested in Berks County, historical facsimile reprint of Morton L. Montgomery History of Berks County in Penna. Our society offers this work as its principal contribution to the Bicentennial of the U.S. First printed in 1882.

Special recognition is given to Dr. William W. Hummel, Professor of History at Albright College.

#### SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE HON, SCHUYLER COLFAX

Schuyler Colfax (1823-1885), of Indiana, was Speaker of the 38th, 39th and 40th Congresses and Vice President of the United States. A Newspaperman and Legislative Correspondent, he acquired part interest in a South Bend Newspaper which became the Whig Organ in that area. He was a Delegate to two Whig National Conventions and was the unsuccessful Congressional Candidate of that party for the 32nd Congress. In 1854, the Whigs, American Party and other minor groups united under the banner of the newly formed Republican Party and elected their first members of Congress. Colfax was one of these Republicans elected to the 34th and six succeeding Congresses, and served until he resigned to become Vice President in Grant's first term. He thus became the first to preside over the two Houses of Congress.

When he left office in 1872, he declined the Chief Editorship of the New York Tribune. Although fully exonerated from charges of corruption with the Credit Mobilizer of American Affairs, he was politically ruined, and devoted his remaining years to lecturing. Colfax was initiated in Lebanon Lodge No. 7, F. & A.M. of Washington, D.C., on August 15, 1856 and received the other two Degrees in St. Joseph Lodge No. 45, of South Bend, Indiana.

Theodore Medad Pomeroy (1824-1905), of New York, has the distinction of serving for the shortest period as Speaker. Schuyler Colfax resigned on the last day of the 40th Congress, having been elected Vice President, and Pomeroy was chosen to serve for the balance of the day. Although he is not known to be a member, his father, Rev. Medad Pomeroy, was a member of Scipio Lodge No. 58, of Aurora, N.Y.

Brother James Nance Garner was the other Speaker of both Houses of Congress, and served as Vice President during the first two terms with President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and was a member of Odd Fellows and Masonry, along with President Roosevelt, also a member of both Fraternities.



#### PETER FRITZ LODGE No. 486

Peter Fritz Lodge, Pittsburgh, held an educational evening on May 18, on the work of the Odd Fellow Eye Research Foundation. Van Stragand told the large audience of members and guests of the importance of obtaining eyes from donors, how they are enucleated and then used to give sight to the blind. He was pleased to be able to report that for the month of April, the Medical Eye Bank of Western Pennsylvania set a record of obtaining 31 eyes for corneal transplants. Bro. Stragand is the chairman of the Jurisdictional eye foundation and is also the president of the Medical Eye Bank which also has three other Odd Fellow representatives on the Board of Directors.

Bro. Stragand reported that Baltimore and Houston hospitals are performing many more eye transplants than the hospitals in other large cities because their states permit the coroners to furnish eyes from the unknown people who are brought in. A similar law has been proposed for Pennsylvania but has never been able to get legislative approval, and until such a law can be passed, the ophthalmologists in this state have long waiting lists of patients waiting for corneas to be available. However, there is a network between the country's eye banks where corneas are made available immediately for emergency situations.

He told the audience that the Odd Fellow Foundation works to try to obtain donor eyes and has also supported research in the eye hospitals by donating valuable and expensive equipment and fellowships for researchers. Modern micro tools and advances in microscopes and enlargers have helped the ophthalmologists in performing eye operations they could not perform with the previous normal hospital equipment.

Harry E. Martin, Lodge secretary, was the chairman of the evening and invited the audience to a nice luncheon after the M. J. M. talk.
