TO ALL ODD FELLOW AND REBEKAH LODGES:

GREETINGS:

Due to the fact that recently the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs in Falls Creek lost everything they had due to a fire at the Lodge Hall, I am writing to advise all Lodges in this Jurisdiction to take some precautionary steps.

It would be advisable for every Lodge to make a listing from their Lodge Charter of all the names of the Charter Members of that Lodge as well as the names and titles of the Officers of the Grand Lodge who signed the Charter.

The date that the Charter was issued is another very important item and should also be noted.

When this has been accomplished, this important paper or papers should then be placed in a Safe Deposit Box or some fire-proof place for safe keeping.

If a Charter is destroyed by fire, flood, or some other disastrous event, a new Charter can be issued by this Office. However, there is no record in the Grand Lodge Office as to who the Charter Members are for every Odd Fellow or Rebekah Lodge in this Jurisdiction.

I would recommend that all Lodges send to the Grand Lodge or Rebekah Assembly the date of Institution or the date that the Charter was issued as well as the names of the Charter Members so that a file can be kept in the Grand Lodge and Rebekah Assembly of the same, especially if a Lodge does not have a Safe Deposit Box.

Please consider this matter very carefully and use your discretion on the matter.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

GRAND MASTER'S MESSAGE

I realize the task that lies ahead and expect to give it my best effort. As I see it, that task is to help strengthen the chain of Odd Fellowship and I will certainly need and expect your help to accomplish that feat. Previous G.M.'s have begun work in this area and it must be continued. Regardless of the type of organization, the chain is only as strong as its weakest link. In Odd Fellowship, we consider three (3) links—Friendship, Love and Truth—as its strength. Of course, we must all maintain these virtues in all our transgressions but we want to embrace the organizational chain of our Jurisdiction at this time. The primary link or foundation in the Order is the Odd Fellow Lodge. This must be strengthened by holding regular, interesting meetings while observing the rules and regulations of the Order, maintain a heavy schedule of both activities and projects, then keep the members well-informed. This basis will then provide enough interest to Retain or Reclaim present members as well as recruit new members of a caliber that will insure that the principles and beliefs of the Order will be perpetuated, its aims fulfilled, as well as programs or projects for humanity continued.

A primary technique for recruiting by a Lodge drawing from a large area is oneon-one or personal contact. With this method, an individual must be alert in all associations with friends, relatives, church members, business associates, professional contacts, etc. for suitable, prospective members. It has been said: "The greatest gift a man can give another is a good example." Lodges drawing from communities, small areas and districts should develop projects for the mutual benefit of, or in conjunction with the community, church groups, etc., which results in recognition of the Lodges and the Order. Recognition of the Order will develop interest and po-tential for prospective members. Such projects should be in sponsorship or support for youth interests — the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth Program, Junior Lodges, or Theta Rho Groups, Church, School, 4-H or Community-related youth groups. Such activity and interest will provide a broad base of talented youth from which to draw for the rebuilding and strengthening of Lodges, as well as the Order. We know this program works well in our Lodge!

The final link of the jurisdictional chain is the Lodge Representative to the Grand Lodge. Choose him carefully to reflect the views and interests of your Lodge. Send him to all the Grand Lodge Sessions to participate, to help fortify the rules and regulations of the Order and report back to keep the members well informed. Such dedication must help strengthen the Order.

Your pledge to help strengthen the organizational chain as outlined in conjunction with our pledge to continue to support the Sovereign Grand Lodge programs, to continue the programs of prior Grand Masters, such as recognizing new members, recognizing Lodges and District regrouping or revitalizing and participation with the various branches working in unity, then we cannot help but eventually achieve our ultimate goal—that of strengthening Odd Fellowship!



ONE MILLION DOLLARS GIVEN TO HOPKINS BY ODD FELLOW WORLD EYE BANK

A \$1 million-dollar grant from the Odd Fellow World Eye Bank and Visual Research Foundation recently was presented to the Johns Hopkins University for continuation of the Odd Fellow ocular research chair endowment.

The endowment at The Wilmer Eye Institute supports the research of the Odd Fellow Professor of Ophthalmic Immunology, Arthur M. Silverstein, Ph.D. Created in 1963 by a 25-year, \$625,000 renewable grant, the endowment was increased to \$1 million through a recently completed Odd Fellow fund drive. Contributions were made by Odd Fellows and Rebekahs throughout the world.

Dr. Silverstein currently is studying the mechanism and treatment of uveitis, an irreversible allergic eye disease that is the third leading cause of blindness in the United States. He also is studying improved methods of diagnosing and preventing the rejection of corneal transplants.

This fall, Dr. Silverstein will lecture on his research before the Chinese Ophthalmology Society in Peking and Shanghai, China and before a group of medical schools in Tokyo, Sapporo, and Nagoya,

Japan.

Dr. Silverstein's national and international honors include the Friedenwald Award of the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology and the Oxford Ophthalmology Congress's Doyne Medal.

1 cup sugar

½ cup shortening

1 egg

½ cup sweet milk

tsp. vanilla 3½ cups flour

1 tsp. soda

tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. salt

Cream the sugar and shortening. beaten eggs and milk. Into this mixture sift the flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add vanilla and mix well. Chill for several hours. Roll out on floured board until thin and cut with round cookie cutter. Drop a teaspoonful of the following filling on half of the rounds. Top with another cookie, pressing firmly together at edges. Bake in a 350 degree oven for about 15 minutes. Yield: about 3 dozen.

COOKIE FILLING

1 cup raisins, ½ cup sugar, ½ cup water, 1 tablespoon flour. Mix these ingredients and cook until thick but be sure to stir to prevent burning. Cool before putting on cookies. (Dates or other dried fruits may be used with the raisins.)

Hospital personnel can now communicate with each other over the telephone lines. The Hospital recently purchased two teletypewriters (TTY) which use the phone lines to receive and transmit typewritten messages.

One TTY is permanently installed in Chestnut Hill's Emergency Department to take incoming calls from deaf people. The second TTY is portable and is available to deaf inpatients. The machines print out both questions and answers.

Chestnut Hill Hospital is the first hospital in the Philadelphia area to have a portable TTY for inpatient use. The cost of both machines was paid for by a generous \$2600 donation from the Perseverance Encampment #135 Independent Order of Odd Fellows. LAW-ABIDING PIRATES must pay tax

on their booty, the judge said.

Ye Mystic Krewe of Gasparilla, a long-exempt Tampa social club named for a pirate, owns a replica of an 18th century ship and stages an annual mock capture of the city and a parade that attract over 500,000 spectators. Dues provide most club revenue; but in three years when its "invasion" costs averaged nearly \$52,000, it got average income of nearly \$10,000 from selling concessions for seating, food, and an "official logbook" to defray expenses.

The Krewe considered this tax-exempt income; but the IRS called it taxable unrelated-business income, and Tax Court Judge Simpson agreed: Tax is intended to fall on any social-club income derived from non-members, so that untaxed income does not subsidize member activities. To be taxable, he added, the income needn't be from a business "regularly carried on."

Further, the judge held, the "invasion" costs weren't "directly connected" with producing the concession receipts and can't be deducted from them in figuring the tax-

able income.
