CLOVER LODGE No. 348 U. N. DELEGATE HONORED

Following a recent lodge meeting of Clover Lodge No. 348, of Ambridge, Pa., Miss Tricia Renee Hetrick was honored as the United Nations Pilgrimage delegate for the Lodge in July of 1983. She is the daughter of Mrs. Kathleen Wiseman and the late Clarence E. Wiseman, of New Brighton, and the granddaughter of Brother Thomas J. Slingluff, a member of Clover Lodge No. 348. Tricia Renee is a Junior in the New Brighton School District. She is active in the Tri High Y.G.A.A. Girls Athletic Association, and the Usher Club. The program for this evening was arranged by Douglas J. Knouse and James W. Crowe, G.P. Brother Knouse welcomed all the brothers, their wives and families, and several others who were delegates to the United Nations Pilgrimage from Clover Lodge No. 348 in the past. Then he formally introduced Miss Tricia Renee Hetrick who presented her program.

She was taken to Harrisburg, Pa., by James H. Logan where she met the other delegates that would accompany her on this year's Tour. James W. Crowe, GP, was "Pop" and Assistant Tour Director, along with Elaine Hollerich, "Mom," the Tour Director, for the Jurisdiction of Pennsylvania. They stayed at a motel in the Harrisburg area overnight, and the following morning after a send-off breakfast, boarded the bus and headed on their journey. This was the 34th Annual United Nations Pilgrimage Tour for Youth, sponsored by the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. All the delegates are taken on a tour during the first week, which takes them through Ontario and several New England states. Some of the sights along the route were the International House where they had dinner and were entertained and learned how the International House functions. Lunch was served to all the delegates by Citizens Lodge No. 309 in Attica, N.Y., and supper in Welland, Ontario. They were taken on a tour of Attica State Prison, and also took a tour of the Welland Canal and observed the large boats passing through the locks at St. Catharines, Ontario. They were served dinner and were entertained by members of Empire Lodge No. 87 and Em-press Rebekah Lodge No. 87, of St. Cath-arines. A tour was taken of the Niagara Falls, American and Canadian Falls. Then dinner in the Skylon Pavilion, and overnight at the Lundy Lang Motel, where they were able to get some swimming in. Breakfast at the Yer Old Barn Restaurant, and then they visited the Car Museum in Oshawa, and also Fort Henry. They took a boat ride and viewed the Thousand Islands, and lodged at Davis Motel. They had a picnic on the St. Lawrence River. Breakfast

was served by members at Friendship Hall by Amity Lodge No. 80.

In Ottawa, Ontario, they toured the Parliament buildings and saw the changing of the guards, a very impressive ceremony. Then lunch was had at Butler Motor Inn, and they passed through Montreal and through customs. Dinner in Newport, Vermont by Wide Awake Rebekah Lodge No. 68. Lodging at Littleton, New Hampshire, at County Square Motel. Breakfast served by Helen L. Fisher Rebekah Lodge. One hour tour of Man in Mountain, New Hampshire. Then on to Nashua, N.H., and lunch served by Granite Lodge No. 1. Toured the oldest building, and viewed the beautiful paintings, sightseeing Concord, Mass., the Battlefields, Minutemen, and went to Lexington and had a guided tour of the battlegrounds there. Dinner in Peabody, Mass., at the I.O.O.F. Hall. A tour was taken around Peabody, and they viewed the Old Witches House, House of Seven Gables, and the Gallows where they used to hang the witches. There is a water tower on this site.

The tour continued to Marblehead Bay. and lodging at the Townline Motel in Brookville, Mass., and they toured Boston and Bunker Hill, and saw the Old North Church where Paul Revere hung the lanterns to signal the troops. Also toured the U.S.S. Constitution in the Bay at Boston. Then lunch at South Weymouth, Mass., at the I.O.O.F. Hall. We saw the famous Plymouth Rock, and took a boat ride there in Plymouth, Mass. Had dinner in the evening, followed by a party honoring one of the delegates on the tour. Breakfast in Waterbury, Conn., at the I.O.O.F. Hall. Toured Mill Plain Union Church there. Various Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges served lunches and other meals to all the delegates along their route. Traveling is all done by buses from July 20th to the 29th, when they arrived back in Harrisburg. The entire trip covers ten days, and is 1651 miles. About five days are spent in New York City. In New York the delegates visit the U.N. every day after breakfast, and also had the opportunity to dine in the U.N. Delegates dining room, at the United Nations. First we receive daily briefings at the United Nations prior to touring the United Nations Building, and visiting and talking to the different Delegates from member nations of the United Nations, and observing the General Assembly in session. The only part of the United Nations that we were not permitted to tour was the Secretariat. We visited the Riverside Church and Grant's Tomb. Students are selected from 19 nations for the International House. They also took us on a boat ride around Manhattan Island, a show at Radio City Music Hall, with the famous "Rockettes" and movies, the Tameraid See, and had

dinner, and saw a Broadway play. Toured Vanderbilt Mansion, the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Estate, Greenwich Village, and Chinatown, and the Empire State Building, and the Statue of Liberty.

Delegates have the opportunity to study and observe the United Nations in session, and to see Committees and Commissions at work in the five official U.N. languages, and learn of the vast work done throughout the world by such U.N. Departments and Agencies as WHO, UNESCO, FAO Technical Assistance. They visit the U.N. and the Headquarters of the United States, Canadian Mission to the U.N., as well as briefings by other member nations.

The United Nations means Peace. Where would we all be without the United Nations? It means new friends and places and ideas. Also, everyone should be proud of the United Nations, and this organization is doing a very wonderful job of preserving peace in every way possible in this troubled world of ours. Some pictures and other circulars pertaining to the United Nations were available for everyone to peruse. Every delegate is presented a group picture of everyone who was on this Pilgrimage Tour. She was presented a U.N. Delegate pin, which is presented only to the delegates who have taken the United Nations Pilgrimage, and to the Tour Director and Assistant Tour Directors. Also Tricia Renee was presented a beautiful inscribed certificate which is presented to each U.N. delegate by the chairman of The Clover Lodge U.N. Pilgrimage Committee and also the Jurisdictional Chairman of United Nations Pilgrimage for the Grand Lodge, of Pennsylvania, James W. Crowe, Grand Patriarch.

Tricia answered questions posed to her by those in attendance. Also present were: James Logan, Delegate in 1974, Douglas J. Knouse 1981, Larry D. Knouse, Jr. 1982, Patricia Drab, 1969, who offered some very fine remarks about her tour in 1969, and along with other delegates present encouraged the members of Clover Lodge No. 348 to continue this wonderful program for youth, and send a delegate each year to the United Nations. William Hare, 1979, was also present.

Following this program everyone retired to the lodge dining room and enjoyed a light lunch prepared and served by Henry G. Keith and John M. Pochubay, the Lunch Committee. Everyone enjoyed the Fellowship Hour prior to leaving for home. Clover Lodge No. 348 plans on continuing this wonderful program and will send a Delegate to the United Nations Pilgrimage in 1984. James W. Crowe will continue as the Jurisdictional Chairman for the Grand Lodge in 1984, and also will be the Tour Director in July 1984.



Representative to Grand Lodge numerous times, Cal has served on committees for Grand Master Fred M. See and for Grand Master Ed Binkley.


Brother Cal also holds membership in the Lady Emily Rebekah Lodge #452 of Port Matilda, Pennsylvania.

There are changes made in the Blue Book almost every year, but, some of our members and our Lodges do not ever look at the Annual Grand Lodge Journal or the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Lodge in order to keep abreast of the changes that have been made.

Regarding the Lodge By-Laws, I will mention one item that a lot of our Lodges are probably not aware of. When you take in a new member the minimum initiation fee is twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) plus a fee of two dollars (\$2.00) for the Aged Home Building Fund. Up until about two years ago that fee was one dollar (\$1.00).

We have a number of our Lodges trying to more or less insist that the members of the Lodge pay their dues on an annual basis. This is good in some respects as it makes a little easier work for the Secretary, but, with conditions such as they are today, this could create a problem for some members. There is nothing in the Laws of our Order that requires a member to pay his dues annually in one lump sum. As long as the member keeps in good standing they can pay their dues in the manner that is most convenient to them, and, be advised, the Secretary nor the Lodge can refuse to accept the payment. Let's all work for a better Lodge and a better Order.

THE PUBLICITY POWER

(The fifth in a series of articles on publicity.)

Follow Up.

Your publicity plan is showing success. Your articles are being used by the media. Members by now know that the news is getting out. Now what?

Make a point of letting the responsible people at the media know that you know the release was used, and you appreciate their efforts. Do it promptly; or better still, put a thank you note in your next release. Don't over do it. A very brief "thank you" is sufficient.

Not all of your releases will be used. Evaluate those used to determine what the success formula is; what they use, what

they refuse.

There is a lot of literature available for resource materials for filler statements in your articles. A statement or two concerning your projects or interest in each article will slowly disperse a lot of information to the public. Add just enough to add a flavor to your article; don't over do any article. As the saying goes, "Just a touch will do it."



EVERY LODGE SHOULD HAVE A PROGRAM

An active Lodge is usually one which has a well planned program. A good program takes time to arrange and should be planned far enough ahead of time to make it successful. In many active Lodges the first or last meeting in the month is limited to just the essential business and a social or educational program of some kind.

Social programs can be based on holiday themes — Valentine Day, Memorial Day, Easter Hat, Thanksgiving, etc. Sometimes it can be just a pleasant evening of cards, bingo, darts or a box social. Some of these meetings should be for the family to join with the members. There are innumerable ways to entertain the spouses, but Sport Nights can be held easily with athletic stars invited to give short talks to interest the children of the members. Many Lodges also hold a night when they honor their municipal police officers and firemen.

Educational meetings can be just as varied. Ask the owner or an officer of the leading town's industries to give talks about their businesses. The utility companies almost always have speakers and movies or slide shows. You may also have a member who has an interesting occupation or hobby and will be pleased to give a talk about it. Most larger cities have

special bureaus or libraries where movies are loaned on almost any subject. Many will mail them to outlying areas just for the cost of the postage.

There are also occasions when the Lodge celebrates anniversaries, honors an outstanding member or the founder of its branch of the Order. No matter what type of meeting it is, where possible it should be open for prospective candidates. Also, when prospects are invited, a knowledgeable member should be asked to give a short talk about the history and aims of the Order.

All of this is fine, but who will make the arrangements? The best plan is to make this the duty of the Vice Grand. It should be his duty to make the term of his predecessor successful. An inducement is that should he be followed by a less talented person, one of the activities he initiated will carry over to the term when he serves in the top post.



A close-up of the plaque donated by Victory Lodge


VICTORY LODGE #658

COURAGEOUS KORLYN HARTSOCK

Fifteen year old Korlyn Hartsock of Castlewood, Virginia, on the 13th day of June saved her younger sister and brother from the family's burning home at the risk of her own life. She was critically burned, suffered severe facial disfigurement, impaired speech and loss of use in fingers, hands and arms, and has endured awesome suffering with uncommon fortitude and a cheerful spirit. Her courageous sacrifice

was motivated by her love of her family thereby exemplifying the highest principle of Odd Fellowship.

She has been informed by the Attorney General of Washington, D. C. of her selection by the Young American Medals Committee of the Department of Justice as one of two people to receive the 1982 "Young American Medal for Bravery," and that this presidential and congressional decoration will be presented to her by President Ronald Reagan.

She is one of only twenty-six Americans to receive a citation this year from the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission, which honors "Ordinary" people who display extraordinary courage in saving lives.

In any aristocracy of Valor, she would wear the Crown Jewels of Courage, continued PSGM Meriel Harris as he moved a resolution at SGL in Winnipeg that Korlyn Hartsock be designated and chosen to receive the "Outstanding Person Award" of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for the year 1983, and that in recognition thereof she be awarded a suitable plaque and certificate, together with a monetary award of One Thousand Dollars. It was suggested that the presentation be made by SGM Lloyd G. Cranston at an appropriate banquet arranged under the auspices of the Grand Lodge of Virginia.

This resolution was adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge and ordered to be placed upon the permanent records of this 157th annual Session of The Sovereign Grand Lodge.
