#### ELLA DURHAM'S SUGAR COOKIES

6 cups sugar

1 lb. butter or oleo

3 eggs

1 qt. buttermilk

2 tablespoons baking soda

14 cups flour

2 tsp. vanilla salt desired

Cream sugar, butter and eggs. Sift or mix baking soda with flour. Mix alternating buttermilk and flour with creamed mixture. Do not make dough too stiff when rolling out for cookies. Roll 1/2 inch thick and cut with cookie cutter. Bake in 375 degree oven until done according to your own oven.

Brother Larry David Knouse, Jr., of Clover Lodge #348, recently took a singing tour of six countries in Europe with "The Sound Of America" honor band and chorus, for 22 days.

They met together in Carlisle, Pennsylvania at Dickinson College. After arriving there they registered and checked into airconditioned rooms, and each one had an opportunity to meet his roommate. There were recreational activities planned for that evening. They were to spend four days on the Dickinson College Campus, which were spent in intensive rehearsal and tour orientation. However, it wasn't all just hard work. There were pizza parties, the use of the new Life/Sport Center, an eight-lane swimming pool, to make their visit to this campus an enjoyable one. Two Bon Voyage Concerts were presented on the evening before they departed for Europe.

After a final orientation the next morning, they departed the college by chartered buses for Baltimore-Washington International Airport. An in-flight movie and tasty meals were served on the jumbo jet. They arrived in Frankfurt, Germany the

following morning. They boarded a chartered bus, after their arrival, and journeyed into one of the quaint German villages for lunch. Later that afternoon they arrived at their hotel, The Ramada. They spent the night there in the village, and the following morning, they were back on the buses once again, to be taken up to the Heidelberg Castle, situated high above the city. They visited the courtyard, the terraces and the 49,000 gallon, two story high wine barrel. They spent some time strolling through the University town made famous by Sigmund Romberg's "The Student Prince."

After lunch they drove to nearby Manheim for an afternoon concert in one of the most picturesque gardens in Europe. The concert was unique since the performance was on a floating stage in front of the amphitheater. After the concert, they took a boat ride on the lake.

The next day, they drove up to the medieval town of Rothenburg with its fortress walls and watchtowers. There are cobblestone streets, and the many gabled houses that seem virtually unchanged since the 16th century. They had a concert in this storybook town, and then they visited one of the quaint cafes where they sampled some delicious Bavarian Pastry.

Next day it was on to Munich for a visit to this, the capital of Bavaria. Lunch, and then a visit to the large outdoor market, afterward viewing the ultra-modern Olympic sports stadium. They then continued on to Salzburg, the beautiful city of Mozart and "The Sound Of Music." From this

town they run the funicular railway to the Hohensalzburg, the huge medieval fortress overlooking the city. Next day they enjoyed a guided sightseeing tour of Salzburg, including Mozart's birthplace, Getreidegasse, Salzburg Cathedral, and unique St. Peter's Cemetery. They were able to sightsee on their own the rest of the day, with a visit to the lovely Mirabell Gardens. That evening they presented a concert.

The following day they had two optional excursions. One tour was through Hellbrunn Palace, where you would discover unusual hidden fountains that suddenly shower the unwary visitor. The other was to the famous salt mines at Berchtegaden, Dressed in miner's coveralls they slid down several giant chutes to the different levels of mining shafts. The tour also took them across a sparkling underground lake on a raft before returning to the surface aboard a miner's train. The remainder of the day was spent enjoying this Austrian town.

The next day they left Salzburg, and journeyed to Innsbruck, capital of Tyrol and site of two Winter Olympics. They spent several hours strolling through the Old Town, with its pretty shops filled with cowbells and cuckoo clocks. The colorful Tyrolean attire worn by the Austrians gives a festive atmosphere. They ate lunch at a sidewalk cafe.

Later that afternoon they continued through the Arlberg Pass to Bregenz. This is a popular resort on the shore of Lake Constance. The Famous Bregenz Music Festival is held here each summer. They were able to spend the day along the lake or take a short boat ride to nearby Lindau, a charming island city on the lake. They presented a concert that evening in Bregenz.

The next morning they continued south to Vaduz, capital of Liechtenstein. This tiny town is famous for its stamps and Olympic skiers. A brief rest stop offered everyone an opportunity to photograph the Prince's Castle overlooking the city.

The journey then continued over the Alps and through the St. Bernadino Pass to Lugano, which is situated among the steep slopes of the Alps on the Italian Border. A perfect setting for artists and photographers, they took a relaxing cruise on the lake that afternoon. Concert was held there that evening, and later after the concert they were able to view the everchanging colored fountain display out on the lake.

The next morning the journey continued over the St. Gottard Pass where they stopped for a picnic lunch. Later that afternoon they arrived in beautiful Interlaken, located at the foot of the majestic snow-covered Jungfrau.

The next morning they rested, and then boarded buses that journeyed to the spec-

tacular Trummelback Falls. An elevator passing through the rocks leads to the beginning of the galleries. They could view the Trummelback as it leaps and boils with a tremendous force through a series of eroded pot holes that form cascades. The afternoon was spent touring the shops in Interlaken, which are filled with melodies of Swiss music boxes. The Concert that evening was presented in a beautiful hall.

The following morning, they continued on an excursion high into the Swiss Alps to Grindelwald, a charming ski village. Tour members could either ride the chair lift up to "FIRST," where they could eat a picnic lunch high on the mountainside, or they could take a mountain railway up to the mighty Jungfrau, which is the highest railway station in the world. They could throw snowballs, ride a dog sled, ski, and visit the incredible Ice Palace. Later that afternoon they all returned to Interlaken.

The following morning they were back on the buses heading for Bern, the capital of Switzerland, where they toured the famous Tobler Chocolate Factory. After lunch, in the Old Town they toured La Chaux De Fonds, the largest watch and clock making center in Switzerland. They presented a concert in this town of La Chaux De Fonds.

The journey continued the following morning, through the Jura Mountains after which they crossed the border into France. They stopped for lunch in Dijon, known for its fine French cuisine. Later that day they saw the Eiffel Tower appear on the horizon as they approached Paris, the city of lovers, poets, artists and musicians. They had a chance to relax in their rooms before dinner in the modern, four-star PLM. In the evening they took a relaxing cruise on the Seine past many of the famous Paris landmarks, which are especially illuminated for the cruise. The following day, a guided tour takes you along the Champs Elysees to the Arc De Triomphe and the Place De La Concorde; then the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre, and the Opera. Paris was decorated with flags and streamers celebrating Bastille Day, France's most important national holiday. That afternoon and evening they viewed the huge parades, and elaborate celebration, with ceremonies, and fireworks. In the morning, a special excursion took

them outside of Paris to the grandiose Palace of Versailles, built by Louis XIV, in the 17th century. They toured the Palace, the rooms, the famous Hall of Mirrors. The splendor of the Palace was breathtaking with ornate gardens and extensive terraces.

After returning to the city, they enjoyed Paris over lunch at a sidewalk cafe. afternoon the Sound of America Chorus presented a concert in the splendid acoustical setting of the Notre Dame Cathedral, and the Sound Of America Band performed in the lovely Luxembourg Gardens, which are now the Seat of the French Senate. That evening they could spend either by attending a Show, or ascending the Eiffel Tower to view the city at night, the last night in Paris.

There was an early departure the following morning, to journey along the French Coast where they boarded a steamship for the crossing of the English Channel. All were delighted at their first sight of the White Cliffs of Dover, as they approached England. Then on to the chartered buses, and the journey to Canterbury, where they visited one of England's most beautiful churches-Canterbury Cathedral, the Seat of the Church of England. It was the scene of Thomas Beckett's murder and the setting for Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales."

Later that afternoon they arrived in London. The following morning they were on another guided sightseeing tour of the shops, and were able to purchase souvenirs. They visited the Old Curiosity Shop, which was immortalized by Charles Dickens. They could spend the entire day visiting Madame Tussaud's Wax Museum, touring the Tower Of London where they could view the Crown Jewels, browsing in some of the other shops and department stores, relaxing in Hyde Park with Londoners, and attending a musical show at one of the many theaters. A guided tour the next morning took them to Big Ben, the House of Parliament, Piccadilly Circus, Westminster Abbey, and the Changing of the Guard. In the afternoon, they had a ride on the double-decker buses. That night they presented their final per-formance, in a superb acoustical concert hall, the same hall that is used frequently for recording sessions by the London Symphony Orchestra.

A Special Farewell party was held their last night in London, England. The final morning the next day, was free for last minute shopping and packing for the flight home. In the afternoon they were transferred to the airport for the transatlantic flight to the United States. They arrived in Washington/Baltimore International Airport and were bused back to Dickinson College, in Carlisle, Pa.

The Directors were Clyde M. Barr, Coordinator of Tour and Director of the 1984 Sound of America Honor Band; Daniel D. Shaw, Director of 1984 Sound of America Honor Chorus. The Staff was Dr. Truman C. Bullard, Dickinson College, Coordinator of all college level credit from this tour; Mrs. Linda B. Barr, Executive Secretary, and Miss Nancy S. Brymesser, the Director of Personnel for the 1984 Tour.

Larry David Knouse, Jr. is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry David Knouse, Sr. He was selected with a Nation-wide performing organization known as The Sound Of Amer-

ica Honor Band and Chorus. He is an active member of the church choir at Our Lady of Peace Catholic Church, in Conway, and is active in the church's Cantors Guild. He was a member of the Ambridge High School Concert Choir and traveling Jazz Ensemble, until his graduation in June 1984. He was selected by audition to participate in Westminster Honors Chorus for three consecutive years, has participated in Midwest District 5 Chorus for two consecutive years, Midwest Region 1 Chorus for two consecutive years, and Pennsylvania Music State Chorus for two consecutive years. ## OBTAINING PUBLICITY FOR YOUR LODGE

It has come to our attention that some
of the smaller town newspapers prefer a
fact sheet rather than a completed article.
The paper staff then writes the completed
article from the information submitted.
Here is a form to follow:

1. Who or What?

2. What happened or will happen?

3. Where and When?

4. How or Why? This is the background material.

- Quotation from an official or a spokesman.
- 6. Why it is important for the lodge or the community.

7. What was said, the results or the ex-

pected results.

Most papers require quality and have high standards. These standards change from time to time. For instance, in 1983 we were able to get the Harrisburg paper to take a picture of the incoming and outgoing Grand Master. Since then, with all the state organizations meeting in the capitol city, they changed their policy to take pictures of local people only, so we were able to get a picture taken of the Grand Secretary only because he lives in the Harrisburg area and is considered "local." They would not even consider taking pictures of the international officers!

When we learned how to write stories in school, we were taught to build up toward a climax. The opposite is true in news stories. The most important facts are

given in the lead and the details are given later in the article.

Every lodge should have a Reporter appointed to send news to the PENNSYL-VANIA ODD FELLOW AND REBEKAH MAGAZINE, but his/her duties should also be to send the news to the local newspapers and possibly to the radio and television station. If you are the committee chairman of a lodge project, do not take it for granted that the Lodge Reporter will automatically make a writeup about it. Be sure to give him/her the facts for the proposed article. Most local papers will use the names of local people because it helps their circulation when localities are mentioned. However, be sure to get all the names spelled correctly. All papers prefer that any material presented by typewritten but some will accept handwritten articles with all names printed.

#### PROCEDURE

#### Visual Assistance Fund

Purpose:

To provide assistance to Odd Fellows and Rebekahs as needed to relieve extreme hardships in obtaining relief in eye related problems.

Who is Qualified:

Any Odd Fellows, Rebekahs, widows of Odd Fellows and dependents.

What Needs are Covered:

Extreme hardships in the following:

- 1. Cost not covered by Medical Insurance or Medicare.
- 2. Extraordinary examinations and eye glasses costs.

How to Apply for Assistance:

Document your needs and make an appeal to your Lodge. After an appropriate investigation by the Lodge, they are to make an appeal to the Visual Assistance Fund. This appeal should be in writing with the Noble Grand's signature and Seal of the Lodge; attach any supportive documents and send to the Grand Lodge Office.

This appeal will be forwarded to the Trustees of the fund so that a decision can be made on the appeal, and if found proper, the

funds can be distributed.

#### BROTHER MORRIS J. MARTIN, PDDGM PASSES

The Officers and members of Montefiore Lodge #794 of Pittsburgh, mourned the passing of one of their beloved Brothers, Morris J. Martin, on Thursday, August 16, 1984, at the West Penn Hospital, where he was admitted as a patient on Friday, August 17, after suffering a heart attack. He was a very dedicated and regular attender at the Lodge meetings and was involved in the business of the Lodge. He later transferred his membership to Montefiore Lodge #794 on March 15, 1944. He served the various committees and offices in the Lodge and he received the Grand Lodge Degree. He was active in the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania for many, many years, serving on various committees and Session Appointments, and served for many years as the Grand Lodge Publicity Director, which he was serving at the time of his demise, with much honor to himself, the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, and this grand Fraternity.

He was instrumental in getting TV coverage and newspaper coverage for many Grand Lodge and Unified Sessions, and other Odd Fellow functions in the Jurisdiction of Pennsylvania, and was well known world-wide in Oddfellowship. He served on the committees of the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs Visitation Committee for many, many years, and was a Past Secretary of same. He was a member of the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs Reception Visitation Committee, which entertained the Sovereign Grand Master and IARA President at a February dinner and dance in Pittsburgh for 26 years. He had also been active in the Southwest Degree Rally Committee of

the Pittsburgh area for many years. He formed the renowned "Club 31" with 31 Odd Fellows and Rebekahs in 1959, and this group toured the Lodges in several countries in Europe, and once again this group toured European Lodges in 1960. He originated and edited the "Club 31 Newsletter," which was subscribed world-wide. Many of the original members of this Club have passed on to their rewards in Heaven, and now are re-united with their editor in that Heavenly Abode with the Master.

He served as District Deputy Grand Master of the former District No. 2 of Allegheny County. He was elected Secretary of Montefiore Lodge #794 to replace the former Secretary, Brother Emanuel Burnstein, who passed away. He was also instrumental in securing much publicity in the local TV, radio, and newspapers for the S.G.L. Conventions held in Pittsburgh in 1959 and 1982. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in June 1980 for his Outstanding Service and Contributions to this Grand Fraternity, and to mankind world-wide, as a Humanitarian of Excellence in fraternal endeavors to mankind.

He was an active member of the Knights of Pythias, Lodge #3, Pittsburgh, and held four offices of honor, and a Past District Deputy Grand Chancellor of this Fraternity.

He was an active member of B'nai Emunch Congregation, Squirrel Hill, and served for 25 years as Corresponding Secretary of this Congregation, and was a 35 year Trustee, and Past President of the Congregation's Men's Club.

He married the former Bertha Krakoff, and this marriage was blessed with one son, Alan, of Massatequa, New York, and one daughter, Eileen Wasserman of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. He is also survived by three sisters, Eva Sisselsky, and Nettye Stolberg, both of Miami Beach, and Sarah Berman, of Pittsburgh; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

How can we really express our feelings in the great loss that this Jurisdiction and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows has suffered in the passing of this fine gentle-man and Odd Fellow, Brother Morris J. Martin. Can it be recorded in minutes, days, months, years, and the many fine deeds and endeavors that this fine Odd Fellow has contributed to our well-being, and mankind in general. We can testify to the high esteem in which he was held by the membership of this Jurisdiction, and other Jurisdictions in Odd Fellowship, world-wide. #### WHEN YOUR NAME WAS YOUR GAME

Everybody has heard of an attorney named Lawyer or a Pastry Chef named Baker, or a Pastor named Parsons. Occupationally related surnames elicit giggles these days, but there was a time when a person's name and occupation were intentionally the same. When surnames began appearing in Europe 800 years ago, a person's identity and occupation were often intertwined. A surname was a direct link between who a person was and what the person did.

In the Middle Ages, occupational surnames referred primarily to the work done by men. One of the few occupational surnames reflecting the work of women is Webster, which reflers to a female weaver. A male weaver was called Webb. Over the ages, some occupational surnames have survived even after the occupations themselves have disappeared. There are numerous have disappeared. Fletchers in the world, but few Arrow-makers left. A Spurrier or Loriner made spurs—a trade, seldom found today, but one that lives on in the surnames of Spurrier,

Loriner and Lorimer.

Of the more than one million different American surnames, about 16 percent are occupational names. The majority of American last names, about 40%, are place surnames, such as Hill or Brooks. Another 30% are patronyms, in which the descendant added a suffix to the parent's first name, such as Robertson or Williamson. About 12% are descriptive surnames, including Long and Brown. The remainder are translations of Asian or Middle Eastern The ten occupational surnames found most frequently in the U.S.A. are Smith, Miller, Taylor, Clark, Walker, Wright, Baker, Carter, Stewart, and Turner. Taylor is the Old English spelling of Tailor. Clark is derived from Clerk, an occupation of considerable status during the Middle Ages because it required literacy. A walker was someone who cleaned cloth, a wright was a carpenter or metal worker; a carter was someone who drove a cart; a stewart was a person in charge of a farm, or estate, and a turner worked a lathe. The abundance of Smiths in the world today would suggest that smithing (such as blacksmithing) was a popular occupation in ancient times, but it probably has more to do with the metalworker's prestige. During the Crusades, smithing was considered a noble trade that assisted Christian Knights. In Germany, a Smith was known as Schmidt; in Italy, Farrari; in Spain, Herrera, and in Czechoslovakia, Kovar.

Some occupational surnames are easy to recognize, such as Cook, but others are more obscure. Hoggart evolved from Hogherde, or hog herdsman. Calvert originally referred to a calf herder. Chapman was a

peddler. Berry was a servant in a manor; Franklin was a landholder; Zimmerman, a German carpenter; Cohen, a Rabbi; Snyder, a Dutch tailor. Dempster was a judge; Myer, on overseer; Parker, a gamekeeper, and Ward, a guard. Howard comes from heyward, the person in charge of hedges or fences. Sewer was a server of food, and Ewer was someone who brought water in a bowl or "ewer." Napiers distributed napkins; Spencer was a "dispenser" of butter, but Butler was a bottlemaker or the person in charge of bottled goods.

Although the nature of work has changed over the ages, the occupations of Feudal Europe are still evident in post-industrial America, preserved in the pages of the TELEPHONE BOOK.
