BECKY'SBACKYARD

- 1. Do your potatoes sprout before you use them? quantities. Later, when you want mashed potatoes, pop the frozen potatoes into boiling water to finish cooking and they're soon ready to mash.
 - Save plastic bread bags and doublebag store-bought bread before freezing it. The bread freezes without getting freezer burn. This saves extra trips to the store for bread.
- 3. To prevent icing from running off your cake, try dusting the surface lightly with cornstarch before icing.
- 4. To keep a cake from sliding on its plate during transit, drizzle a bit of frosting in a circle on the plate where the cake will rest before removing the cake from the pan. The frosting will hold the cake in place deliciously and your dessert will arrive in perfect shape.
- 5. When baking a casserole that must cook covered, keep your dish and oven neat by propping the lid open just a bit with a toothpick. That will prevent the casserole from bubbling over.

Martin was one of more than 1850 riders participating in this year's ride sponsored by the Allegheny District National MS Society's 13th annual ride.

Martin's wife, Verna and Lee Dorchester, P.G. of #902

served as volunteers to provide the riders with treats of bananas, Gatoraid, sandwiches of peanut butter as the riders stopped at Cochranton for a rest before continuing onto Meadville.

Martin wore a shirt with names of fellow Odd Fellow brothers and Rebekahs and friends of brothers and sisters who suffer from this disease.

The names on the shirt were Judy McMahon, Vivian Lawhead, Charles Bailey, Herman Schlott, Sr., Herman Schlott, Jr., Walter Schoener, Betty M. Stair and Dorothy Tyger.

This year's goal for funds was \$500,000. As of June 4, over \$480,000 was raised. More was collected on the day of the ride.

The ride was 150 miles, starting at the Cranberry Mall, near the PA Turnpike on Rt. 19, and ending at Conneaut Twp. Park, Conneaut, Ohio on Lake Erie.

The oldest participant was 78 years old and the youngest was 8 years of age. Bicycles ranged in size and description, from just bikes, to fancy professional, single seated to tandem, to old fashioned high wheelers. A good time was had by all despite wind, rain and hail.

Raised by the bell

LIFE AT ODD FELLOWS

huck Miller holds court most evenings.
On many of those evenings he actually holds two. After a brisk basketball game he'll head down to the boulevard and the counter at Eat'n Park where staff management and clientele all know him.

Miller has been a fixture of the neighborhood for many years. A former resident of the Odd Fellows home, located at the current site of Rooney Middle School, he was a member of its staff when it closed in the fall of 1967.

There are times when he misses the facility,

and he remembers life there clearly.

Lights went on daily at 6 am. Shortly after the warning bell for breakfast would ring. This meant it was time to wash and make your bed because five minutes later the bell would ring summoning the kids down to breakfast. "I still make my bed every morning," Miller laughs.

The girls went downstairs first. It was their job to set the table. The boys would remain after because it was their duty to wash the dishes.

Following breakfast the residents had a fifteen minute break before it was time to leave for school. Almost all of the younger children attended John Morrow Elementary, the older children were split up amongst Oliver, South, Connelly, Washington Vocational and a few went to Allegheny. Each of these schools had a specialty (the magnet school concept isn't really all that new) and students went to the school that featured their career choice.

Residents left the building with their weekly

street car pass and a dime for lunch.

Everyone was assigned chores. Most of the heavy stuff was done Saturday Mornings, leaving the afternoons free for playing ball or field trips.

During the Summer the boys would play a lot of ball. "If you didn't get into trouble, you could come and go as you pleased as long as you checked out with the houseparent," Miller said.

There were a lot of activities for the residents. Miller recalls the many Christmas Shows and plays like "Showboat" that the kids put on. Many outside groups would hold parties around the holidays for the kids and outsiders would regularly invite kids to cultural and sporting events. "Home kids were able to make up their own minds a bit," Miller recalled.

There were certain standards to be met. A bad report card would land a student in after dinner study hall and "campus" until the grades improved. "Campus" meant you were only allowed into certain areas. There were various types of campus: dorm, house and grounds. Fighting or other misbehavior could net you campus as well. Of course you still went to school and worked while on punishment.

Actually the residents never really ventured far from the grounds anyway. "We pretty much kept to ourselves. The social life was around the

home," Miller said.

The boys and girls lived on separate halves of the building and were pretty much kept apart except for the occasional social. Despite invisible line separating the building there was "some sneaking around," Miller recalled. Everyone was well aware to avoid the wooden step outside Mrs. Kress' quarters.

Miller remembers it as a good life. A resignary was allowed to maintain their own sporting equipment and card collections. 'Basically we were poor kids, but if kids had things they'd share. The houseparents were very nice but firm. There was a point where 'enough is enough.'

Miller recalled the experience fondly enough that when he finished his stint in the military he returned to the home as a house parent.

Miller says that the training at the home was excellent, "You had a fair amount of individuality, but you lived by the bell. It was all right as long as you could live by the bell."

Fond memories of summer ball leagues and evening excursions to Bard's Dairyland at California & Termon mix with pride in successful alumni of the home as he talks. He tells of kids trying out for the Pirates and alumni who ended up bank presidents and police chiefs. Oh, and moments. "Moments of tidbits when you was a celebrity. People wanted to see you (because you lived at the home) – and you wanted to see them."

He was a resident of the Odd Fellows Orphan Home on the North Side of Pittsburgh.
