FREEPORT LODGE NO. 379

January 15, 2000

This year Freeport Lodge No. 379, marks its 151st anniversary of service to the surrounding communities. One example of that service has been in progress since August 18, 1958 when the Public Service Committee at No. 379 began providing hospital equipment to those in need. The equipment is available to anyone, at no charge. Deposits and donations are accepted, but not required. Past Grand Robert M. Henry who has worked on the committee longer than he can remember, heading it since 1972, said "Every cent donated is used for the repair and upkeep of those chairs." Brother Henry, an Odd Fellow for 57 years, has had a brisk business at times, stating that word of mouth advertising has been enough to keep him busy.

Over the years a good deal of equipment has been purchased by, or donated to, the lodge. Currently thirty-nine wheelchairs and dozens of other items, ranging from hospital beds to bath stools, are out in service. Wheelchairs are the item most sought by those in need and waiting in the wings are 25 wheelchairs in good working order. Another two dozen chairs are in need of minor repairs that Brother Henry and assistants Robert C. Hill and Robert W. Buterbaugh squeeze in when time allows.

Brother Hill, an Odd Fellow for 19 years, is a past Grand. Brother Buterbaugh is a 30-year member, is a past District Deputy Grand Master and has served as treasurer of No. 379 for 15 years. The trio also served their country in the armed forces. Both Brothers Henry and Hill are WWII veterans. Brother Henry served with the army in the South Pacific. Brother Hill served with the army in Europe. Brother Buterbaugh served in the air force during the Korean Conflict.

Besides wheelchairs, hundreds of other items are available, including: hospital beds, walkers, crutches, quad canes, regular canes, body lifts, bath stools, tub rails, potty chairs, commode extensions, commode rails, over bed tables, bed pans, geriatric chairs, foam pads and bedsides cabinets. CHANGES MARK TRIO'S JOURNEY IN THREE CENTURIES

Strictly speaking, Charlie Blauser, Silvanus Stoner and Bridget Funk will not have lived in three Centuries until next year, but who will quibble?

All were born in the 19th Century, lived through the high winds of the 20th and today are easing into the 21st on the gentle rhythms of old age.



Charlie Blauser, a 102-year-old World War I veteran, earned the French government's Legion of Honor, its highest award. They have 309 years among them. Funk is the oldest – a 107-year-old retired Seamstress from Steelton who lives at the ManorCare assisted living center in Camp Hill.

She donned a pretty green dress one recent morning to greet a visitor who wanted to know about her century-plus of living, which included two world wars, a worldwide depression and men on the moon.

But asked to look backward and name the most important event of her impossibly eventful times, she lifted her silvered head and said, "My first Holy Communion."

That was 100 years ago, more or less, at the outset of a life Funk summarized with pleasing simplicity.

"Happiness," she said. "I was happy." Blauser, who lives with a Granddaughter in York County's Washington Twp., is a

102-year-old World War I veteran. For his service in France with an Army Transportation Unit, he earned the French Government's Legion of Honor, its highest award.

He also spent 60 years in wedded bliss and improved upon his eighth-grade education by virtually memorizing an encyclopedia, so living in the 1800s, 1900s and now the 2000s doesn't overly impress him.

"I didn't do anything special to live this long," he said, sitting back on a cozy couch at the Dillsburg Area Senior Center, his home away from home. "I never thought I'd live this long when I was younger."

He does not, of course, remember his first half-dozen or so New Year's, but that seems to be about all he doesn't remember.

"My memory's too good," he said. "I remember too damn much." He can probably outduel any Schoolteacher in a battle of Name the Presidents – the 18 he has lived under and all the rest besides.

"You know who the father of our country is?" he asked.

A visitor ventured to say, "George Washington."

"Nope," Blauser said. "It's Tyler. He had eight kids."

Which reminded him of the joke about the 80-year-old man who tells his daughter he is getting married.

"The daughter," Blauser recounted gleefully, "says 'Why would an 80-year-old man want to get married?"

"And the man says 'Who says I want to?"

Stoner, a native of New Kingstown in Cumberland County, is the junior member of this senior trio, three months past his 100th birthday. He celebrated that milestone with his second wife, 95-year-old Mary, at the County Meadows assisted living center in Hampton Twp.

They were married 11 years ago, when Stoner - friends call him

"Sil" - was 89.

"It's never too late," he mused.


Stoner knows all about Y2K and other contemporary anxieties, but he insisted people are better off today than when he was a youngster. Most of them have no memory of the Great Depression, which defined success for Stoner's generation as the ability to survive.

"I think they are better off, yes," he said slowly. "I think they are more content and able to make a better living. I spent many years as a young fellow working for a dollar a day for a farmer. I found out there are better ways to make a living."

His way was to go to work for Bell Atlantic. He spent the early part of his career promoting the telephone.

"These days everyone has a telephone," he said. "Well, they didn't back then."

Blauser, who retired from York Corrugating Co. in 1961 – "There's not many live this long after retiring," he noted—also said the world is better in most respects than the one of his youth.



"I went from coal light to gas light to

electric light," he said. "I went from horse-drawn carriage to automobile. A lot of changes. I've seen a lot of improvements."

He has also been disappointed by change, he hastened to add. "I remember in the 1930s, shrimp was 29 cents a pound," he said, shaking his head. "Now it's eight or nine dollars. I don't see why it should be so high."

Neither man will choose any one historical event as the most important of the century, though Blauser will admit that his 13 months overseas during World War I had the deepest impact on his own life.

"That's a thing I don't much talk about," he said. "I could b.s. you and tell you I won the whole war, but I want to forget it."

Stoner, peering through his heavy glasses, seemed to find the question of the century's most significant event impossible to answer.

"It's a big question," he said. "That's a hard one."

Stoner, Funk and Blauser are not historians or textbook writers. Foremost in their minds when they reminisce are personal moments – births, deaths, weddings, holidays.

Blauser cherishes memories of his wife, Gretna, who died in 1982 after 60 years of marriage. They traveled across the country together and collected enough memories for two lifetimes.

"I've had my feet in the Atlantic and the Pacific and the Gulf of Mexico," he said. "I drove 150 miles out of my way one time to see the grave of Billy the Kid. I've seen enough. In other words, I've had a good life."

DON'T LET FLU SEASON INTERRUPT THIS YEAR'S HOLIDAY SEASON

he end of the November month signals the start of two seasons: the holiday season and the influenza season.

Influenza, commonly called the flu, is a virus that spreads from infected persons to the nose or throat of other people, according the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

The symptoms commonly associated with the flu are sore throat, muscle aches, fever, coughing and chills.

Most people infected with the flu virus are ill for a few days, but there are cases in which people have to hospitalized.

While the flu is generally thought to be more of a nuisance than a harmful affliction, there are thousands of deaths each year that are attributed to the flu virus, according to the CDC.

Despite the grim outlook, there is a way to combat the disease in the form of an influenza vaccine.

The "flu shot," invented in the 1950s, is the best defense against the flu, according to the CDC.

Each year the vaccine is updated by replacing one or more of the vaccine viruses with newer ones, the CDC said. This is done because

the viruses that cause influenza change often.

Although anyone of any age can be infected with the virus, people at the highest risk for catching the "flu bug" are the elderly and health care workers.

Because of their prolonged exposure to persons with chronic medical conditions, nursing home employees are encouraged to get the vaccine.

"We have always give flu shots, free of charge, to our employees," said Diane Robinson, the nursing home administrator for Orchard Manor, Grove City.

Last Tuesday, the home, along with Superior Ambulance Service, sponsored a walk-in clinic for the community in which flu shots were give free of charge.

One hundred flu vaccines were donated to the home by UPMC Horizon Hospital of Pittsburgh.

Even though she isn't in the high risk category for catching influenza, Anita Gibson, of Franklin, took advantage of the free flu vaccine at the walk-in clinic.

People that work in the health field are urged to get a flu shot once a year at the start of the flu season. "I've been sick a lot this year," Gibson said, so she decided the shot was a good idea.

Other persons that are in a high risk group are those with weakened immune systems and their care givers.

"My husband is on kidney dialysis," said Connie Puckley, who took advantage of the free shot with her two children.

"I get a flu shoot every year because I have asthma, and when I get the flu I get it real bad," said Malerie Hambley, of Grove City.

While the flu vaccine greatly reduces risk of catching the flu, it doesn't prevent it, though it can lessen the virus' effects.

"People think that because they got one least year they don't need this year and that's not true," said Kris Goas, an EMT for Superior Ambulance Service.

The effects of the vaccine last six months, and by the time the next flu season starts the vaccine's effectiveness has diminished. The effects of the flu vaccine begin two weeks after the shot is administered.

However, not everyone can enjoy the effects of flu shots. People with a serious allergy to eggs and anyone with a history of the Guillian-Barre Syndrome should consult a doctor before getting the shot, according to the CDC.

Also, those who are moderately or severely ill at the time of the shot should wait until recovered, according to the CDC.

There are also risks to getting a flu shot because there is a chance of an allergic reaction, according to the CDC.

Mild reactions to the shot are aches or soreness where the shot was given. A severe reaction to the vaccine usually occurs within a few minutes to a few hours after the shot has been administered. The reaction could include fever, hoarseness, difficulty breathing and weakness.

Anyone experiencing these symptoms after receiving the shot is urged to get to a doctor right away, according to the CDC.

The flu season usually starts at the end of November and can last up to the early weeks of April.

The CDC is a national organization that studies infectious diseases and is headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia.
