PAST PRESIDENT REBEKAH ASSEMBLY DOROTHY L. BROWN "CALLED HOME"

Sister Dorothy L. Brown, born August 12, 1913, of Milroy, passed away April 4, 2004. Sister Dorothy was initiation into

#316, Milroy, September 10, 1943. She advanced the chairs and became a Past Noble Grand October 2, 1953. She received her Rebekah Assembly Degree, March 13, 1954 and was installed as District Deputy President of Mifflin County in 1959 where she served two years as Deputy. She served as President of the



Rebekah Assembly from 1979-1980. She served on the Board of Directors to the Odd Fellows Home, Middletown for many years. At the time of her death, she was a member of Lady Greenwood Rebekah Lodge #308 through consolidation.

Her Scriptures were Psalm 121, versus 1 and 2 and the twenty-third Psalm. Her guide was the bible and Sister Dorothy's theme for her year was "Open Wide the Doors." She encouraged the Rebekah's to join her in opening various doors here year. "Open the Door to Life," let the sun shine in. "Open the Door to Truth," hiding behind the door is too

Sister Mary's motto was "Happiness for Others" taken from our Emblem the Dove. Her Slogan "Let your good deeds inspire courage and hope," taken from our emblem the Moon and Seven Stars. She envisioned the Rebekah Lodges throughout the state as a Garden. Each their own colorful flower to fill the garden.

She was a member of St. Paul's U.C.C. Church, Yellow Creek. She was preceded in death by two husbands - Stephen Burr in 1965 and Roy Carbaugh in 1987.

She is survived by a daughter and a son, five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Burial was on Lloyd Cemetery, Ebensburg.

FIRST OF ITS KIND

When hearing the word "orphanage" many folks picture Orphan Annie or some other outcast children in a prison-like building with mean folks in charge. Perhaps some optimistic folks think of Shirley Temple and the orphanage in "Curly Top." Do you ever wonder how orphanages were started?

It was about 1870, just after the Civil War, in Meadville, Pa., that members of the Odd Fellows Crawford Lodge #734 learned of the death of Brother Thomas Johnson and his wife, leaving behind three small children. Not knowing exactly what they could legally do to help those children as well as other children in similar circumstances, the members planned and worked and persuaded the Pennsylvania Legislature to adopt a special act providing for the care of widows and orphans. Adopted on April 3, 1892, this act allowed the lodge members to take steps to provide the needed assistance. Locating a two story farm house with nine sleeping rooms and acreage near Allegheny colleges for \$7,400 (a huge sum in those days). This step was the beginning of history in the making, as this was the first incorporated orphan home in the world.

With support from the community, a dedication celebration was held on June 10, 1874, with a parade that included five bands, dignitaries and 2,000 lodge members. Businesses and home were decorated for the event. Following the parade was a picnic supper at the home along with music, speeches and meetings that lasted well into the night.


The first residents of the home were a widow and her three children. One month later, two widows and four children were admitted. The numbers grew slowly but steadily to the late 1890s when 23 children were in the home. An annex was added to accommodate all of the children that was state-of-the-art with gas fixtures and a city sewer connection which made it possible to have an indoor bathroom with wash stands, a commode and a tub. The home was more modern than most single family homes.

By 1900 there were 53 children in the home. A third story was added and the kitchen enlarged and when the number of children reached 69 in 1904, a cement block annex was built that included a gym, showers, central heating plant, hospital room, chapel and a girls' dormitory.

By 1928 120 children lived in the home. A new building fund was begun and the resulting structures were almost like a village. Built in 1927, the compound included a bakery, laundry, barber shop, dentist's room, sewing room, workshop, chapel, music room, gym, indoor pool, study rooms and a separate infirmary. It was dedicated on Oct. 16, 1927, with a community-wide celebration. Of note is that the event was attended by John Mark, Pennsylvania Grand Master of the Odd Fellows and a former home resident. The final cost for the new complex was \$211,000.

To help with the costs of operation, the lodges from the various towns adopted a room, making sure that it was furnished with sheets, bedspreads, towels and was painted on a regular basis. Additional properly was acquired to raise grains, vegetables, chickens, pigs and cattle. Other local farmers provided additional foods during harvest time. Each of the lodges brought hundreds of canning jars with vegetables, fruit, meat, jam, pickles and apple butter on Donation Day each October. And, the children all helped with age appropriate chores from cleaning and dusting to planting, weeding and harvesting crops and cooking.

The children attended Meadville Public School. Encouraged to participate in all school activities, children enjoyed sports and a large number were musically talented, first forming a Mandolin Club and later a small orchestra and also a band. Some lodges and

individuals provided funds for the children to pursue higher education. Many of the children enjoyed professional careers in many fields and were productive members of society, giving back a portion of what they received.

A decline of membership in Odd Fellows and the affiliated Rebekahs Lodges during the Depression in the 1930s affected the home. It was necessary to open the home to children recommended by private and public agencies and some children were appointed by the courts. After 100 years of being home to more than 1,200 children, the Odd Fellows' Home closed as an orphanage in 1972 partially because of financial and operating difficulties and partially because of the changing society with public agencies caring for those who formerly would have been placed in the home.

However, the site continued to be used by the community. It became the Brian Learning Center for handicapped children. Always giving preference to programs at the site, the Odd Fellows have provided the facility at reduced rent for a variety of local agencies such as Head Start, Latch Key Program, Junior Achievement, related programs included Mental Health Services, Teen Parenting Classes, Work Experience Program, counseling services and even a catering business.

Currently, through a contract with Allegheny College (a long term friendly neighbor for more than 100 years), sections of the home are used for college offices and the alumni and development offices. Currently operated by the Odd Fellows as a non-profit corporation, the home continued to be utilized by the community with a focus on services for youth.

Author's note

Having been born in the 1920s, growing up in a small town in Pennsylvania, one becomes aware of the organizations to which your parents participate. The buildings which are large and beautiful are owned by the club or lodge and are marked by name, emblem or symbol. Our town had a P.O.S. of A.building which also housed Grange and I.O.O.F. meetings and activities. All performed civic duties for the welfare of the community.

My father was treasurer of the I.O.O.F. (Odd Fellow) for 28 years and many members would come to our house to pay their dues. They would often discuss projects they supported. The one that always made me curious was the mention of the orphan's home.

In 1947 I joined the Rebekahs, the female order of the I.O.O.F. This was truly a learning experience. I became involved with our Rebekah Home in Harrisburg for our aged female members, was on

the finance committee for the Rebekah Assembly and served on state chairs.

In 1959 I had the privilege of attending a board meeting at our Philadelphia Orphanage and 1962 visited the Meadville Orphanage. I was very impressed with the children, their discipline and conduct, their play and study rooms, their sleeping quarters, their daily chores and their involvement with the community.

Even back then the trend of orphanages was frowned upon and the government was placing children in foster homes. There were many pros and cons with this procedure, as there are with any changes.

The I.O.O.F. in Meadville, Pa. was the first fraternal home in the world, incorporated in 1872.

Postcards of orphanages are as hard to find as Indian head pennies.

Students chosen are Alex Kunkel, William Prince and Jessica Raynak, and the pilgrimage is slated for July 10 in Harrisburg.





The Parable of Geese in Information

When you see the geese in migration, notice how they fly in a V formation. Scientists have now discovered why they fly that way.

1. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the bird following. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

BASIC TRUTH #1 – 'People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.'

2. Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the 'lifting power' of the bird immediately in front.

BASIC TRUTH #2 – 'If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed the same way as we are going.'

3. When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies point.

BASIC TRUTH #3 – 'It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks, with people, as with geese.'

4. The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

BASIC TRUTH #4 – 'We need to be careful what we say when we honk from behind, making sure that we are encouraging.'

5. Finally, when a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly or until he is dead; then they launch out on their own to catch up with their group.

BASIC TRUTH #5 - 'If we have as much sense as the geese, we will stand by each other like that.'

BECKY'S BACKYARD

- Decreasing the creasing: Put the article in the dryer on LOW heat for a couple of minutes along with a couple of damp bath towels. Take the article out and while it is sill warm, smooth out the creases. A second treatment may be necessary.
- 2. To keep hot oil from splattering, sprinkle a little salt or flour in the pan before frying.
- Never overcook foods that are to be frozen. Foods will finish cooking when reheated. Don't refreeze cooked thawed foods.
- 4. A few drops of lemon juice added to simmering rice will keep the grains separated.
- Green pepper may change the flavor of frozen casseroles. Clove, garlic and pepper flavors get stronger when they are frozen, while sage, onion and salt get milder.
- 6. Don't freeze cooked egg whites; they become tough.
- 7. Instant potatoes are a good stew thickener.
