
Who are the Odd Fellows to me?

GRAND MASTER'S PIN

ONE

My symbol ONE represents to me that you are either ONE or not ONE. One as an individual and One as a group (group member). I feel you can't be a true Odd Fellow without both. It provides a means of individual and group identification which human beings need particularly the young and old for personal security feelings which signify our mutual assistance to our society.

It is important to the individual to be able to be a part of something larger than themselves. Our valediction provides the framework to ask the questions. If you are unable to believe in each statement one of them positively or don't believe in them or don't stride to develop them than you are not ONE true Odd Fellow. You need to be one not only in form but more importantly in substance.

In designing the pin I took my own personal symbols adjusted them and merged them with our Odd Fellows symbols. I thought this would help me strengthen my basic beliefs with the teachings of the Odd Fellows and my own personal beliefs. It also assists me in supporting it's principles and subordinating myself to the Order.

Central in the pin are three human figures. They remind me of my three sons. They remind me of our three family generations. They also remind me of the three generations in our family grandparent, parent, and children. Their arms are outstretched as though symbolizing victory.

The outstretched arms personally remind of the Roman number 4 and 6 (IV and VI). This reminds not of my year of birth but of the year my parents conceived me. It reinforces in me the notion of God and eternity. It also reminds of the LOVE they had for one another and for their God. It is central on the pin because it should be central to our lives.

The figures have their arms raised above their heads. The roman numerals also signify the two symbols of my generation – the #1 sign of strength and the V peace sign. Extremists on both edges divided a generation and divided the generations. It serves as a reminder to me that they must be reunites. As you know from my installation the bundle of sticks in my Odd Fellows symbol for my term as your Grand Master.

The GM pin symbol message is of I-IV-IV-I also signifies to me that you must be I – strong on the inside and outside as an individual and group and V to have peace on the inside as an individual and group. We must also be active which is why the figures are on an angle. Our American society is built around the fact that the citizens need to be active and responsible so they can assist our nation in by being self governing. Strong active ethical citizen members can create a morally strong social society a key element to our nation and our world. A strong morally and ethical family fraternal society can "improve and elevate the character of mankind."

To the colors of red, white and blue I've placed on it as a veteran are the blood (red) shed by the pure duty bound citizens (white) are given in Love to all of us (blue). Our order teaches love of our creator, country and fellow man again three figures. They are repeated each meeting night by each of us individually as well as all of us collectively. As a former military policeman it also reminds me of the ongoing sacrifices the police, fireman and others make daily to provide us with PEACE.

To the pin the lighter background represents to me the sky under which we live.

We have the organization and members to provide it. I've rearranged my pin colors to Odd Fellow colors of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd degrees. These figures also represent to me the traditional American society management – the family unit as developed by the three traditional generational stages in a family – the children,

parents, and grandparents, the oasic unit of our society. In my own family they represent my first teachers – my father who taught me Friendship, my mother who taught me Love, and my Grandmother who taught me Truth. These figures also represent my own three sons to me and there development, as well as my wife.

As we look around the lodge and various functions we attend you may notice the grouping by generations. My goal is to close this gap so there is more development (communication and learning) of each generation as they move along through the various phases of our lives. We need to mentor the younger generation and our newest members so they can value our collective experiences in Odd Fellowship.

The Odd Fellows symbol of the three links shows the interrelationship of these three symbols to me. They represent the Odd Fellow family, as well as, and my family. The left link is rising which signifies the development of the child in the friendship phase – rising as a child grows. The middle link is balanced and supports the other two links – balanced as a loving and caring family supporting the growing child and the aging grandparents. The right link signifies the aging grandparents who seek to reconcile their lives and their beliefs. These links represent mankind to me and how we are ever linked by experiencing these stages of life.

The light blue represents the sky which encompasses this world. The gold circle symbolizes each of our own circles. Our inner circle or family, friends, etc. It also symbolizes eternity again to the group. It also symbolizes that there is not beginning or end.

The outer blue circle symbolized Love. It is the Love of our God which completes us all. Also the love he requires of each of us to one another. ONE love he provided within us and ONE love he requires us to provide to others. It is this love of the Odd Fellows which is central in our laws and should be central to our teachings and experiences.

Combining the skills of our total membership provides the ability to understand and implement our objectives. It also provides a nice way of getting to socialize with people sharing the same commitments to our Creator, country and one another.

The final circle is deeper blue. It is a little hard to see but it is there again signifying eternal Love and God which encompasses all. The circle symbolizes eternity – no beginning or end. P.O.F. DAYS GONE BY

75 YEARS AGO

(December 1930)

A worthy tribute to the first Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania was paid by Grand Master Webster Grim and Grand Secretary Usher A. Hall on December 16, 1930, when they visited Chambersburg in the course of their campaign activities in the cause of present-day Odd Fellowship.

Their itinerary in the December tour took the Grand Lodge officers to Carlisle on Monday, December 15, and the following day they continued through the Cumberland Valley to Chambersburg. Arriving early in the day permitted a visit to the Cedar Grove

Cemetery wherein stands a shaft dedicated to the memory of Aaron Nichols, who was installed by Grand Sire Thomas Wildey as Grand Master at the institution of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania on June 27, 1823. This memorial was erected by the Grand Lodge and Subordinate Lodges of Pennsylvania and the Grand Lodge annually appropriates a sum for the upkeep of the monument, while last year additional money was granted to properly repair the damage done by the elements to the shaft. Columbus Lodge, No. 75, of Chambersburg, is made responsible by the Grand Lodge for ascertaining that the plot and monument is at all times, kept in proper and decent order and condition.

On this visit Grand Master Webster Grim officially recognized the place of Past Grand Master Nichols in Pennsylvania. Odd Fellowship and in order to emphasize the remembrance of the Grand Lodge of today with Grand Secretary Hall he not only visited the grave, but with due and impressive ceremony in the presence of a few of the

brothers from Chambersburg placed a wreath upon the base of the monument to which a card was attached bearing the following sentiment:

"To Grand Master Aaron Nicols, Pioneered Grand Master I.O.O.F., Pennsylvania, 1823-24, in recognition of your services to mankind in the inculcating of the principles of Friendship, Love and Truth, to the

advantages of the millions who have followed in your footsteps, I. Webster Grim, Grand Master, 1930-31, lay this Emblem of Love and remembrance upon thy tomb."

After they had placed the wreath the Grand Lodge officers made an inspection of the structure and lot and gave their official sanction to the repairs that were authorized by the Grand Lodge on the request of Columbus Lodge. The monument is made of Middletown brown stone, and bears the following inscriptions:

West side – Aaron Nichols. First Grand Master, Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F. Born 1778, died 1856.

South side - Erected by Grand and Subordinate Lodges of Pennsylvania, I.O.O.F.

East side – Visit the sick, relive the distressed and educate the orphans is the command of our laws.

North side – A Past Grand 106, Grand Master 1823-24, Grand Treasurer, 1824-26. He rests by the side of his wife, Sarah.

It may interest many members of the Order to know something about Aaron Nichols and the beginning of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania; therefore we print the following brief sketches of an event of great importance in Odd Fellowship and the man who had such an outstanding part in it, the founding of the Grand Lodge that is today the largest under the Sovereign Grand Lodge and the only Grand Master of that body to whom the same Grand Lodge erected the only monument of its kind in this State.

Aaron Nichols, Grand Master 1823-24

(The facts presented here are from the History of Odd Fellowship by James L. Ridgely, and other sources.)

Aaron Nichols, the first Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, was of English origin, born in 1778, and a saw-maker by trade. At what time he emigrated to the United States and when or where he united with the Order of Odd Fellows is unknown. The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania having been instituted June 27th, 1823, it follows that Brother Nichols,

who was them forty-five years of age, must have been initiated several years previously. For a number of years he made his home in

Chambersburg and was a citizen of much prominence, a property owners, and was well respected in this community. He died at this home in Chambersburg January 4, 1856, after a well spent life.




I.O.O.F. IS BUSY BUILDING HOMES, FAMILES AND FUTURES FOR CHILDREN IN CAMBODIA

IN MEMORIAM

PAST GRAND MASTER GILBERT RAND October 30, 2005

Brother Gilbert A. "Gil" Rand, 80, of Philadelphia died October 20, 2005. He was initiated into Walker Lodge No. 306, Southampton, on March 5, 1945. He became a Past Grand of that Lodge October 1967 and received his Grand Lodge Degree on November 14, 19780. He was a Past District Deputy of that District and also served Grand Lodge as Grand Conductor under PGM Robert L. Derr. He was installed as Grand Warden in 1976 and excelled through the chairs to serve as Grand Master for the term 1978-1979. HEITER CENTER HALFWAY TO GOAL

More donations sought

LEWISBURG-The Donald Heiter Community Center has reached the halfway point in the emergency monetary goal it established, and it plans to move forward with a new after-school program for this year.

The Independent Order of Odd Fellows donated a check for \$2,000 this week. The group collected funds from the 14 members. Fred Brouse, Harry Ammon and Robert Betzer attended the check presentation. The group meets at 7:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at Saint Paul's church on Fourth Street in Lewisburg.

The center's goal was set at \$40,000. "We are delighted with the community's generosity and feel confident we can keep the doors open," Andrea Tufo, executive director, said. "We just need the support to continue."

The Heiter Center has been open to the community for 12 years, last year servicing over 3,800 people while getting 26,000 hours of

volunteer time.

Meanwhile, the Academic Enrichment Program (AEP) will be held for youths age 5 through 17 from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday. The program costs \$3 per day, per child, which includes supplies, snacks, tutors, rewards and incentives. According to Tufo, this is the only program of its kind in North-Central Pennsylvania.

Enrollment in the AEP will also entitle those young people to participate in the After School Youth Program, from 3-7 p.m. Monday through Friday. This will include educational activities and games and will be at no extra cost. These activities could include crafts, sports clinics, games, gym time, weekly outings and extended learning opportunities. Additionally, progress reports will be sent home every three months.

Other programs scheduled by the Heiter Center include five performances of "The Yellow Dress," which will help students understand warning signs of an abusive relationship, area bands performing regularly and the SPLASH program supporting Susquehanna Valley Women in Transition in a personal safety program, among others.

FROM GRANDMA'S KITCHEN

Ham Barbeque

1-12 oz. bottle chili sauce

3 tablespoons packed brown sugar

1 tablespoon vinegar

1 teaspoon dry mustard

1 small onion, finely minced

1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon sweet relish

1 pound chipped, chopped ham (very finely chopped)

In a saucepan, combine all ingredients. Simmer for 15 or 20 minutes. Serve in buns. Can also be cooked in crockpot 2-1/2 to 3 hours on high.

Pork Chops With Sweet Potatoes

2 boneless loin pork chops

1 teaspoon oil

1 medium sweet potato, peeled and cut into 1/4 inch slices

1 tablespoon butter, melted

1/3 cup orange juice

1/8 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon ginger

1/8 teaspoon mace

dash of pepper

2 teaspoons cornstarch

2 teaspoons water

In a small non stick skillet, brown pork chops in oil. Place in an 8-inch square baking pan coated with cooking spray. Layer with sweet potato; drizzle with butter. In a small saucepan, combine orange juice, brown sugar, salt, ginger, mace, and pepper; bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Pour over sweet potato. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes, or until pork reaches 160 degrees and potato is tender. Remove pork and potato; keep warm. Pour pan juices into a small saucepan. Combine cornstarch and water until smooth; stir into juices. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 1 minute or until thickened. Serve with pork and sweet potato. Yield: 2 servings.

Pilgrim Pudding

3/4 cup cold milk

1/3 cup canned pumpkin

2 tablespoons instant vanilla or white chocolate pudding mix

1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon whipped topping, divided

1-1/2 teaspoons caramel ice cream topping

1 teaspoon toasted sliced almonds

In large mixing bowl, combine milk and pumpkin. Add pudding mix; whisk for 2 minutes or until slightly thickened. Let stand for 2 minutes or until soft-set. Fold in 1/2 cup whipped topping, spoon into two dessert dishes. Garnish with remaining topping; drizzle with caramel topping and sprinkle with almonds. Yield: 2 servings

MOSTLY FOND MEMORIES OF ODD FELLOWS ORPHANAGE

Recently, I was sent an article from The Daily Item about life in the I.O.O.F. Orphanage. What a shock to read about the experiences of that man and woman who lived at the Home. Could this have been the same place where I was raised? Let me tell you about my recollections.

When my father was killed in a mining accident, fortunately for me he was a member of the I.O.O.F. Lodge, entitled his children entrance to homes that the lodges supported. There were five of us whose ages made us eligible for admittance. We arrived January 1929. I was 6 years old and lived there until 1941. It means I experienced several changes of management and a succession of "house mothers."

This was during the Great Depression, but we were well fed, reasonably clothed and all our physical needs were met. The Home was on a farm, which produced our food and provided all the milk we could drink.

The boys helped take care of the animals and truck farm. The girls helped in the can-

ning. The Home had its own bakery, and homemade bread appeared at every meal and cake every Sunday evening. Sometimes we had ice cream when enough cream needed to make it had accumulated.

I also remember lining up after breakfast with our spoon to receive our daily dose of cod-live oil (eggs).

I can't recall disliking or fearing any of the house mothers. Miss Albert would save her Sunday night cake as a reward if you'd hang up her wet laundry for her. And after her day off, we'd gather around to listen to her tell of the movie she had seen. What a great storyteller she was!

Miss Love was a rather homely spinster and we cruelly made fun of her behind her back. Yet when I graduated from high school, she gave me the beautiful book "A Bible Dictionary," which I still have.

I often was on the receiving end of punishment. I even experienced some paddling, but when I knew I was in for it, I'd slide a copy book in my voluminous bloomers and it wasn't too bad. Most times punishment was to sit in the main hallway and darn socks or work on patchwork quilts. Never was I aware of anything that could be termed abuse.

There were frequent visits by Lodge members to check conditions at the Home and speak to the children to check on our treatment.

There were music lessons available on the piano or a complete selection of bank/orchestra instruments, as well as voice. We were all encouraged to learn one of them.

Church services were held every Sunday afternoon. Attendance was mandatory. There was voluntary Bible study on Wednesdays. Grace was said before very meal and prayers at bedtime.

In summer, groups of us swan in an indoor, unheated pool, but the even greater joy was the freedom to play outdoors and roam our woods. For a two-week period, parents or other relatives were allowed to take the children home for a vacation.

In the winter we had several great hills for sledding. There was also a large pond. The tall weeks were burned, the pond flooded and

we would skate.

Christmas was special. Those in charge went the extra mile to ensure that each children received an equal number of gifts. Gifts donated by Lodge members were given to those who family had not provided any. We all hung stockings and found an orange in the toe, along with a bag of hard candy and a tube of toothpaste.

We were also allowed to order any items we wanted from the Sears catalog, with a limit of \$3.

We had the best physical, moral and spiritual guidance. I know of not one I.O.O.F. graduate who has ever run afoul of the law.

We missed out growing up in a traditional family, but we had so many children our own age with whom we formed lasting bonds that it went along way to negate our loss.

Every Labor Day weekend there is a Home reunion. We catch up on each others' lives and we talk about our memories. You should come next Labor Day and listen in and tell me, do you hear any horrors stories, regrets?

I would have given a great deal to have been raised by a mother and father, like most of you, but I instead was raised by strangers. They cared for me, and more importantly, they filled that Home with affection. We all are grateful for what we received from the Home and proud to say "I'm an I.O.O.F. graduate."

Mrs. Young was born in Wilkes Barre and raised in the Independent Order of Oddfellows Orphanage from 1929 to 1941. She is a former vice president of the Home Savings and Loan Association and lives in Fairfield, Conn.


