REFLECTIONS

THE PENNSYLVANIA ODD FELLOW

An Autobiographical Glimpse of My Life In the I.O.O.F. Orphanage in Sunbury, Pennsylvania

The following story has been submitted by Brother Bob Betzer of Lewisburg who was raised in the Sunbury Home. The article was written by one of his childhood buddies who grew up at the Home with him. Bob felt the article best described life in an Odd Fellows Orphanage. Due to the size of the article and wonderful pictures submitted, we will be breaking it up over the next several months. I hope you enjoy the history.

PART 3

We also had a few sheep, which usually went where the cows would go. One day while I was watching the cows, the ram sheep got into the alfalfa field. That was a no-no. I went after the ram to get him back where he was supposed to be, but he had no intension of me getting him back. He turned on me and I turned to run from him, but he caught up with me and butted me in the rear and knocked me down. I got up again and he knocked me down again. About that time, the farmer's son saw what was going on and he came to my rescue with a pitch fork and chased the ram away from me.

On days that I had to watch cows, I would hang around and watch the cows come into the barn for milking. Cows must be pretty smart, because every one had its own stanchion which they would walk into and put their head through the bars to be latched in place. Each cow had its own name, and a chart was kept on the weight of the milk each one gave at each milking. The production of milk from each cow would determine what kind of dry feed and how much they got that evening. The milk was put in ten-gallon milk cans and taken across the road to the creamery. One of the guys was in charge of putting the milk over a cooler and then in quart bottles for transport to the refrigerator next to the kitchen and dining area. Once in a while, I would get to sample the fresh milk as it came off the cooler. If you like milk, and I did, it was great. It was a lot better than store-bought milk. Any excess milk that was produced was taken in ten gallon cans to Sunbury and sold to some diary.

Another job during the spring growing season for us was working the vegetable garden. A horse was used to cultivate between the rows, then we had to pull the weeds from around the plants. It was back breaking work and we hated it, but it had to be done. One of the pleasant things I got to do during the summer was when hay was being cut and hauled to the barn. The farmer would let me drive the horses while the big boys and the farmer loaded the hay wagon.

One of the jobs which I didn't like was following the reaper being pulled by horses and picking up the sheaves of wheat or oats and putting them in shocks. After drying out a few days, the grain was loaded onto a hay wagon and taken into the barn for thresting. This was a terrible job for us. We had to be in the straw mow distributing the straw as the threshing machine would blow into the mow. The dust was terrible. We used wet cloths over our noses, but we still got a lot of dust into our lungs. At the end of the day my lungs would hurt when I took a deep breath, but it passed after a couple of days.

Some of the older boys were given the choice of milking the cows, morning and night. The dairy didn't have milking machines at that time. They were paid five dollars a month to do it. It seemed like a lot of work for the little bit of money, but they didn't have any trouble getting volunteers. I tried milking a couple times, but I wasn't too good at it.

We played a lot of ball, using a rubber ball and a broom stick. We also played "kick the can." I guess this was a game the kids invented. A can was put no the ground next to a tree, then at a signal, you would kick the can as hard as you could, and then run to another tree and try to get back again before your opponent picked up the

can and beat you. If he beat you, you had to chase the can after he kicked it.

We had a game similar to a ball game, but instead of a ball we made a "ball" out of old socks which were sewn in a tight ball. We called it mugums. We chose up sides, or if not enough kids who wanted to play. We would have three batters; one at each base and three in the outfield. The rules were different than regular baseball. The batter had to hit the ball with the palm of his hand.

After fielding the ball, the fielder would try to hit you with the ball. He was not allowed to run with the ball, to tag you out. It had to be thrown. When the batter was out, he went to the field and every one would advance; the pitcher would then advance to be a batter. I remember this one boy Clay Myers, who was a cripple with a bad foot, but he was uncanny at design the balls when some one tried to get him out. These games were a lot of fun and didn't cost a dime.

The Orphanage had its own indoor swimming pool. During the summer months, we were permitted to swim in groups. The girls and the boys had their swim schedules separately. The swimming pool was located in the basement of the older boys building. We boys would always wait outside our sunroom to watch the girls parade by to the pool. I somehow got a pair of water wings, I got the courage to try to swim without them. The water was over my head, so I had to stay close to the pooledge, until I really learned how to swim. As we got older, we older boys would go skinning dipping after dark. We had a boy, Ray Young, who was afraid of the water. Some of the older boys told him they were going to throw him in and make him learn to swim. He must have been really frightened. That night he disappeared; we didn't know where he went. What he did was to go up into our attic and hide. One or two of his friends knew where he was and took food and water up to him. He was up there four or five days and then he finally came down. I don't think he ever did learn how to swim. He was a well built boy and was a good athlete in football and baseball.

In the winter time, after it snowed, we would have a lot of fun sleigh riding and bob sledding. We made our own bob sled. We also made what we called crust bobs. Instead of regular runners on the sled, we used barrel staves. The front set of runners were fastened with a swivel bolt, a rope was fastened to each side to help guide it. It could only be used in a straight down path because the barrel stave runners couldn't do any good guiding it except to keep it going straight. We polished the runners smooth and the sled would really get you down the hill in a hurry.

My brother Donald (who went by the nickname "Dubb") and I owned a Flexibly Flyer sled, which was one of the best sleds made at that time. During the weekends we would start out in a group and go sledding on all the different hills on the Orphanage property and also on some of the adjoining farms. The owners didn't seem to mind

The boys and girls didn't have many occasions to socialize together. But, Pop Beamon would have corn roasts in the evenings during sweet corn season. There was a shelter with picnic tables in the glen, up across the main road. The shelter had a large fireplace where we roasted the corn. I never really had a so-called girl friend,

but there was a girl named Aida Mae Snyder who I liked a lot. On one occasion after the corn roast was over, I walked her back down to the main building. On the way down, while walking in the dark on the driveway, I managed to get to "smooch" her. I thought I was in heaven, but nothing came of it. We used to hang out on the park benches under the trees along the main road. We just had a good time talking. I lost track of her after I left the Orphanage. I later saw her obituary in our Alumni newsletter.

The Orphanage had its own bake shop. When I was about sixteen years old, I was assigned to work in the bakery. We had three kids and a full time baker (Shorty Persing). He was only about five feet tall, but he was a pretty good baker, that is, when he didn't show up a little drunk. He would give us the recipe for each batch of dough. Our assignment lasted about six months, due to the long learning period.

The most junior person was assigned to come in about five o'clock in the morning to load the mixer, which took about an hour. By the time the rest of the crew came in, the dough was ready to remove from the mixer and roll the dough. Again, the junior worker had to cut the dough and weight it on a small balance scale. After all the dough was cut and rolled in loaves, they were put in baking pans, five loaves to a pan. We had an oven about ten feet square, which was heated by a coal fire in one corner. The baker decided when the oven was ready; there was no control, except the judgment of Shorty, the baker. The oven had space for about ten pans of bread.

On Saturday, we usually made a couple large sheet cakes. This recipe was also determined by Shorty. It was mixed by hand in a large oval bowl. We didn't get to sample any of our baked goods, unless Shorty didn't show up, which didn't happen very often.

Shorty had another job for a while. He was in charge of laundry. The laundry had a large commercial type washing machine. The opening was about five feet wide. It could take an extremely large load. There was a large mangle where all the flat items were put through. There was a large extractor which removed the water from the wash. There was no dryer; all the clothes were hung out on about a half dozen clothes lines. Two boys were assigned the job of keeping the coal-fired broiler hot, and they did all the heavy lifting. The girls were assigned the job of ironing shirts, etc. All our clothes had our names marked with India ink, or a small patch with our name on them. Later on, a lady was hired to be in charge of the laundry.

When I was about twelve years old, Dubb and I built a small chicken coop. Uncle Ralph brought us some chickens, but no rooster. Dubb and I got a few eggs from them. When they stopped laying, I guess we killed them and ate them. John Campbell had a Grandfather who came on weekends and built him a beautiful small chicken coop. He furnished him with several bantam hens and a rooster. My brother Dubb had a dog which was about six months old. One day while we were at school, his dog got loose and got into John Campbell's chicken coop and killed most of the chickens, including the rooster. That upset Dubb so bad that he killed the dog. I watched him do it and it upset me to no end. John Campbell never replaced his chickens. His chicken coop was used to house one of our dogs after that.

When I was about twelve years old, Uncle Ralph came to the Orphanage to get permission to take Dubb and me to my Mother's for Thanksgiving dinner. Mr. Beamon told him it just wasn't done. Uncle Ralph asked whether or not this was a jail. He then went to the head of the Odd Fellows, who happened to live in Shamokin, to get his permission. This person (a Mr. Lark), called Mr. Beamon and instructed him to let Uncle Ralph take us. This upset Mr. Beamon to no end. He told Uncle Ralph to take us and he didn't

care if he every brought us back.

I think it was later that same year that my Grandfather passed away. Uncle Ralph came again to see Mr. Beamon to get permission to take us to the funeral. This time, he gave permission without any hassle.

These situations must have had an impact on the Odd Fellows organization, because the following summer they began giving all the kids a two-week leave to go to their parent or some relative.

PAST GRAND'S COUNCIL INSTITUTED IN ERIE COUNTY

There were approximately 300 Past Grands present at the institution of a new Council for Erie County on Saturday, February 15, in the hall of Clement Lodge, No. 220, Union City. They came from many counties in Western Pennsylvania, including Warren, Elk, Forest, Erie, Venango, Crawford, Butler, Mercer, and Allegheny, and many were admitted to the new body.

Two Sessions were held, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and 7 o'clock in the evening. The Degree Staff and members of Warren and Forest County Council, No. 1, the first Council to be instituted in Pennsylvania, were present to exemplify the degree with R.J. Abbott, of Sugar Grove, the Degree Master, in charge. The orchestra of Warren Lodge accompanied the staff and enlivened the occasion with superb playing.

At the afternoon session a class of 25 received the degree, and Erie County Council was instituted by J. Harvey Backus, of Andover, N.Y., President of the New York State council and author of the ritual of the organization, assisted by Lloyd Babcock, Deputy Grand Master of New York. Officers of the Erie Council were elected as follows: President, G.L. Kapple, Union City; Vice President. C.L. Auer, Corry; Past President, C.E. Briside; Treasurer, F.H. Hillyer.

Dinner was served to the visitors at 6 o'clock, and when the evening session was resumed another class was initiated, making the total for the day bout 60. About 100 had been expected, but cold weather interfered. Twenty-seven Lodges were represented, and

WHEN WILL THE TIDE TURN?

Figures presented by the Grand Secretary in the last issue of this paper will cause the thinking person to ponder – not the figures for 1929 alone, but the tabulated statement indicating a steady decline from 1920. And the better informed are aware that this condition exists not only in Pennsylvania, but throughout the entire jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

Valiant efforts are being made here and there to stem the tide, in Pennsylvania and other Grand Jurisdictions, and while meeting with success in the territory immediately contingent, great expanses that are not reached by their lack of cooperation are more than neutralizing the value of the extra work, so that even in the best working Grand Jurisdictions an even break is considered good news.

One of the points made recently by the Grand Sire was that it was not only Odd Fellowship that was suffering recession, but other fraternal bodies were in even worse shape than ours, which perhaps, reveals a condition of indifference more general than we are accustomed to think of as we read of Odd Fellowship's losses. When you come to think of it, does not the same apply to the Church and to other organizations of your own knowledge? What is it, then?

Many years ago Louis Cosset, Hungarian lawyer, orator, and journalist, warned the people of the American Republic: "If shipwreck should ever befall your country, the rock upon which it will split will be your devotion to your private interests at the expense of your duty to the state."

About the time the loss in membership in our Order began to be noticed in high places, an editorial appeared in the *Kansas City Times* which aroused the citizens of that city by suggesting that present-day conditions were pretty much caused by the thing Cosset had warned against when it said:

"The wave that is sweeping over Kansas City is not a crime wave, but a wave of lazy, indifferent, selfish, smug citizenship . . . What is this citizenship doing about crime waves? . . . Curled up like an overstuffed house cat before the fire, it lazily rubs its sleek belly, stretches, opens one heavy-lidded eye and inquires indifferently why somebody doesn't do something about those street robberies and

murders... This crime wave is of Kansas City's own creation... born of its... lust for private indulgence at expense of public organization. There's your crime wave, Kansas City. Look at it! it's your own, bone of your bone and flesh of your flesh. How do you like it?

If that is what is the matter with the country in general, then Odd Fellowship, based and organized on the Republican system, with these people forming its membership, can hardly be expected to escape the consequent effects of loss by lack of effort necessary for expansion. "Devotion to private interests at the expense of the Order" is how we read it in this case. And how true it seems in that sense right now.

But nations do not as a rule fail by default, and even though it seems all too true that this country is headed toward that kind of disaster, wiser heads will see that this does not happen, and the day may not be far distant when the people of the United States will again devote more of their time to interests of the State, and when that day comes they will also devote more time to the Church, the Lodge and other organizations, and Odd Fellowship may in that day rise to greater achievements than ever.

Hasten that day!

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1-1/2 pounds boneless beef round steak, cut into six pieces

1 medium onion, cut into 1/4-inch slices

1 celery rib, cut into 1/2 inch slices

2 cans (8 ounces each) tomato sauce
