AFTER 60 YEARS

De Ette Kope, a member of Susannah Rebekah Lodge #247 and a niece of Kathryn Bush, was reunited with her sister, Dorothy Couch, in December 2004 after being separated for sixty years. Their mother died at age 28. The girls were raised by their grandmother until she became ill, then the girls were put in foster homes and got separated.

After they grew up and got married, thus the different names, they tried to find each other but finally gave up thinking the other one had died until De Etta Kope was visiting her own children for the Thanksgiving Holidays last year and stopped in Dalton, GA, the Whitfield county seat to get a copy of her birth certificate. She asked the County Clerk to check the records to see if there was any death certificate for her sister Dorothy on file. Finding none gave her the urge to again search for her sister. Her husband of 50 years, Fred Kope, found the name of Sam Whisanant in a phone directory for Dalton and Cohutta, GA. De Ette knew her mother had a brother by that name. By luck a cousin by that name, a dentist, was found and by phone said, I know where your sister is. I just made her teeth.

The next day the sisters talked by phone for two hours. They were reunited two days before Christmas and spent two weeks together in February.

As they grow closer now, they talk of old times and different lives. It's a good thing we have telephones!

Many thanks to all who are sending in articles. It is your interest and help that keeps the Magazine going.


My hope for all of you is – you have a great summer – also, hope to see you at Session.

of a side event at the 13th Commission of Sustainable Development at the United Nations (U.N.). Their work will also be published in an upcoming issue of Citizen Science.

The writing competition was conducted by Citizen Science, the science and technology program of a non-governmental organization (NGO) known as Sustain US. The Citizen Scientist competition honors young people in the United States who are enriching public dialogue with innovative, scientific approaches to sustainable development.

Both seniors, who were the only winners in a nation-wide competition that consid-

ered applicants between the ages of 13 and 26, say the opportunity to present their research at the U.N. was exciting.

"The experience I had at the U.N. was incredible, Norelli says. "The concentration of the week was to create an actual policy to be used to alleviate poverty, and being involved in this process opened my eyes to the power of text in law making. And while my presentation may not have yielded any tangible results in helping to end poverty, it awakened me to the possibilities that young people have to make a positive impact on the world."

Norelli, a mechanical engineering major, viewed the competition as an opportu-

nity to apply classroom knowledge to the real world. During the course of his research on global poverty, Norelli concentrated on simple science that could benefit the poorest individuals in rural India. Compared to more expensive, high-tech development projects. Norelli's paper focused on converting biological waste materials onto fuel resources. Rather than looking to create new science to be used to help impoverished people, efforts should be made to implement existing, practical science and technologies in poverty stricken areas," Norelli says.

Blane, an environmental engineer, is also interested in reusing waste as a means of sustaining de elopment. Working closely with Arm Sendunta professor of civil and environmental engineering at Lehigh, Blane combined the work of two graduate students of the amount of waste that is created by well-brane and later used to improve water purification in countries such as India, where water prisoned by arsenic.

After graduating in May, Norelli will be working in product development for Ingersoll-Rand Blancy plans to stay at Lehigh to earn his master's degree, and may consider working for an NGO in the future.

REFLECTIONS

An Autobiographical Glimpse of My Life In the I.O.O.F. Orphanage in Sunbury, Pennsylvania

The following story has been submitted by Brother Bob Betzer of Lewisburg who was raised in the Sunbury Home. The article was written by one of his childhood buddies who grew up at the Home with him. Bob felt the article best described life in an Odd Fellows Orphanage. Due to the size of the article and wonderful pictures submitted, we will be breaking it up over the next several months. I hope you enjoy the history.

CONCLUSION

We had several epidemics of measles and mumps, but I was fortunate not to come down with any of them; but one Sunday in late summer I was feeling ill, so the caretaker excused me from going to church (our church was at 2:00 PM on Sundays). As evening came, I got worse, so I was sent to our sick room. By morning, I couldn't stand or walk. The doctor came and examined me the next day, but he didn't know what my ailment was. I was kept isolated. Mrs. Beamon brought me my meals. I was in bed for about two weeks. Years later, I told my family doctors about it. He

saidhe thought I had rheumatic fever.

My brother Dubb, along with Allen Engle and Harry Stutts, built a shack next to mine and Walpy's. It had four rooms and a porch. Two rooms up and two down. An inside ladder was used to get into the upper level. One evening during our study hall, a fire broke out in their shack. Of course, with it being so close to ours, it also caught fire. They were a total loss, and we never rebuilt them.

When I advanced to ninth or tenth grade, our


school was designated as a township school (Upper Augusta Township).

We participated in baseball, football and basketball with other small schools in the area. I wasn't that great of an athlete, but I participated. We usually had a pretty good baseball team. Maybe it was because we were always playing the game. We had a player (Hunkie Tasker) who was exceptionally good at pitching and batting. Pop Beamon used to give him a dollar every time he hit a home run. Our right field was next to the railroad track, and Hunkie would hit a ball on to the tracks during almost every game.

Hunkie was also an excellent football player. But Hunkie got himself and his girl friend into trouble with Pop Beamon. He and the girl were caught doing something most boys would like to do, and Pop Beamon caught them in the act. They were discharged from the Orphanage. Hunkie went on to play football at a school in the Shamokin area.

We had athletic coaches who doubled as caretakers in the older boys building. We had one coach who took one of the older girls into his room and Pop Beamon caught him at that too. Needless to say, he was fired immediately. Walpy was a year older than me and he left the Orphanage in 1935. I seemed to be lost without him. My brother Dubb left the previous year.

I took a liking to a younger boy, Bobby Betzer. I became his big brother. I used to do a lot of things with Bobby. I saw him at a

reunion in 1987. He has been very active in the Odd Fellows organization, ever since he left the Orphanage.

In the year 1935 we had an exceptional football team. We had only about twenty or so players, but we were well coached. My best memory of that year was when we played the Milton Hershey High School from Hershey, Pennsylvania. They brought a couple bus loads of boys, about five or six full teams. We beat them six to nothing. I will never forget that game. One Saturday that same year we were playing Trevorton. We were permitted to use the Northumberland High School field to play. During the game, I saw my brother and Harold Kline, our cousin, on the side lines. I wanted to talk with him, because I hadn't seen him since he left the orphanage, but I was unable to After the game, I decided to ride my bike to Trevorton so I could see him.

Trevorton is about eleven miles away with a lot of hills and one mountain to cross. I got to Trevorton about eight or nine o'clock after dark, only to find that Dubb and our cousins had left the football game and went directly back to their CCC Camp at Watrus, Pennsylvania. I was not only tired from playing football and riding the bike all that way, but extremely disappointed not to see Dubb. I got up about five the next morning and rode my bike back to the Orphanage. The house mother and many of the other boys didn't even know I was gone.

After the shacks burned down. I got to hanging around with





Miss Lark, is next, who taught me English; Miss Curry taught vocal music; Miss Garner taught me in the third and fourth grades and also Biology; Uncle Bill (I can't remember his last name but we called him Uncle Bill) taught our shop classes. He is the one who instructed us how to install the spokes in our bicycle wheel. Last is Miss Tietsworth, she taught me my commercial classes; typing, short hand and bookkeeping.

Allen Engel. We built a shack down in the woods below the area where our other shack was. Engle somehow god hold of a 22 caliber target pistol. It had an eight-inch barrel and was real accurate. He also had a shotgun. We became acquainted with a family who lived a short way off of Snydertown Road on Cold Run Road. This family was not the type that we should have been associating with, as they were pretty heavy drinkers. This was at the time of prohibition. This guy would give Engel home-made beer, and he gave Engel the recipe for making home brew. Engel got hold of a five-gallon crock, got the ingredients and proceeded to make some home brew. After it was done fermenting, he put it into two quart jars. I went with him up to Cold Run and he gave this guy a sample. Of course, he approved of it. Engel would drink it and get a little drunk and a lot sick, but that didn't stop him. He also made a batch of dandelion wine. He also drank that at times and got terribly sick. One evening that shack caught fire and burned to the ground. There were some pretty good fireworks while his ammunition was exploding in the fires. We combed through the ashes and found the remains of his pistol and shotgun.

Engel was a smoker, and he chewed tobacco. His choice of tobacco was "True Blue." It was a stringy type of tobacco that could also be chewed. He smoked a pipe and rolled his own cigarettes. One night I tried smoking his pipe. It made me sick and I went out in the woods and threw up. Sometime later I tried chewing his tobacco and I got sick and threw up from it also. Needless to say, I never acquired the habit.


I became eighteen years old just prior to my senior year in high school, due to my being held back a year in the third grade. Since we had to leave the Orphanage at eighteen years of age, I had to leave and start my senior year at Trevorton High School. After spending fourteen years of my life in the Orphanage, I was with deep apprehension about leaving. I went to Trevorton to live with my mother. Before leaving, the superintendent took me into Sunbury to a men's store and bought me a new suit, shirt, tie and shoes. The next day, I was taken home to my Mom's house in Trevorton.

FROM GRANDMA'S KITCHEN

Chilled Strawberry Soup

5 cups sliced strawberries

2 cups half and half

1 (8-oz.) container sour cream

3/4 cup sifted powdered sugar

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

Garnishes: whipped cream, strawberry slices, and fresh mint springs (optional)

Place 5 cups strawberries in container of electric blender or food processor; process until smooth, stopping once to scrape down sides.

Transfer strawberry puree to large bowl; add half and half and next 3 ingredients, stirring with a wire whisk until smooth. Cover and chill for at least 2 hours. Serve in chilled bowl; garnish if desired.

Summer Fruit Salad with Poppy Seed Dressing

1 small head romaine lettuce

2 kiwi fruit, peeled and sliced (about 1 cup)

2 cups halved strawberries

1/2 fresh pineapple, cored, peeled, and cubed (about 2 cups cubed) Poppy Seed Dressing

Line a platter with lettuce leaves; arrange fruit on lettuce. Serve immediately with Poppy Seed Dressing.

Poppy Seed Dressing

1 cup vegetable oil

3/4 cup sugar

1/3 cup white vinegar

2 tablespoons minced onion

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

1-1/2 teaspoons poppy seeds

Combine first 6 ingredients in a medium saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar dissolves. Stir in poppy seeds. Cover and chill. Stir before serving. Yield: 1-1/2 cups.

Cake - Topped Strawberry - Rhubarb Dessert

3 cups sliced fresh rhubarb

2 cups sliced fresh strawberries

1-1/2 cups sugar, divided

3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca

2 teaspoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons plus 1/4 cup butter, softened, divided

1 egg

1-1/2 cups flour

1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup milk

Heavy whipping cream, optional

In a large bowl, combine rhubarb, strawberries, 1 cup sugar, tapioca, and lemon juice. Pour into a greased 8-inch square baking dish. Dot with 2 tablespoons butter.

In a large mixing bowl, cream the remaining butter and sugar. Beat in egg. Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Spoon over fruit mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes or until a toothpick inserted comes out clean.

BECKY'S BACKYARD

- When rewinding a cord back onto the appliance (vacuum cleaners, specifically), try to rewind it in a different direction each time. This helps to minimize those wear marks that can turn into dangerous cracks, which expose wires.
- 2. When reheating rolls, buns, or any other baked items in the microwave oven, cover the food with a damp paper towel for a softer, fresher product.
- 3. Discarding glass: Save metal coffee cans to use for throwing away light bulbs and other glass. When the can is full, put the lid on and put it in the garbage.
- 4. Trashed catalogs can lead to identity theft. Remove all address labels and shred them; also the pre-addressed order blank
- 5. Bacon Cooking: Freezing cooked bacon for later use in BLT's, etc., is a great timesaver and kitchen-mess saver. Use a shield to minimize grease spatters, drain the bacon and blot excess grease with paper towels. Then separate layers with waxed paper and store in a covered container (in the freezer).
- 6. Have unidentified photos. For the benefit of future generations, write the names and dates on the backs of all photos. (Be sure to use a special pen or pencil made for writing on photos) and include a caption. Keep one copy of important photos in a fireproof safe or safety-deposit box.

Founded during the 17th century in Europe, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows came to the United States in 1819 and to Pennsylvania in 1823, when the Order was chartered in Philadelphia.

At the present time there are 291 Odd Fellow Lodges, comprised of approximately 16,000 members in the Commonwealth, and the Rebekah Branch of the organization supports 255 Lodges with a total membership of some 13,000 women. In addition, the Order is supplemented by three smaller branches, the Encampment Branch, the Patriarch Militant Branch and the Ladies Auxiliary of the Patriarch Militant Branch.

The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs of Pennsylvania have dedicated themselves for 157 years to the fulfillment of their primary goals — to relive the distressed, to educate the orphaned, to give proper burial to members and to "do good where good should be done." In their quest to uphold these principles, they have undertaken a number of community service related projects, but their work has been highlighted by a few very admirable and special programs.

The Order provides financial support for research programs specifically concerned with diseases of the eye, particularly one at Johns Hopkins University, where they have already invested over \$2 million in the study of such afflictions, and it maintains its own eye donor program. The Odd Fellows also sponsor a program whereby young Pennsylvanians can secure loans for educational purposes, and they are responsible each year for sending 300 to 400 students on a weeklong tour of the United Nations. Finally the organization maintains two homes for aged members, one in Middletown and one in Grove City, both of which are equipped with modern professional facilities.

The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs of the Keystone State have demonstrated a high level of dedication to their fellow human beings through their active and direct involvement within the communities of their individual lodges and the Commonwealth as a whole.

Therefore, I Dick Thornburgh, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby proclaim June 22-28, 1980 as ODD FELLOWS AND REBEKAH WEEK in recognition of the valuable service provided to our citizens by the member of these organizations.

GIVEN under my hand and the Seal of the Governor, at the City of Harrisburg, this sixth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighty, and of the Commonwealth the two hundred and fourth.
