
He was a member of Dr. Edwards Memorial Congregational Church, Edwardsville.

# **CONNOQUENESSING LODGE #278**

As you have already heard my name is Cara Banks and I had the privilege of going on the 2006 United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth. The 10-day journey hit five different states as well as Canada. The trek began on July 8th in Harrisburg. When I first arrived at our hotel I met 54 perfect strangers. 52 of them were students just like me but the other two were our adult chaperones, mom and pop with whom we all became very attached.

That first afternoon was spent touring Gettysburg. We toured the battlefields, saw Big and Little Round Top, Devil's Den and saw how to load both a cannon and a musket. After our day in Gettysburg we had dinner with our families at the American Legion. It was a very nice get-acquainted session. All the delegates were announced by name with the lodge that had sponsored them. This dinner was when I met my best friend of the trip Kayla.

After Harrisburg, we went to Philadelphia for the afternoon. We saw historical places and things like the Liberty Bell, clock tower, Independence Hall and of course the mall. My favorite part of Philly was definitely seeing the Liberty Bell, because in school every American history class that I've ever taken we've discussed the Liberty Bell and then actually being able to see it in person was amazing.

When the afternoon came to a close we started the long bus ride to NYC. New York was the city that I was most excited to see. I had never really been in a large city so I was really eager to see what it was like. We crossed the huge bridge into the city and I was really eager to see what it was like. With all the buildings and lights and the hustle and bustle I knew right then how it got

the name the city that never sleeps. We went straight to our hotel, which was on 7th avenue, caddycorner to Madison Square Garden and called the Affinia Manhattan. In New York we met up with about 200 other students from around the country who were going on the same trip as us... there was even a small group from Germany that was on this trip. We got room assignments and met the people that would be our roommates for the next four days. One of my roommates Ashley grew to be a very good friend on the trip and later in other cities we were actually put in the



same room together again.

The next day was our first day on the floor of UN, and to be completely honest I wasn't sure what to expect. The United Nations building is incredible to look at with all of the member nations flags in the air in front of the building it is really a sight to see. There are many monuments around the building.

The Revolver

As you will notice the end of the revolver's barrel is tied obviously making the gun useless. This symbolizes what the UN does on a daily basis. They try to keep fighting from happening in turn giving everyone in the world a peaceful place to live.

The Golden Globe

The golden globe is used to represent the world. The massive gashes taken out of the once smooth figure signify the toll that war/unrest has on its people.

Inside the building there are many different pieces of artwork that denote the whole purpose of the United Nations for instance there is the:

Golden Rule

Do unto others, as you would have them do unto you. This is a mosaic that depicts people of different nationalities, origin, and customs, they all are wearing different colors and styles but as you see in the picture they are all together as one. Even though they are together they still are made of those tiny pieces of stone, which represent the people as individuals as well.

Dove of Peace

It is a dove flying with an olive branch in its beak. The artwork is a mosaic. The little pieces that make up the dove are all the countries that are seeking peace. It yet again shows us what the UN does for countries around the world on a daily basis.

Inside the actual UN building we were in the General Assembly room for 5 different briefings that spanned over a 2-day period our topics included:

Peacekeeping

Terrorism

Human Trafficking

**UN** Overview

Human Assistance

This part of the trip was by far the most interesting. I learned so many things that I didn't know about the UN and what they do every single day.

In New York all of the students were required to give a prepared speech the topic was: "How do the United Nations' efforts in Humanitarian Assitance, constitutional development and peacekeeping make the world a more peaceful place in which to live?" This topic was a relatively easy one for me because the briefings that I mentioned earlier hit this subject constantly so we had ample knowledge to talk about it.

This was my speech:

Do you remember how in school when at the top of the list of rules and regulations there was that one rule that you had to abide by? The one that says "NO FIGHTING". Well what if that rule wasn't in existence and fighting was a normal everyday occurance? For some people living in countries throughout the world there isno peace and there are no guidelines by which to live. With those two problems combined therein lied another issue. Those people are not only deprived of their rights as human beings (as stated in the charter of the UN) but they do not have the resources to even survive. That is where the United Nations comes into play.

The United Nations was formed in 1945 as a successor of the League of Nations. It consist of 6 main parts that work as a whole to help people with issues affecting their lives and way of living. The UN is very much involved in Humanitarian Assistance. For example currently in the dispute in Iraq, food and clean water was given to civilians immediately after the fall of Saddam Hussein's reign of terror. Without that sustenance hundreds, even thousands of people would have died. The Indonesian tsunami, which took place two Decembers ago, hit 14 different countries from Asia to Africa killing approximately 225,000 people. Just two days following this natural disaster the international community consisting of 47 countries (14 of which were members of the UN) joined forces to bring humanitarian assistance to the people of India. These nations with the help of the UN provided people with food, clean water, clothes, immunizations for diseases and housing all within weeks of their arrival. The UN is a breeding ground for new ideas on ways to help humanity as a whole. Organizations such as UNICEF, World Food Program and UNIFEM have been created and presented to the world as a way of raising both funds and awareness of important issues.

Another issue on the UN's agenda is constitutional development. What is a country without an organized government? NOTHING! It has been proven that without a given set of laws, regulations, and standards a country or state will inevitably fall... normally within 5 years of the signing of a cease-fire agreement. Currently the United States is very much involved in helping the people of Iraq draft their own Constitution.. but they are not doing it alone. The UN has over 5,000 people stationed in Iraq assisting with the drafting of important government documents.



The last thing to discuss is the UN's involvement in peacekeeping. The United Nations was created after WWII to save people all over the world from the hellish terrors of war. When disputes occur in nations around the globe the United Nations sends in peacekeepers to mediate the situation. These people not only help with violent situations amongst people but they specialize in mine clearance, electoral support, elections and lastly humanitarian assistance. Somalia is a nation where tensions are high and international conflict is even higher. Peacekeepers were sent into the nation to ease tension and help stop the fighting. Many to this day are still there but things are really looking up for those civilians who have lived that way their entire lives.

The United Nations has been in existence for 61 years. They have given food, water and shelter to millions of people. They have helped numerous countries write constitutions and have prevented thus far WWIII from occurring. The United Nations like anything else in this world may not be flawless but look at what they have done for people around the glove. They deserve the belief and appreciation people everywhere.

Other than spending two days at the UN Building we did a tone of touring in the city. We spent time on Fifth Avenue, Trump Towers, Rockefeller Center, St. Patrick's Cathedral and the Empire State building. St. Patrick's Cathedral is an amazing architectural feature of New York. It is enormous and in the entrance the different saints are carved into the building itself. An I definitely know why you can't drop pennies off the Empire State building either it is just too tall... that would be dangerous. We spent a whole day in NYC touring Ground Zero, Battery Park and we took the Ferry to Liberty Island and Ellis Island. We also while in New York got to see a show on Broadway. We went and saw the Phantom of the Opera. We had nose bleed seats but it didn't matter anyway the music was powerful it didn't matter how close or far away from the stage you were it was a new experience for me and I loved it. We also had a little bit of free time in the city to travel around with a small group and do a little shopping so we had to visit the famous shopping places like Saks, Macy's, coach, Tiffany's. Another thing that we did was one night at the hotel in the ballroom there was a talent show that everyone who wanted to could participate in, some people did skits, some sang, danced, played the piano. That was so much cun and it was good for all of us because we were still not really acquainted with everyone yet and it gave us the opportunity to see everyone's silly side.


But after five days we had to say goodbye to our newfound friends. And head for Boston we are breakfast at a lodge in Connecticut called the Good Shepard Lodge other than our dinner with our families at the beginning of the week that was the first time we had stopped for a meal at a lodge and that was a cool experience. Because the lodge men and women welcomed us in and treated us so nicely even though they didn't know us. After riding a few hours we were ahead of schedule so we stopped at a beach somewhere. We had been pinned on that bus for hours and needed to get out of there for a while. He hit Boston and then Salem. In Salem we saw a museum that was focused on the Salem Witch Trials that was informative because I hadn't really learned about that in school yet, and had some out of this world seafood. This night was rather interesting one for all of us kids because when we went back to the hotel we all went swimming in the pool and sitting in the hot

tub and some of the boys were kind of messing around and one of the kids Erik actually got hit in the head with a heel while swimming in the pool and had to go to the hospital with a minor concussion and ger 12 stitches. That wasn't good at all but we all were secretly a little thankful that Erik had to go to the hospital because he got home really early in the morning and was so tired that we all got a few extra hours of sleep. For the rest of the trip when we were all so tired we would ask him if his stitches felt OK or if he needed to have them checked out in hopes that we would get to sleep in a little bit.

After Massachusetts we went to Canada. On the way we stopped at two different lodges for meals. After a very long time on the bus we made it to Ottawa and toured Parliament. That was really fascinating because to be honest the only thing I knew about Parliament is that they have a queen and that is about the extent of it. But we got to tour the Parliament building, which is really big and very intricately designed. In one of the rooms you look up and the stone that it's made out of has faces carved into it and our tour guide was telling us who all of these faces were and then she pointed to two of the corners and told us that those faces weren't anyone famous but they were the carvers. She said that when they were carving the faces a supervisor came to see their progress and didn't like a few of the faces on the ceiling and that offended the men so to kind of get a little but of revenge they carved their own faces into the ceiling just to spite the man who told their carvings weren't perfect. While in Canada we also went to Ontario and saw Niagara Falls.

After Niagara Falls, our day came to a close and it was time to head home. The drive from Canada was really good. By that time we were all so comfortable around each other that a group of my good friends and I just sat around and talked, played cards, played eye spy and watched movies. When our bus arrived in State College it was time to say goodbye. That was the hardest part of the trip because we had all gotten so attached. I remember when we were first getting to know each other mom and pop kept telling us that we would get so attached that at the end of the trip we would cry when we had to leave. No one believed them and thought that was just ridiculous... but let me tell you it was very sad saying goodbye to the people I had become so close to. To this day I still keep in contact with some of my friends on the trip. I want to thank every one of you from the bottom of my heart for the experience you gave to me. I learned a conglomeration of things that I had no clue about before my journey; I made new friends and have memories to last a lifetime.

In the words of Henry David Thoreau "To acquire knowledge, one must study; but to acquire wisdom, one must observe". From my trip I have learned both knowledge and wisdom once again thank you for everything you have put into this trip. It really was the trip of a lifetime.

Last summer, she worked in the pharmacy at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania and plans to spend this summer interning at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.



# ARMED FORCES DAY PARADE STIRS MEMORIES

In 1950 President Harry S Truman declared the third Saturday in May as Armed Forces Day, designed to replace the old system of Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force Days. This was in keeping with the unification of the armed forces under the Defense Department.

In Reading, leaders of the Regular and Reserve Armed Forces and community leaders called a meeting to form a committee to plan an observation in the city. As military editor of the Reading Eagle I went to "cover" the meeting and report on the plans.

Before the night ended I found myself a member of the committee and it was 20 years later before I finally retired from the group.

This year, thanks to the Williams Family Restaurant, 1701 Kutztown Road, in Reading, and its manager, Gaylene Seibert, I had an opportunity to again participate in the parade.

The restaurant is constantly doing things to thank the veterans of all wars and the personnel now in the armed forces. They have many elaborate displays of photos and memorabilia from many wars and do all they can to honor our fighting forces.

This year the restaurant engaged three motorized trolleys and filled them with veterans and their spouses who then rode in the parade and were honored as they passed the reviewing stand.

The parade isn't as big as it was in the early days, a half century ago. The crowds along Penn Street are thinner and scattered.

But Reading can be proud that it is one of only a few communities, other than those supported by active military facility, which still carries on the tradition of a parade honoring the armed forces.

In those early days, there were about 10,000 active members of the Reserve Components stationed in Berks County and the reserve and National Guard units would all come out in force for the parade.

The government seemed to have more money to provide static displays, fly-bys and displays of aircraft at the Reading Airport, and to assign a marching unit of regular troops from one of the services.

Most of the members of that first committee which met in the local Army Reserve Center are gone now. The reserve center itself is abandoned and crumbling. But thanks to a new group of volunteers, the tradition goes on in Reading.

And thanks to Gaylene and Williams Family Restaurant, the veterans of the area are not being forgotten.

I wear a cap showing my World War II unit. I am pleased to report that many people, young and old, read my cap and thank me for serving.

# STRASBURG CEMETERY FLAG DISPLAY HONORS THE CASUALTIES OF WAR

What started as 40 flags placed in the Strasburg Cemetery to honor the U.S. casualties in Iraq and Afghanistan in 2003 has grown into a more artistic arrangement of 3830 flags this year. The creation which includes a series of flags in the shape of a star and the number "one" fashioned from silk white carnations, and was on display from Memorial Day thru Flag Day.

Strasburg Odd Fellow Donald Bachman buys the flags and he and volunteers spent 61/2 hours creating the display.

The star is in a circular area that had a diseased tree that had to be removed, the star is 20' with the #1 in the middle of the star.

Don has fashioned 10 tools with spikes that make the placement of the flags easier to put into the ground. Visitors learn the star represents Pennsylvania the second state in the union and the number one represents the service men & women who are first in someone's family and are casualties from the state.

The points of the star represents the 5 branches of our military and their flag.

In another area a group of repaired flags represents the 26,000 plus men & women who were injured and should not be forgotten. Another group of 23 flags honors our own loval vets who have made the last call.

The work to create the display did not end when they put it up but periodically I have had to return to straighten the flags after a storm. I enjoy this because in the evening there are ghost tours in Strasburg and the people get to see the display but also a ghost letter from G.I. Joe. He enjoys seeing their faces and comments when they read his letter.

It is not cheap to have freedom like you have there. You know the only real peace is when you arrive up here. The young soldiers are getting very agitated when they see the politicians trying to control the way for political gain and stirring up the home folks. You must remember when the trouble started your president said this will take a long time. How you forget. Your young men & women joined the service to keep you free just like they did in the past. This war is not like any war they fought before. These people hide behind their own to make you look like the terrorists, they are without feelings about their women and children getting killed. Our boys do feel the pain of hurting the innocent. God will help them through the hard time. You have to believe, life has you making tough calls all the time and if you are a believer it will all work out in the end.

Keep believing and fly all that red, white and blue. The devil hates it, we love it.

### FRESH FRUIT PARFAITS

4 ounces reduced-fat mixed berry yogurt

3/4 cup reduced-fat whipped topping

1 cup sliced ripe bananas

1 cup fresh strawberries, sliced

1 cup cubed fresh pineapple

1 cup fresh blueberries

4 whole strawberries

In a small bowl, combine yogurt and whipped topping; set aside 4 teaspoons for topping, spoon half remaining yogurt mixture into 4 parfait glasses; layer with half of the banana, sliced strawberries, pineapple and blueberries. Repeat layers. Top each parfait with reserved yogurt mixture and a whole strawberry. Chill until serving. Yield: 4 servings.

### CHICKEN SALAD IN TOMATO CUPS

4 large tomatoes

2 cups finely chopped cooked chicken

3/4 cup mayonnaise

1/2 cup chopped pecans

1/4 cup chopped celery

1 Tbsp. diced pimentos

1 Tbsp. lime juice

1/8 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

Cut a thin slice off the top of each tomato, scoop out pulp, leaving 1/2-inch shells. In a large bowl, combine the remaining ingredients. Spoon into tomatoes. Serve immediately. Yield: 4 servings.

#### PINEAPPLE-CARAMEL SPONGE CAKES

1 can (8 ounces) unsweetened crushed pineapple, drained 1/2cup caramel ice cream topping

4 individual round sponge cakes

1 pint vanilla ice cream

In a small saucepan, combine pineapple and caramel topping. Cook over medium heat for 2-3 minutes or until heated through, stirring occasionally. Place sponge cakes on dessert plates. Top each with a scoop of ice cream and 1/4 cup pineapple sauce. Serve immediately. Yield: 4 servings.
