### Frosty the Snowman

Barney was still home from school on his Christmas break in January 1951. He was thinking of retiring from his teaching job, but he didn't have a plan for his retirement. He would have a small pension, but he didn't think working full-time on the farm would keep his mind active. His wife chased him out of the kitchen, so he settled into his easy chair and turned on the radio. Then he heard it, Frosty the Snowman. He listened intently and when the song was over, he searched the radio dial to see if he could hear it again.

Barney told his wife he needed to go into town to get something. He drove in to the record shop and purchased a 78 rpm record of Frosty the Snowman. He took the record home and made notes as he listened to it a dozen times.

Sitting back in his chair Barney remembered the events that brought about the song. It was a cold, snowy January day over 50 years ago. Barney was a youth. The children in the neighborhood built a snowman. Barney found an old top hat outside a building that was being torn down. He picked up the top hat and it seemed warm. When he returned with the hat, his friends had already put a button nose and eyes made out of coal. They put a corn cob pipe in his mouth and a scarf around his neck. Barney placed the hat on him and he started to shake. One of the kids in the neighborhood ran to get the local cop. The cop, thinking the kids were pulling a joke on him, went along with the gag. The cop yelled stop and the snowman started to melt. The cop thought we were playing a trick on him and walked away.

The song had lots of facts wrong and exaggerated others, but Barney recognized the story. Barney had kept the old top hat. He just couldn't remember exactly where it

was. He decided he would go up to the attic to see if he could find it. After wandering around a disorganized jumble of boxes and trunks, he noticed one corner of the attic was a little warmer than the rest. He found a box that was warm to the touch in a cold attic. He opened the box and found the old top hat had fallen apart. There was an area in the box that was almost hot. When he picked up a piece of the hat, a metal three-link pin fell out. It looked almost like an Odd Fellows pin.

Barney wanted to know more about the pin and why it felt so warm. Barney knew one of his lodge brothers was a jeweler, so he stuck the pin in his pocket and went into town. Joe had been a jeweler a long time, served in most lodge offices and seen, cleaned, repaired and sold most types of Odd Fellow jewelry. Joe put his eyepiece on his eyeglasses and examined the pin carefully. He told Barney he had seen one pin like it before. It was at a jewelry show in Philadelphia. It was exhibited as a selfheating pin. Joe pulled the papers on the show from a dusty file. The show had been in 1939. The exhibitor was an antique dealer in Baltimore. Joe gave Barney the name, address and telephone number of the antique dealer.

Barney went home and tried to call the antique dealer on the phone. The number was out of service. Barney called the Baltimore operator and got a new number. After several attempts at telephone contact, Barney finally got an answer. An elderly voice announced "Paul's Antiques." Barney explained the details of his inquiry. Paul brightened up. He told Barney he was closed most of the time, but he would open up whenever Barney could come to Baltimore.

Barney had to go back to school the next day, so he arranged to go to Paul's Antiques the following Saturday. Barney got up Saturday and went to the train station for the ride to Baltimore. Even though the weather was

Barney did not know what he was observing. He asked Paul if he could give an explanation. Paul began the story.

"These pins were made by Thomas Wildey. They were all made from the same buggy spring. They were given to the original five Odd Fellows and were infused with some special quality by Wildey himself. They were separated many years ago. I spent a lifetime putting the four together and I thought the fifth was lost. Yours completes the set."

Barney told Paul to place the fifth pin in the box and the box started to shake. The pins began to glow, but resumed room temperature. Barney asked if Paul understood what was happening, since he didn't.

Paul replied, "I understand a little. Odd Fellows glow when five or more meet together."

Barney told Paul to keep the pin. He didn't want any money. Paul was a bit surprised. He pulled a beautiful old Odd Fellows pocket watch from under the counter. "At least let me give you this," Paul said. Barney accepted.





Deputy Sovereign Grand Master Brothers and Sisters

I bring fraternal greetings from the Manchester Unity Independent Order of Odd Fellows and our Grand Master Sister Daphine. It is a great honor to be here for your Sessions and I have listened with interest to your procedures. There was a point on August 10th I felt I would never get here. For those of you who may be interested, the position I hold in Manchester is Director of Ceremonies for our Grand Master who is our equivalent to your Sovereign Grand Master. I will be Deputy Grand Master in May and in 2008 I will be the 6th Lady Grand Master. I came from an Odd Fellow family and my granddad joined me at birth. I have been a member 46 years. I am a Past Juvenile Lodge President. I have been a Provincial

Corresponding Secretary for 20 years next week in Stepney and St. Essex equivalent of a Grand Secretary area and it is a paid position. In Manchester Unity our membership is increasing. We have 100,000. This is due to a change in the package we sell for membership which is social and welfare. You can be a member of Manchester Unity and never take part in ritual which means you cannot have your say in how the society is run or you can take part fully in the society and practice installation and reach the lofty heights of Grand Master after a lot of hard work. Our society still pays members benefits, help with the cost of dental and optical treatment, two weeks convalescent treatment if you have been ill and a small death benefit, but the greatest benefit for me is the provider of help for the orphan. This is close to my heart because when my husband was killed in 2003, the society helped pay for my sons to finish their education. My oldest son is now a Bachelor of Science and my youngest a Demi Chef dePattie.

The support I got in that sad time from the Odd Fellows helped me carry on. I had hundreds of sympathy cards and letters. And they were there for me again when I met Tom, my second husband. He is from Spring Valley, Minnesota and sometimes there are

misunderstandings with language even through we all speak English. They welcomed him into our family and have helped him cope with our way of life. ### Robert Andrew Rumbaugh / Swashbuckling pilot who just loved the skies March 28,1923 - Jan. 10, 2006

Robert Rumbaugh spent so much time flying aircraft for much of his life that his sons thought he might have preferred living in the air to life on the ground.

The swashbuckling pilot, who flew 68 mission behind enemy lines in World War II, sailed hang sliders during his retirement and even walked away from a midair crash with another airplane 50 years ago, died Tuesday from a heart attack at St. Clair Hospital. He was 82.

"He took a lot of chances and he wasn't afraid to do things," said his son George Rumbaugh of Robinson. "He had a sense of adventure. He wanted to do everything and go everywhere and he did."

An only child, he lost his father at age 4 and grew up in Erie County during the Great Depression, helping his mother in the struggle to keep food on the table. He joined the Army Air Corps to fight in World War II and came back determined to make a

better life for himself.

Mr. Rumbaugh worked two full-time jobs, flying for the Air National Guard and USAir. Age policies forced him to retire from the Air National Guard when he turned 50 and from the airline at

age 60, but even in his golden years, he still flew everything he could get his hands on.

"He flew almost daily," said his son James Rumbaugh.

Mr. Rumbaugh, who lived in Robinson, gave up flying for the good and grounded himself at age



80 when he felt his health declining Even then, George Rumbaugh said, his father bought an experimental boat that floated on a cushion of air, which he drove in the back yard and on the Ohio River.

"It was pretty strange sight," he said. "It didn't look too safe, but he could handle it."

During the war, he flew with a tactical reconnaisance squadron whose job was to fly over the front lines of battle in Europe and take photographs of enemy targets.

Mr. Rumbaugh's colorful adventures also included a stint driving stock cars in the early 1950s in the NASCAR circuit in northwestern Pennsylvania. He won the season championship, while crashing quite a few race cars in the process.

But those crashes paled in comparison to the midair collision he sruvived in the mid-1950s while flying a P-51 for the Air National Guard. The pilot who struck his airplane ejected and lived. Mr. Rumbaugh landed upside down in a cornfield and walked away uninjured.

"He's got a closet full of log books for all the time he spent on different aircraft that's way more than 25,000 hours," said James Rumbaugh, also of Robinson. "If you figure that out in years, that's a long time to be off the ground."

Mr. Rumbaugh also is survived by son Robert F. Rumbaugh of Chicago; daughters Victoria Templeton and Michelle Calavitta, both of Bemus Point, N.Y., and four grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at 1 p.m. today in Union Presbyterian Church, 6165 Steubenville Pike, Robinson. Arrangements are by DeAngelo Funeral Home.

## GRAND MASTER'S RECIPE COLUMN

January 2007

### Aunt Ethel's Buns

1 pint warm water

2 teaspoons salt

1/2+ cup sugar

2 tablespoons shortening

1/2 cake yeast

Sufficient bread flour to stiffen, approximately 5-1/2 cups, sifted Place in blender until too thick and then mix using dough hook. Let rise. Punch down. Let rise. Scale. Should be sufficient dough to fill one or two 9x13 baking pans. Let rise. Bake at 350°.

### Cinnamon Pecan Swirl Cake

This is a simple variation from a cake mix white cake.

Put the cake mix in the refrigerator and chill for at least 4 hours. Shift the cake mix into a mixing bowl.

Use the same number of whole eggs that the mix calls for as egg whites.

2 teaspoons vanilla

Use the same amount of melted butter as the mix calls for oil This should make a smooth batter

In a separate bowl: mix

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1/2 cup crushed pecans (use a food processor to make fine)

1 rounded tablespoon of ground cinnamon

Grease and flour the cake pan, put two-thirds of the batter in it. Pour the filling in and use a fork or toothpick to stir the cinnamon mixture through the batter. Add the last third of the batter. Bake in accordance with the instructions on the box. Use the buttercream icing from the July column.

### Madeleines

Mix 8 oz eggs

8 oz granulated sugar (1-1/8 cups)

1/4 teaspoon salt

Heat over a water bath to about 110° F

Put in mixer and use whip attachment to get the mixture thick and light

Fold in:

8 oz. cake flour (2-I/8 cups) sifted

Add two sticks of melted (not too hot) margarine and

2 teaspoons grated lemon zest

Deposit in well greased Madeleine molds

Bake at 375° for 10-12 minutes; remove from pans immediately after baking and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

## FROM GRANDMA'S KITCHEN German Pizza

1 pound ground beef

1-1/2 tsps. salt, divided

6 medium potatoes, peeled and finely shredded

1/3 cup milk

1/2 medium onion, chopped

1/2 tsp. pepper

2 cups (8 oz.) shredded cheddar or mozzarella cheese

1/2 green pepper, diced

2 tbsps. butter or margarine

3 eggs, beaten

Brown ground beef, onion, green pepper, 1/2 tsp. salt, and pepper in a 12-inch skillet. Remove meat mixture from skillet and drain fat. Reduce heat to low. Melt butter; spread potatoes over butter and sprinkle with remaining salt, combine eggs and milk; pour over all. Cook, covered, until potatoes are tender, about 30 minutes. Top with cheese; cover and heat until cheese is melted, about 5 minutes. Cut in wedges or squares to serve. Yield: 4-6 servings.

### Tossed Broccoli Salad

2 lbs. fresh broccoli, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces

1/2 lb. bacon, cooked and crumbled

2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese

1/2 medium red onion, chopped

Dressing:

1 cup mayonnaise

1/2 cup sugar

2 tbsps. cider vinegar

In a large bowl, combine broccoli, bacon, cheese, and onion. In a separate bowl combine dressing ingredients. Add to salad and toss. Chill. Yield: 8-10 servings.

#### Breakfast Buns

2 cups flour

3/4 cup sugar, divided

1 tbsp. baking powder

3 tbsps. cold butter or margarine

2 eggs

1/2 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup raisins

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

In a mixing bowl, combine flour, 1/2 cup sugar, and baking powder; cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Beat eggs, milk and vanilla; stir into dry ingredients just until moistened. Add raisins drop by tablespoons onto greased baking sheet. Combine the cinnamon and remaining sugar; sprinkle over buns. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm. Yield: 16 servings.
