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
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FROM THE DESK OF THE GRAND SECRETARY


Degree Work

SUMMER BEGINS IN JUNE

June is usually the month that people think about weddings, picnics and other such things. The long, hard winter is truly over by June 1 and most folks are ready to enjoy summer.

In 1922 Barney was put in charge of the social committee for the June meetings. He tried to think of some activity to replace a weekly lodge meeting. Picnics were all too common.

He had to do something early in the month to avoid vacation conflicts. He thought and thought. The lodge had never held a fishing contest. This might be the start of something big.

Barney looked around to find a place for the contest and decided the stream that ran through the back of his farm was the best place. The committee decided on the first Saturday in June, the third, for the contest. The next item of business was to discuss the rules.

Barney wanted the first prize to go to the person who caught the heaviest total catch of legal fish, live weight. Brother Clancey thought that the heaviest total catch, after field dressing the fish would be the prize winner. Barney's father Tom thought the single heaviest fish should win the prize. Brother Johnson thought the longest fish should win while Brother Miller thought the fish should be laid end to end with the total length as a measure of the winner. After all, one long fish was luck, but a creel full of long fish was skill.

There were twenty-six total methods to determine the winner suggested. Barney brought in a creel and had each person write his suggestion on a piece of paper and drop it in. Barney would pick the winning suggestion out. The winner was the single heaviest fish, live weight.

Now that the criterion for judging was set, Barney had to get consensus on prizes. A year's dues was suggested. This idea was discarded after it was decided that the contest would be open to the entire community, so that the lodge might attract new members. Another suggestion was a cash prize. Then there was the question of an entry fee. It was decided that the entry fee would be \$1.00 and would include dinner at 5:30 p.m. The contest would end at 5:00 p.m. so the contestants would have time to clean up and get ready. The first prize was a \$10.00 gift certificate to the local department store, second prize was a \$5.00 gift certificate and third prize was a \$2.00 gift certificate.

Dear reader, I must digress to remind you that we are talking about 1922. Prices were much lower. The index indicates that the average price of things today is more than 13 times the 1922 prices. This means that a \$1.00 entry fee would compare to \$13.00 today and a \$10.00 gift certificate would be worth \$130.00 today.

The law required every adult male to have a fishing license since 1915, so each entrant had to show his license and the license number was the same as the registration number. Women were not required to buy fishing licenses in New Jersey in 1922, so they would be given a separate number.

The contest was advertised on posters all over town. Just as Barney suspect, there were many father/son entries. Each entry entitled the entrant to a chicken dinner in the lodge hall that evening. The Rebekahs were working on the dinner, so few of them entered. Barney was too busy to fish and his committee was helping set up the hall for the dinner and helping with the chickens. Brother Wilson registered to fish and also registered his six year-old granddaughter, Chloe.

As the day came to an end, there were dozens of entries, and most of them were successful, catching trout, bass and blue gills. There was one person who brought in an old tire and another who brought in a sign in the shape of a fish.

There were some nice fish weighing two or three pounds but the winner was little Chloe with a five-pound catfish. Her grandfather was quite proud of her and offered to donate the fish to the refreshment committee for the next meeting. The refreshment committee declined.

Barney was the master of ceremonies at the dinner and presented the prizes. Since the winner was a child, her grandfather accompanied her to the front of the room at the dinner, to receive her prize.

Brother Wilson told a string of fishing jokes that kept the audience reeling. When he was done, Chloe was given a chance to speak, she said, "Grandma won't let Grandpa tell me jokes. I'm going to buy him a new fishing pole for father's day with my gift certificate." The audience was caught up in the humor and Barney started to flounder when he needed a comeback. Barney replied, "We shouldn't carp about yesterday, we need to start new projects and go forward." The lodge decided to hold the fishing tournament again the next year.

Next month, July, and a new Department Commander.

ODD FELLOWS SHARE TRADITIONS, HISTORY

Three lodges remain in existence in county By Chanin Rotz-Mountz STAFF WRITER

As a youngster, Allen Long of New Grenada would scour the roadside with his brother in hopes of finding glass pop bottles. Often successful in

their search, Long stated the bottles would be taken to Hoover's general store for pocket change that would in turn be used to buy candy bars.

Standing outside the old store along Hoover Road Saturday, Long recalls always being curious" as to what mysteries lay behind the black curtains adorning the second-story windows of the building that dates back to the 1800s. Long's curiosities were laid to rest in 1969 when he joined the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

The Odd Fellows began utilizing the second floor of this old general store back in 1871 when A.Z. Hamilton, MD, took over the role of first noble grand of Lodge #773. The brotherhood notes when N.G. Cunningham's General Store was still in operation back in the early 1900s, the brotherhood would hold meetings upstairs while their wives would perform their weekly shopping downstairs. IOOF), an organization that follows the basic guidelines of friendship, love and truth.



100F, Waterfall Lodge #773 organized in the village of New Grenada in 1871 under the direction of Noble Grand A.Z. Hamilton, M.D. Nearly 140 years later, the lodge and brotherhood remain strong, meeting twice monthly in the upstairs of the old country store that has been known over the years as N.G. Cunningham's Store, Hoover's Store and currently as Otis and Ev's Crafts, Tools & Collectibles.

The roots of the Odd Fellows organization date back to 18thcentury England, and in April 1819, with help from Thomas Wildey and four members of the Order from England, Washington Lodge No. 1 was instituted in Baltimore, Md.

Various small towns and villages in Fulton County have played host to IOOF, with only three lodges still in existence today - Waterfall, Harrisonville and Warfordsburg. Prior lodge locations include Wells Tannery; Clear Ridge at Noel Mellott's store at the intersection of Plum Hollow Road; McConnellsburg over the old firehall; in Needmore along Route 522 across from the elementary school; and Fort Littleton near Fraker's Vacuum Cleaners and Sewing Machines Sales and Service.

According to Robert "Bobby" Snyder II, secretary of Harrisonville Lodge #710 and former state grand conductor, several lodge mergers have occurred over the years. McConnellsburg at one point merged into Needmore, which in turn joined with Warfordsburg Lodge #601 - the oldest surviving lodge in Fulton County. Coincidentally, the charters of the McConnellsburg and Needmore lodges are still proudly displayed on the walls at Warfordsburg.

Loyal members at Warfordsburg currently include David Bivens, Larry Carnahan, Lonnie Palmer, Sonnie Weicht, Stanley Palmer and Bob Golden.

Harrisonville was selected to serve as a meeting place for IOOF shortly after the conclusion of the American Civil War, Snyder stated. Current Harrisonville noble grand is Clair Hawkins, and Wayne Strait serves as vice grand of the lodge that totals seven members.

"I joined because of the rich history and traditions of Odd Fellows and because they are all a bunch of nice guys," Snyder told the "News." Echoing many of Snyder's sentiments, the 17 members of the Waterfall Lodge agree wholeheartedly that service to the community and fellowship should top the list of reasons for becoming an Odd Fellow.

Neil Rotz of Waterfall said he joined the Odd Fellows in 1976 at the urging of his father-in-law and since that time has encouraged his own son-in-law to become active in the Lodge. Fellow member and secretary George Summers got his start with Odd Fellows in 1969 and by a margin of only several months is the longest-running member in Waterfall, while current Waterfall Noble Grand Otis Wate is one of the newer members, having joined in 2002 at the request of Summers.

Undoubtedly the faces at each lodge have changed, bringing a note of sadness when longtime members pass away, decreasing both the brotherhood's membership as well as lifelong friendships. In Warfordsburg, the brothers recently bid a sad farewell to longtime and devoted member Charlie Palmer, who passed away at the age of 81. In Waterfall, Tom Rhoat, a two-time member at the lodge, and Bob Black, who served the lodge as treasurer for well over 30 years, died during the year 2009.

"Odd Fellows is like any other service organization, getting and retaining members is difficult," noted Snyder. Membership guidelines include being in good standing in the community and a minimum age of 16 or 18, depending on individual lodge rules.

While membership is always a concern, one of the primary issues currently confronting the Harrisonville lodge is the future of its current facility. A bridge-replacement project adjacent to the lodge hall could see the demolition of the building.

"Our hope for the future at Harrisonville is just to survive," Snyder said, who added the original lodge was located on the western side of Licking Creek between the creek and the Harrisonville store. It was destroyed by flood or fire.

Meanwhile, in Waterfall, the brothers state one of their biggest goals is to continue being active in the community. In recent years, the group has instituted multiple fundraisers, including used book/movie and toy drives to benefit local residents. In addition to donating funding to various projects such as visual eye research and the Arthritis Foundation, the lodge also holds numerous social engagements annually ranging from summer picnics and bake sales to family Christmas parties.

"If someone is interested in good fellowship with a fraternal organization and wants to get involved in the local community, they should look into the Odd Fellows," the Waterfall brothers concluded.

WYSOX LODGE #1152

Wysox Lodge #1152 serves its community through recycling. Every 2nd Saturday of the month, whether rain, sleet, snow, hail or sunshine, we are at the Asylum Township Building collecting recyclables for four hours. The Northern Tier Solid Waste Authority drops of four large dumpsters for our use to store the recyclables until they come back and pick them up after we fill them.

We collect aluminum cans (we separate the 5 cent from the regular aluminum), plastics (all #1 & #2s, and again we separate the 5 cent bottles). Then all newspapers (separate from glossy inserts which get put in the junk mail bin). Then we have a bin for magazines, a separate section for tin cans, another for cardboard, and one for green glass, one for clear glass and one for brown glass.

The 5 cent returnable glass bottles, aluminum cans and plastic bottles are bagged up separately, and then taken to New York State to cash in. This takes a lot of dedicated members to work by assisting people with their recyclables from their vehicles to the appropriate bins.

This project was started in 1997. Since then, we have collected approximately \$28,000 worth of recyclables. With this money, we have donated to many charitable organizations. To name a few: TACO, 40 & 8 nurses scholarships, Wysox Ambulance & Fire Companies, Northern Tier







Career Center, Bradford County Humane Society, American Red Cross, Grace Connection, and Hezekiah's Hands.

This project serves in many ways. The community has come to rely on our Lodge to be there every month for them to deposit their recyclables. This also provides a time of Fellowship with each other as well as with the people of the community. So far it has been a win-win situation for everyone, plus it keeps all these recyclable items from being thrown in to the landfill.

MASONIC PAPERS

THE ODD FELLOWS

First published Dec. 2003 on "The Northern Light", Scottish Rite Freemasonry, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, USA

"There's Nothing Odd about these Fellows"
"What's so Odd about the Odd Fellows?--- nothing"

What was the largest fraternal organization during the so-called "Golden Age of Fraternalism" (1870-1910)? You may be surprised to know it was not Freemasonry but the Odd Fellows. In 1890 Freemasonry had 609,000 brothers while the Odd Fellows had over 672,000. You may also be surprised to know the Scottish Rite Masonic National Heritage Museum probably holds the largest public collection of Odd Fellows artifacts, and materials in the county; some 700 items. Just as many men joined both the Craft and the Odd Fellows, so our museum collections both Masonic and other American fraternal history. Indeed the relationship between the Freemasonry and Odd Fellowship was quite similar and often truly fraternal.

As with Freemasonry, the Odd Fellows is a British institution. They began in England in the late 1700s as a "friendly society" for working class men and artisans. Meeting in taverns to socialize they also pooled their recourses to help each other in times of need and for burial fees. That such an "odd" assortment of men would organize for such benevolent purposes was considered "odd" for the times and from which perhaps their name sprang. That they also practiced such broad charity may have also caused these fellows to be considered "odd." Whatever the origin of the name the first lodge proudly adopted the title and have continued to care for each other for well over 200 years.

Like Freemasonry there were individual Odd Fellows in the United States prior to the first lodge forming in 1819. The revered founder and first "Grand Sire" of the American Odd Fellows is Thomas Wildey (1782-1861). A coach-spring maker, he became an Odd Fellow in London before immigrating to America in 1817. Through his efforts he organized the first lodge in Baltimore and received a charter from the English Grand Lodge to spread the fraternity in the United States. Blessed by boundless energy and a dedication to help those in distress between 1819 and 1840 he started 155 lodges in 14 states that initiated over 11,000 brothers. Its great national Grand Secretary Thomas Ridgely who served the fraternity from 1833 to 1880 further supported Wildey's fledgling order.

So successful was American Odd Fellowship that it came in conflict with the Odd Fellow's "world headquarters" or the Grand Lodge of England. After the separation in 1843 they changed their name to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and within ten years the number of lodges leaped to 2,941 in 33 states and a total of 193,000 brothers.

Similar to Prince Hall Freemasonry, African Americans have their own Odd Fellows lodges.

In 1842 the English Odd Fellow Grand Lodges issued a warrant to black sailor named Peter Ogden from New York City. Unlike Wildey however, Ogden never separated his lodges from England and to this day it remains part of the Grand United Order of Odd Fellows. When Ogden died in 1852 there were 32 lodges, by 1863 there were 50 and by 1900 2,253 with 70,000 members. The GUOOF continues to this day and are headquartered in Philadelphia.

Although heavily influenced by Freemasonry's rituals, symbols and tenets, a large measure of the Odd Fellows' success came from its dedication to serve its members. Its three secret ritual initiations taught the "three links" of fraternity as "Friendship, Love and Truth" and commanded its brothers to "Visit the Sick, Relieve the Distressed, Bury the Dead, Care for the Widow, and Educate the Orphan." In the forty years between the founding of Wildey's first American lodge and his death in 1861, Odd Fellow's paid out nearly \$9,000,000 in relief. After the Civil War State grand Lodges began building homes for widows and orphans. With the first opening in Meadville, PA in 1872 by 1927 there were 62 home in the United States. Between 1830 and 1936 the fraternity had paid out over \$247 million in relief.

In other ways the Odd Fellows innovated before Freemasonry. Before the Order of the Eastern Star for female relatives of Masons the Odd Fellows started the first women's auxiliary. Call the Daughters of Rebekah it was begun by future Vice President of the United States (and Freemason) Schuley Colfax in 1851. The Rebekahs have one initiation degree based on wife of the Hebrew patriarch Isaac. Within 50 years of its founding it had over 340,000 daughters and it membership peaked in 1925 at just over one million. In 1932 Rebekahs formed their girls' youth group called Theta Rho.

Similar to the Masonic Royal Arch Degrees of the York Rite, the Odd Fellows established "higher" degrees in the Encampment. Containing three degrees, the Patriarchal, the Golden Rule and the Royal Purple they originated in England and were first performed in the United States in the 1820s. Like the Royal Arch the Encampment had its own state and national hierarchy but ultimately remain subordinate to state and national grand lodges.

Building upon the success of the Encampment, in the 1870s and 80s the Odd Fellows established their own Masonic Knights Templar-like order. Call the Patriarch Militant it officially became part of the Order in 1886. Rather than commanderies, the Patriarch militants met in Cantons. Individual members were titled chevaliers and within three years of its organization it had over 12,073 members in 356 cantons. The Militants' mottos are "Justitia Universalis" (Universal Justice) and "Pax aut Bellum" (Peace or War) and its insignia is the crossed crock and sword with crown. Several factors led to the Militants success; a love of marching and military music after the Civil War, a fear of labor unrest and riots after 1877 and a huge war surplus of uniforms and swords.

The Odd Fellows even created their own Shriner's in the early 1900s. Several different groups were attempted, called the Order of Muscovites, Prophets of Bagdad and the Knights of Oriental Splendor. The successor of these and most successful were the Ancient Mystic Order of Samaritans or AMOS who wore red fezs with the motto "We Never Sleep."

The Odd Fellows membership peaked in 1920 at 1.7 million brothers. While still strong during the Roaring '20 the Great Depression nearly bankrupted the fraternity. The Stock market crash caused families to drop their membership, lodges to fail to meet their mortgages and homes to lose donations. The advent of social security, welfare, private health insurance and other forms of relief made most of the Odd Fellows' charity obsolete. The popularity of radio, movies, and later TV and other forms of leisure all help to erode Odd Fellow, and most other fraternal orders' membership. By 1960 the Odd fellows had half the members they did in 1920. Today there are still many active Odd Fellow lodges across the country, mostly in small town and rural communities, yet firmly linked by "Friendship, Love and Truth."

Also for the institution of "Lucia of Saron Rebekah Lodge, No. 472, LO.O.F.," to be located at Ephrata, County of Lancaster, with a charter list of twenty-five.

ODD FELLOWS' MEMORIAL HELD AT STOYESTOWN

Approximately three hundred Odd Fellows and Rebekahs attended St. Paul's Reformed Church at Stoyestown Sunday afternoon, June 22nd, the first joint District Memorial Service of the Odd Fellows in the Northern District of Somerset County.

District Deputy, C. f. Lancaster officiating at the memorial service, explained in a few choice words the purpose of a meeting of this character, after which the invocation was ask by the Rev. Samuel A Miller, of Grace Evangelical Church of Somerset, Mrs. Brasgear's male chorus rendered several delightful vocal selections,

During the past year ten Brothers and three Sisters have died in the Northern District.
