YORK SPRINGS ODD FELLOW LODGE #211 HISTORY



Odd Fellow Marker at Griest Park

The Lodge donated \$500 to the Bermudian Springs Jaycees for Griest Park in 1997. In return the Odd Fellows were allowed to place a Lodge #211 I.O.O.F. marker and flagpole at the entrance to the park.

John Lerew donated the stone for the marker. The stone was cut from a larger bolder in the woods of his Latimore Township farm. The farm was one of the areas the Confederate Army camped on, as they moved through York Springs (then called Petersburg) on their way to Gettysburg to do battle during the Civil War in 1863. The stone was taken to Coduri Memorials in Gettysburg to be engraved and then it was emplaced at the park. A conduit was laid to allow a future electrical line and a flagpole was set. A truckload of concrete was used so the above could not be easily moved.

It is noted that the flagpole currently has no topper or pulleys and it is the type which could be pivoted at the base to lower the pole parallel to the ground to allow work, then could be lifted and locked back into place.

Dear Justin,

On behalf of the Curing Retinal Blindness Foundation (CRBF) and the Smedley Family, thank you for the incredibly generous support received from the various organizations in Pennsylvania Odd Fellowship for our miracle mission to fund research for a cure for CRB1 retinal disease. A disease, as you are aware, that has caused our two sons, Michael 13 and Mitchel 10 to lose most of their vision. And a special thanks to the late GM Kenneth Faub for making the CRBF one of his special programs in Visual Research and you for honoring his wishes by continuing that project after his death. Pennsylvania Odd Fellowship has been supporting us since our launch in 2011, and we are honored you continue to be with us on this journey from blindness to sight.

Back in May 2011 we launched this project with much hope that we would be able to fund at least one research project that might lead to a treatment for CRB1 retinal disease. Just two and a half years later we are so proud to announce that we are funding multiple research projects with the goal of multiple potential treatments for this rare disease! Since CRB1 retinal disease is such a rare and complicated disease that ultimately causes complete blindness, it would have taken many, many years for research to focus on a cure. We started the CRBF to change that: we want to see treatments for CRB1 retinal disease in clinical trials in 5-10 years, and we are funding teams to do that.

With the magnificent financial support from Pennsylvania Odd Fellowship, in May 2013 we were able to convene the first ever CRB1 research symposium in the United States! Specialists in many aspects of retinal research that are leaders in their fields gathered at Temple University School of Medicine's Shriners Hospitals Pediatric Research Center to discuss paths to treatments and cures for CRB1.

After that incredibly productive symposium, we flew to Seattle, Washington to attend the world's largest conference for visual research hosted by the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology (ARVO) where 12,000 of the world's leaders and future leaders in ophthalmology gathered to present and discuss the newest breakthroughs in research. We were able to network with the leaders in this field from all over the world and discuss how their teams and talents could further CRB1 research. With the success of the symposium and the networking accomplished at the ARVO meeting, we have had the incredible honor to accept grant applications from some of the world's most respected research teams. The CRBF is funding teams in Maine, Philadelphia, Germany (2), and the Netherlands, all with the goal of getting CRB1 retinal disease to treatments and cures!

It is a dream come true to have found several gifted scientists to work on a cure for our boys and all of the kids affected by CRB1 retinal disease. But the reality is that while the scientists are diligently working on a treatment that will restore vision, our kids are losing more vision every day. The ultimate dream... the cure... awaits. With your continued help, we'll achieve that ultimate dream of a cure for CRB1 retinal disease.

Finally, as follow up to a previous article published in the Pennsylvania Odd Fellow and Rebekah Magazine, your Visual Research Committee requested support for two CRBF events: "Bike the Basin" (held September 29th) and "The Fore Sight Classic" golf tournament (held October 8th). Both were huge successes! In addition, our "Bike the Basin" event was named Best Local Event in Philadelphia in the PHL17 Philly Hot List competition!
