

FOURTH GRADE

This little fellow was sitting at the end of the bench and was apparently very inattentive, lisping somewhat he said, "Theventy theven, twiht that you old thucker."

THE TREASURER'S TALES - DECEMBER 2015

December is most notably identified with Christmas. In 1920 Christmas was chilly in Grover's Mill. Barney and his family had stored a fair amount of firewood for the winter and were always looking for ways to keep warm. Corn cobs and other things that would normally be discarded were used in the furnace and the heaters. Coal was stock piled for the coldest nights.

Barney contended with cold weather at school as well. The boiler took a little time to crank up and some mornings there was frost on the window panes in his class room. Barney had a challenge keeping the students under control for most of the month, since Christmas anticipation had destroyed most of their attention spans.

Barney decided he would engage his students with poetry during the month of December. He settled on Horatius at the Bridge, by Thomas Babington, Lord Macaulay (1800-1859). This was a popular subject of study in public schools of the period. The entire poem may be found at: http://www.bartleby.com/360/7/158.html. This did not quite suit the task.

Barney was trying to spur the students to literary endeavors. He soon found that stories of snowball fights would serve better. The Katzenjammer Kids was a popular cartoon strip that is published to this day. It was a popular strip in the Pittsburgh Sun-Telegraph until that paper was closed. He started it and other comic strips in class to maintain attention. This helped a little but still didn't quite carry the day. He finally settled on having the students bring in newspaper articles about automobiles and summarize them through oral reports. This worked better than his other efforts, after all, automobiles were still a new sort of thing.

The lodge planned a bonfire the week before Christmas, and Barney was in charge of gathering the firewood and putting the event together, on Wednesday, December 22, 1920. He was expecting Elizabeth to be there, and he would not be disappointed. His disappointment came from other sources. Barney built the bonfire on December 21, so that all he needed to do was light it the next day. Carol singing and hot drinks would entertain the lodge, at little expense. Since he was a farmer, he built the wood pile in a field, far enough away from the buildings to avoid a potential fire. Barney and the lodge had several run-ins with raccoons in prior episodes. These furry little creatures attract attention and some sympathy in winter, with many thinking they were cute. Scurrying about to find a bit of garbage to munch on, they presented a nuisance. The raccoons were bedded down most of the day, to keep warm, and were fairly inactive.

There were several inches of snow on the ground and the temperature hovered in the mid-20's. Other animals were wandering about, however.

On Wednesday, December 22, 1920, Barney was off school for the holidays, and was eating breakfast when he heard Warden and Conductor barking at the pile of wood. He thought their curiosity had got the better of them and he yelled at them to stop. This did not calm them, and he was to light the bonfire that night. Barney wanted to make sure things would go well, so he went out after breakfast to investigate.

There were very small tracks through the snow, running from the woods to the wood pile. Barney went around by Conductor to see what he was barking at. It looked like small patch of snow had blown into the wood pile. Suddenly, the white patch of snow started to change shape. Barney grabbed Conductor by the collar and started to back away from the wood pile. Warden was still barking intently and disobeyed Barney's command to heel. A slightly perturbed skunk ran from the wood pile and sprayed Warden as he scampered past. Warden ran for the barn, whimpering. Barney got Conductor back to his box, hoping the smell would blow away before he had to light the fire.

Next, Barney had to find Warden and clean him up. Finding him was easy, the scent probably blew all the way to Trenton. After Barney located Warden, under a pile of hay, he had to figure out what to do. In the cold barn, Barney poured two gallons of tomato juice his mother had canned during the summer in a wash tub, coaxed Warden into the tub and scrubbed him. It was all Barney could do to keep from losing his breakfast. He moved Warden's box to the other side of the barn and tried to comfort him. It took all day.

At six-thirty Barney lit the fire and at seven the lodge members arrived. They sang carols for about an hour then went in the house where there was coffee, hot cider and cocoa. Barney was fairly well preoccupied with Elizabeth, but the strange smell from the bonfire puzzled her and the lodge member.

Barney cranked up his Amberola and played several cylinders of Christmas music by Vernon Dalhart, a popular musician of the era. He and Elizabeth watch the fire flicker and reflect on the Christmas tree, long after everyone else had gone. 1920 had been a good year.

Next month will be January and I will surprise you.

ODD FELLOWS AND REBEKAHS ASSOCIATION OF WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA ESTABLISH NEW SCHOLARSHIP

During the October 31, 2015 Board meeting of the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs Association of Western Pennsylvania, member Bob Grant made a proposal to the Association's Board regarding the establishment of a scholarship award specifically designed for graduate school students. He stated that at several times over the ten (10) years as chairman of the Association's Scholarship Award Committee, numerous inquires have been made as to whether or not the Association had any kind of scholarship program available for students who were continuing their schooling after graduating from college.

Being that the Association was in a good financial position, he felt that there was definitely a need for this and requested the Board to seriously consider offering this type of award. This graduate scholarship award would be in addition to the Scholarship Awards presently offered by the Association, that being four (4) - \$3000 scholarship awards annually to students attending college (undergraduates).

With the distribution among members in attendance of a set of rules and an application, and after some discussion, the Board unanimously agreed to being the Graduate Scholarship Award as soon as possible.

Thus, the inauguration of two (2) - \$3000 awards is now being offered by the Association. A copy of the "Rules" and an "Application" for the 2016 Graduate Scholarship Award can be obtained by contacting Robert Grand, 40 Cypress Way, Charleroi, PA 15022 or by emailing your request to robag@comcast.net.

Regarding this new scholarship award, the applicant or a living family relative must be a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows or Rebekahs of Western Pennsylvania and enrolled in the graduate program of an accredited college/university. Also, the applicant must be: a) a college graduate continuing their education or b) enrolled in a degree program requiring more than four (4) years to complete. The only three (3) areas of concentration being consideration for this award are Music Education, Teacher Education, or a Health Related Field. The deadline for submitting applications for the 2016 Graduate Scholarship Award will be January 20, 2016.

Note: Previous recipients of the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs Association of Western Pennsylvania Scholarship Award may apply for this scholarship award.
