REMINDER: Odd Fellows and Rebekahs Association of Western Pennsylvania 2017 Scholarship Award

The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs of Western Pennsylvania is again offering \$3,000 scholarship awards to a maximum of four (4) students who fulfill the specified requirements of the Award. This will be the 12th consecutive year of the Award since its inauguration back in 2006. Award committee chairman, Robert Grant, wants to remind those considering applying or those considering potential applicants, of three requirements in particular:

- 1. The applicant or living family relative must be a member of the I.O.O.F. or Rebekahs of Western Pennsylvania.
- 2. The applicant must be a full-time student majoring in one of the three eligible areas: music, education, or a health related field.
- 3. The applicant must have also completed at least one year of full-time college.

The Awards, of course are being made to not only defray some of the cost associated with higher education, but also to help increase public awareness of Odd Fellowship and in turn, hopefully receiving petitions for membership to promote our great Order.

As in previous years, a copy of the "Rules" and an "Award Application" was sent to all the lodges representing the Western District in mid/late-May. The 2017 Awards Committee requested that all lodge secretaries and scribes relay that information to their respective membership and make copies as necessary for distribution. Information regarding the 2017 Scholarship may also be found on our website: glpaioof.org. The deadline date for submitting applications will be <u>July 31</u>, 2017. The committee also asks that the public be made aware of our Award by informing schools, colleges, newspapers, churches, etc. in your respective areas. Your cooperation and assistance in relaying this information will be very much appreciated. Hopefully, we will once again be honored in announcing the Awards to four qualified and worthy recipients this coming August.

WEDDING DAY

June 1922 was the month in which Warren Harding became the first President to give a radio address. Brother Harding is reputed to have been a member of our Order, see http://ioofphilippines.yolasite.com/notable-members. php Clearly the most important event, however, was the marriage of Barney Wells to his beloved Elizabeth. The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs were astir with preparations. The Patriarchs' Militant was preparing an arch of steel for the recessional after the ceremony.

There were three fine churches in Grover's Mill. There was a Lutheran Church, a Presbyterian Church and a Roman Catholic Church. Barney belonged to a different church in a different town. Elizabeth belonged to the Presbyterian Church, so that would be the site of the wedding. The reception would take place at the largest and most accessible building in town, the Odd Fellows Hall.

The ceremony was to take place at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 17, 1922. The weather was warm and sunny. The birds were singing and the bees were buzzing. Several Rebekah sisters spent hours pouring over the 1922 Emily Post guide for a wedding, see http://www.bartleby.com/95/22.html The bride arrived at the church exactly one minute late, as etiquette directs. The ceremony went off with no surprises and everything went well as the couple moved toward the IOOF Hall for the reception. Here I must digress and tell you that the careful observer would have seen an image sitting outside the front window of the church. The image looked like a raccoon named Melchizedek.

Barney Wells' father drove him to the church in his 1918 Model T Touring Car. Vic had a 1920 Model T Touring Car that he used to take Elizabeth and his family to the church. It took Vic and his wife Alice over an hour to clean all the smells of animal medicine from the inside of the car, so the wedding would not have a foul smell. Vic and Alice had six children and they all fit in the car. Alice's older brother Woodrow was an usher at the wedding. Her older sister Alberta was a bridesmaid. Barney had an older sister who was busy with a small child so she attended the wedding but did not take part in the ceremony.

Barney asked his platoon sergeant from World War I to be his best man. Mason Browning had been a good soldier and saved Barney's bacon once or twice in the trenches in World War I. He was also a loyal Odd Fellow and Elizabeth's uncle. Elizabeth chose her sister Alberta to be her maid of honor. Alberta was a school teacher and was planning her won wedding the next year and looked at this as a dry run.

Upon leaving the church, there was an arch of steel formed by the Patriarchs' Militant and a creative individual had dressed Warden and Conductor (Barney's dogs) in PM uniforms and had them sitting at the end of the line. The couple rode in Barney's Model T with his father driving. Upon arrival at the Odd Fellows Hall, Barney and Elizabeth met the musicians and asked them to play a few of the popular tunes of the day while the guests were being served. There was no photographer at the wedding. Barney and Elizabeth had arranged to go to the photographer's studio the following week

for photographs. Remember, photography was still young in 1922, many of the guests had Brownie cameras, see http://www.brownie-camera.com/list. shtml but the higher quality cameras were too large to take to a wedding. Woodrow took a number of impromptu photos, as did other members of the lodge. The album did not get made till the following Monday.

The meal began with an appetizer of deviled eggs and meat stuffed olives. The main course was a baked ham with mashed potatoes and vegetables. The cake was the center of the celebration. The Rebekahs had a three-tiered cake with white top and bottom layers and a chocolate center layer. The top decoration was a pair of raccoons, dressed as bride and groom. Everyone in the Odd Fellows knew the entire raccoon story, parts of it too well.

The dinner was followed by dancing. Barney was not a dancer. He tried, but failed. He tripped more than once, but caught himself. The fox trot was the most popular dance. This was the era of prohibition and no legal liquor was available. The punch tasted like it had been spiked, but the concoction poured in it left a bad taste in one's mouth. Barney drank a cup of punch and became an even poorer dancer. He slipped on the floor and tore a hole in the seat of his trousers. This grounded him for the remainder of the evening. Elizabeth danced with Vic and a number of the other guests. When she returned to the table, Barney wasn't feeling particularly well, so the party drew to a close. As they left the IOOF Hall, they were showered with enormous amounts of rice, which would prove to excite the local turkey flock in the following days. Barney's father drove them to his home. Barney and Elizabeth would live on the Wells farm, where they would build their own house over the following years.

The plan was simple, they would stay in town for a couple days to get the photographs taken and arrange the house a bit and then leave on Wednesday for a trip to the Starkey House on the Finger Lakes in New York. It seemed to be working until Barney's father had a problem with the tractor on Tuesday afternoon and Barney broke his left hand while helping fix the tractor. Elizabeth would not be outdone, when she became aware they would not be able to leave on Wednesday, she accompanied her father on a call to help him give a physic ball to a horse that morning. The horse stepped on her right foot and broke it.

A comedy of errors ensued and the 1922 wedding would not be followed by a honeymoon. When their youngest child graduated from High School in 1947, they would take a honeymoon. This is the subject for another story.

Next month will be July. I will be writing the story just after the Memorial Day holiday and hope to be able to entertain you with a fable surrounding our nation's birth.

THREE LINK PLAN PROGRESS – THE CERTIFICATE LEWISBURG LODGE NO. 96

One of the "Links" of our Three Link Plan is to embrace our rich history and heritage that guide our purpose.

In order to reach back to our roots, our history, and heritage, we examined an original blank membership certificate that we have that was attached to our 1844 charter. If one examines IOOF documents from the Victorian period, you will see that they were very busy, ornate, and gaudy by today's standards.

In today's world, certificates are simple, not elegant, and really have no personalty. But, in the 1700's and 1800's they were very ornate and elegant. This was actually done, not only to impress the viewer, but to showcase the engraver's talent. Remember, no Photoshop or Adobe Illustrator in those days! Engravings were done meticulously by hand on a lead lithograph plate, or other media to be printed. Much like an ornate tattoo today, it not only captures meaning, it display's the artist's talent.

If one examines our original membership certificate, you can see the symbols of the order, elaborate and varied fonts, and elements. The new member is also "caused" to sign the certificate in the margin...which was also common for Victorian times.



Now, transport yourself back to those days. Ceremonies were very formal, gentlemen and ladies attended in their finest attire. It was an "event", something to look forward to, something to be reveled, something to be an honor to be a part of. Something that was meticulously planned and executed. Something mysterious and exciting. It captured the excitement and the honor of being an Odd Fellow. It was an *event*.

With all that said, our Lodge has decided, as part of our *Three-Link Plan*, to return to our roots, to make our initiations an *event*. How are we going to do that? It's easy!

But first, we must consider the new member who is being initiated. We are making a first impression on them. We only get ONE chance to do that. But, more important, we are creating a *memory* for them. Yes, a memory. Something that will be with them for life, and that's what it's all about. A memory.

We are in the process of partnering with a neighboring Lodge to perform initiations. This was not uncommon, back in the day. We have an advertisement from an Odd Fellows magazine in the early 1900's where a local Lodge "specializes in the initiatory degree". Our neighboring Lodge is beautiful, historic, and has the proper furnishings and regalia for the initiation. Additionally, this strengthens our alliance between Brothers and Sisters, and there will be more people at the initiation! Our members will attend the initiation in their suit jackets...not jeans. This adds formality and reverence to the occasion. We are returning to our roots.

We are also adding a very special and personal dramatic element to close the ceremony, and give the new member a token to cherish and display, and to remind them of that evening...a memory.

Now, back to the discussion about our history and heritage... the Membership Certificate.

Our original Certificate is simply too big for modern times, and would be too expensive to reproduce and frame, so, unfortunately, it is not practical for our purposes. We need to modify it.

What our Lodge has done, is extract elements from the original 1844 Certificate, the wording, type fonts, symbols, actual elements, and made our own Membership Certificate. You will notice that, at the bottom of our Certificate, we used the actual two ladies from the original to surround our Lodge seal. How cool is that? We are continuing our rich heritage!



At the end of the Initiatory Degree Ceremony, the Noble Grand and the Lodge Secretary will approach the new member, who is standing at a podium in the middle of the room. The Secretary will be carrying a platter. The Platter will contain: The Membership Certificate, a quill pen, and an inkwell. The Noble Grand will read the certificate to the new member and will "cause" him to sign it in the margin. The Noble Grand and the Secretary will counter-sign with the quill pen and then retire to their stations where the Secretary will mount the Certificate in a frame and present to the new member.

Thus, we have added a very special and personal close to the Ceremony that carries forth our rich heritage and history, and we have given the new member a token of that evening that they can proudly display, just like in Victorian times. The return of investment is huge. But most important, we have given them a memory...every time they look at their Certificate, they will remember that evening and smile. That translates into excitement, and someone who will recruit new members. Revitalization.

THE SENECA BUILDING HAS A RICH AND COLORFUL HISTORY WITH ODD FELLOWSHIP

~ Excerpts taken from the Bradford (Pa.) Era, Tuesday, February 28, 2017

The area of Veterans Square has always been at the center of Bradford's activity. The location of the current Seneca Building has been a prominent commercial property since the city's first days.

In 1884, only five years after Bradford was chartered as a city, the Producer's Oil Exchange was built at the site of what is now the Seneca Building. In the back of the building was the Pennsylvania National Guard's Company C Armory.

Just 15 years later, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows acquired the building and remodeled it for its use. But in 1902, the building burned to the ground. The Odd Fellows built a new brick building in 1903 on the same location.

The organization razed that building in 1931 to make way for the current Art Deco, six-story building, which was completed in 1932.

In 1983, Dr. Paul Keverline, co-owner of Seneca Eye Surgeons, purchased the building. The medical practice occupied the top floor. Keverline died in a plane crash in 2002. His business partner, Dr. Robert Weiss of Warren, and his wife, Mary, donated the building to Pitt-Bradford in 2006 in memory of Keverline, who was an alumnus of the University of Pittsburgh and its medical school.

The university used the building extensively in 2007-8 when, during the renovation of Swarts hall on campus, faculty offices and classrooms were temporarily relocated to the downtown property.

When Swarts Hall reopened, the university's Division for Continuing Education and Regional Development and the Center for Rural Health Practice remained at the Seneca Building, occupying the second floor.

In May, the university will open a 3,400-square-foot Marilyn Horne Museum and Exhibit Center, along with a gift shop, café, meeting space and new offices for the Bradford Creative and Performing Arts Center.





"The Pitt store, rental space for business/offices, and the café will be welcome additions to the downtown," said Chelsea Schwab, Bradford Main Street Manager.

"The Pitt store is a wonderful way to integrate the university into the downtown and create a stronger partnership between the two. The meeting space will be very useful moving forward as there is currently no large group meeting space downtown. This is important for hosting conferences and workshops downtown, which will expose more people to the area."

~ Editor's comments – Bradford was home to Tuna Lodge #411. Lodge #411 started in Smethport, as Smethport Lodge #411 on July 18, 1850. Smethport Lodge #411 went defunct in March of 1858 and the number was given to Bradford on May, 29, 1877 as they took the name Tuna Lodge #411. By the time Smethport reinstituted, the number was taken by Tuna, and they reinstituted in 1882 under #389, which was the old Lodge in Cerus, McKean County. This hall was also home to Queen Esther Rebekah Lodge #118, which ran from 1897 until it's consolidation in 1988 with Lady Eldred Rebekah Lodge #526. It also housed McKean Encampment #266, which ran from 1894 until 1976 and Canton Bradford #43, Patriarchs Militant, from 1904 until 1922. In the end, Tuna Lodge #411 consolidated with Foster Lodge #333 in 1992, which is home to our Grand Warden, George Tufts, who submitted this article.

LODGE MEMBERS BESTOW A 70 YEAR SERVICE AWARD ON BROTHER FRED BROUSE




