TREASURER'S TALES - JULY 2018

Session at State College will be over by the time you read this. Whatever you didn't like at session, was not my fault. I told someone else to do it differently but they wouldn't listen. If you liked session, I am responsible for your enjoyment.

We find our hero, Barney Wells at home in Grover's Mill, New Jersey for the summer of 1923. On July 4, 1923, Jack Dempsey won the heavyweight championship. On July 13 the Hollywood sign is officially dedicated in the hills above Hollywood, Los Angeles. It originally read "Hollywoodland" but the four last letters are dropped in 1949. On July 23, Phillies score 12 in 6th and beat Cubs 17-4.

The biggest event in Grover's Mill was the Fourth of July picnic. I have written several times about this picnic in years gone by. I generally come up with some cute story about Melchizedek disrupting the picnic. I promised myself I would do something different this July. So I will.

The Fourth of July picnic was planned two months in advance. The lodge members had specific assignments to fulfill in order to make the picnic work. On July 3, at 10:30 pm, it started to rain. It rained all night and was still raining at 10:30 am on the fourth. The parade was washed out. The lodge decided the picnic would go on at the lodge hall. Although people had eaten outside for festive occasions for many years, the restroom facilities were still outside. Modern times in 1923 were not similar to 2018.

The lodge hall was filled with children who were unable to play the normal games. The fireworks display would not take place unless the rain stopped by 8:30 pm and the mood was not good.

Elizabeth was in charge of games and the rain made it difficult. Parker Brothers had a new board game out called "Journey to Bethlehem" but it had a Christmas theme. Charades was popular, so that was played by the adults. Elizabeth found a bean bag game of recent origin and used it for the children. This worked for a while.

The first charade was teapot. Barney was the teapot and it was recognized quickly. Since Barney exhibited the first word, he was to write down the next word to guess. He wrote down gas mask, a memory from World War I. It took a while, but Vic guessed the gas mask. Vic thought he should offer a challenge to exceed the gas mask. Vic wrote down Rongeur, an instrument like tin snips used by veterinarians and physicians in surgery to snip out pieces of bone or open a skull. After fifteen minutes, no one was able to guess the secret word, so Vic was told he had to come up with another term. This time he wrote down horse manure. The manure part was easily guessed but it took five minutes to get

the horse.

The rain was still pouring, but it was time to eat. The doors to the temple were left open at both ends, so air could pass through. I told you at the beginning, I wasn't going to include any cute episodes with a raccoon and I am true to my word. No raccoon entered through the open doors of the Odd Fellows Temple. Melchizedek's character is untarnished. However, a young skunk smelled the baked beans and ventured into the dry confines of the Odd Fellows Temple. The guests sitting close to the door entered by the skunk were frightened and ran out the other door into the rain. This would have been a negative of some gravity, but things got worse. When the Odd Fellows became fearful and animated, the skunk did also. After a due exhibition of his protective mechanisms, everyone left the skunk alone and departed the building.

Since the skunk could not reach the food, Vic went in and lured the skunk out with pieces of a hot dog. The question was, should they re-enter the temple and finish the picnic, without scrubbing the place down. The rain stopped around 4:00 pm and the doors and window were left open, but guarded. Several members entered cautiously. They found that they could go upstairs to the lodge room and finish the picnic with no strong odor. The food was taken upstairs, eaten hurriedly and all went to the park to see the fireworks.

Barney was chair of the house committee. He had to clean the lodge hall before the next meeting. Sweeping the lodge room after the picnic was easy. The social hall needed scrubbing with a mixture of hydrogen peroxide and baking soda in hot water. It worked but the job was a terrible one. Barney had to soak his clothes after he finished cleaning the lodge hall. The first order of business at the next lodge meeting was to purchase screen doors for the lodge hall. There were three doors on the first floor, all were to have screen doors. A few of the wealthier homes in Grover's Mill had screen doors but the Odd Fellows Hall was the first non-residence to have such a luxury.


MIDDLETOWN HOME TRIP

VARIETY LODGE OF ODD FELLOWS MAKES 7,000TH MEAL

Since its founding over 400 years ago, The Independent Order Of Odd fellows has been proving that there's nothing odd about helping others. Spearheaded by Lanny Blyweiss, and now chaired by Ron Chakler; several dedicated members of the lodge volunteer to give up one evening a month to prepare hot meals for shut-in seniors. Every first Wednesday of each month, the hearty volunteers show up at the KleinLife center, and lovingly prepare, from scratch; hot meals containing an entrée and two vegetables. These meals do not have "instant food" content.

On April 4th, the Lodge volunteers ended their 4th year of making these monthly meals by celebrating the preparation of their 10,000th meal. The members made "gourmet" Tilapia with seasoned rice and vegetable medley. After four years, the group has become a well-oiled machine and the 10 members assembled, resembled a professional kitchen with a division of labor that always seems to fall into place. Members prepared the Tilapia, seasoned expertly and carefully put them into trays that were put into the ovens and checked for the proper temperature until they were ready. The finished Rice and vegetable medley were then ready to be put into the aluminum serving containers, along with the yummy looking Tilapia. Then they were sealed and packaged in Plastic wrap; all ready for delivery. Meals are then refrigerated, awaiting other volunteers, who later deliver them to the shut-ins. During the last year, the leadership of the

"Cooking Cadre" passed from Blyweiss to Ron Chakler, who continues to report that those who have become "regulars", consider the effort extremely rewarding and have fun doing it. The 'Psychic income" comes when many of the shut-ins, ask that they would like to have their meals prepared by Variety Lodge. (Labels are placed on each container, noting the preparers of the meals they receive)



The Lodge looks forward to preparing the next 10,000 meals.
